Just Cause Eviction Protections

Closing the End-of-lease Loophole

What are Just Cause Eviction Protections?

- Seattle's [Just Cause Eviction Ordinance](#) bans evictions unless the reason for the eviction is on a list of just causes.
- Washington State only requires 20 days notice for a “no-cause” eviction. [HB 1236](#) could create some Just Cause eviction protections statewide.
- Federal Way's [“Stable Homes Initiative” \(Initiative 19-001\)](#), passed in 2019 after a massive grassroots campaign organized by WACAN, Labor Unions, and other renter rights activists.

End-of-Lease Loophole

- Seattle's Just Cause protections do not stop landlords from refusing to renew a renter's lease.
- Just Cause protects renters on month-to-month leases and renters mid-lease.
- The Sustainability and Renters' Committee will discuss closing this loophole in 2021.



The Federal Way “Stable Homes Initiative”

- The “Stable Homes Initiative” protects renters in Federal Way from no-cause evictions
- Closes the end-of-lease loophole by requiring landlords to offer lease extensions before the end of a lease:

“(2) Between 60 and 90 days prior to the expiration of the existing rental term, the landlord must offer a tenant the opportunity to enter into a new rental agreement or to extend the existing rental agreement”

- The corporate landlord lobby sued on December 6, 2019. The trial date is currently set for July 12, 2021.

Washington State HB 1236

- Would create Just Cause eviction protections statewide if passed in its current form.
- Partially closes the end-of-lease loophole by:

“... the tenancy becomes a month-to-month tenancy until further agreement of the landlord and tenant, and may only be terminated for the causes enumerated...”

except for at the end of the initial lease (3-12 months).

Other Differences Between Just Cause in Seattle and HB 1236

HB 1236 would permit eviction for reasons not permitted by Seattle's protections:

- HB 1236 allows eviction for, “a legitimate economic or business reason,” which is not defined.
- HB 1236 allows eviction for, “unwanted sexual advances or other acts of sexual harassment directed at the property owner, property manager, property employee, or another tenant,” which is not defined.

Other Differences Between Just Cause in Seattle and HB 1236 - Continued

HB 1236 would permit eviction for reasons not permitted by Seattle's protections:

- HB 1236 allows eviction if, “the tenant has been required to register as a sex offender.”
- Seattle prohibits winter evictions
- Seattle prohibits evictions for COVID related economic hardship (for 6 months after the moratorium ends)

Our Work to Close End-of-lease Loophole

In CM Sawant's Office we have investigated closing the end-of-lease loophole for several years:

- Discussed with renters and community organizers,
- Met with the City Attorney's Office,
- Monitored the effect of Federal Way's Stable Housing Initiative and attempts to pass Just Cause statewide,

We are excited that there is the opportunity to finally close this loophole in 2021.

Next Steps

The Sustainability and Renters' Right Committee will:

- hear from renters and community organizers about closing the end-of-lease loophole and other improvements in Seattle's Just Cause eviction protections,
- monitor the legal progress of Federal Way's Stable Homes Initiative,
- monitor the progress of HB 1236,
- discuss and vote on legislation to strengthen Just Cause protections in Seattle.







Annual Population, GDP, and Emissions Trends


Emissions reductions were achieved in the last decade even though Seattle's population increased during the same time period. Expanded emissions are slowly rising above 2008 baseline levels.



Annual Population, GDP, and Emissions Trends













2016 to 2018: Key Insights

- Overall emissions went up by 1.1%.
- Buildings emissions rose by over 8%, primarily due to an increase in fossil gas use.
 - Fossil gas accounts for 86% of buildings emissions (94% after SCL carbon offsets) and only 43% of building energy use.
- Transportation emissions reduced by 2.4% due to slightly more efficient vehicles and less vehicle miles travelled.
- Waste emissions dropped by almost 10% due to more composting and recycling efforts.




Emissions Reduction Targets

- Climate planning process





Ongoing Emissions Reduction Efforts

Near-term climate actions in the buildings and transportation sectors

Buildings

Building Tune-Ups

Just hit 500 Building Tune-Ups! Early analysis uncovered 7% energy savings and 8% emissions reductions on average per building in the first year after a Building Tune-Up. (n=50)

Municipal Building Electrification

Preliminary analysis shows over 20% reduction in site energy use and over 25% emissions reduction (2019 v. 2008); on track to hit 40% by 2025 reductions.

GND EO requires all new or substantially altered municipal buildings to operate without fossil fuels.



Buildings

Electrifying Existing Buildings

Complement the State energy performance standards and build on the City's existing Energy Benchmarking and Tune-Up programs to transition existing commercial & multifamily buildings off fossil fuels.

Clean Heat Program

Phase out residential oil heat by 2028. Oil tax to fund conversions for low-income households and Rebates available for market rate homes to switch to energy-efficient heat pumps.

Seattle Energy Code

Significantly reduce fossil fuel use in new commercial and larger multifamily buildings.

OIL HEAT vs CLEAN HEAT

Oil furnaces burn heating oil that is similar to diesel fuel to heat the home.

Heat pumps transfer heat from the air into or out of the house.

Burning heating oil **pollutes our air**.

An electric heat pump is more than twice as efficient as an oil furnace and saves about **\$850 every year**.

Heating oil costs are **expensive**, and all costs are usually **billed entirely at once** when the tank is filled.

Heat pumps also include **air-conditioning** and **air-filtration** providing year-round comfort.

\$1,700 per year

Leaking oil tanks **pollute our soil and ground water**, and can cause expensive clean-up costs.

500 gallons

Heat pumps run on **carbon neutral electricity** from Seattle City Light.

Transportation

Mode Shift

Incentivize switch from drive alone trips to sustainable modes like transit, biking and walking. (SDOT)

Revenue for Equitable Mobility

The City is exploring road-pricing policies, as a possible approach to decrease traffic, reduce climate pollution, and support a more just transportation system.

Transportation Electrification

Electrify everything that moves people, goods, or services to reduce climate and air pollution, increase electric mobility options, and create green jobs and workforce diversity.

Accelerate actions, policies and technologies to electrify transportation at scale.



Background: Driven by the value that the path to an ideal Green New Deal can be achieved by following principles of Just Transition, Debolina Banerjee played a key role in the core GND coalition group that advocated for Seattle’s GND resolution and oversight in 2019. Debolina rallied for GND principles to center the needs and voices of environmental justice communities, and helped write the resolution and ordinance. As an organizer with Puget Sound Sage, Debolina has supported a Green New Deal for Seattle because they believe that it can serve as a visionary and multi-issue policy that can build bold steps to end Seattle’s climate pollution, commit to transitioning to a fully renewable energy grid, create safe living wage jobs, affordable housing, affordable and accessible public transportation, community-controlled development and corporate accountability. Debolina believes that we are in unprecedented times with a pandemic raging in the world, the consequences of climate change looming upon us and a nation politically divided on racial and economic justice values. Debolina Banerjee

Debolina is the Climate Justice Policy Analyst at Puget Sound Sage. Her responsibilities include research-based analysis of climate policies, campaign support on climate justice issues, and building power within Sage's local and statewide climate coalitions.

Debolina played a key role in some of Sage's major climate campaigns and policy-advocacy like the WA State Initiative 1631, WA State Environmental Disparities mapping project, City of Seattle Green New Deal resolution and ordinance to name a few. Most recently she co-authored Sage's latest community-based-research report Powering the Transition that highlights how the low-income communities of color in South Seattle and South King County perceive energy policies and are impacted by them.

Her research experience spans across various climate issues, namely energy, transit-oriented development, displacement, and environmental impact on low-income communities and communities of color.

She is a current member of the King County Climate Equity Taskforce and recently completed her term at the City of Seattle Environmental Justice Committee where she was a member since 2017.

An immigrant from India, Debolina is also a volunteer with Association for India's Development where she has been involved since 2009 at various chapters in India and the USA. She maintains strong ties with grassroots activists and marginalized communities in India through her work in organizing for social justice around food, sustainable agriculture, clean environment, community development and women's empowerment.

Debolina holds a Master's degree in Applied Environmental Studies in Planning from the University of Waterloo and a Master's Degree in City Planning from the Indian Institute of Technology.
