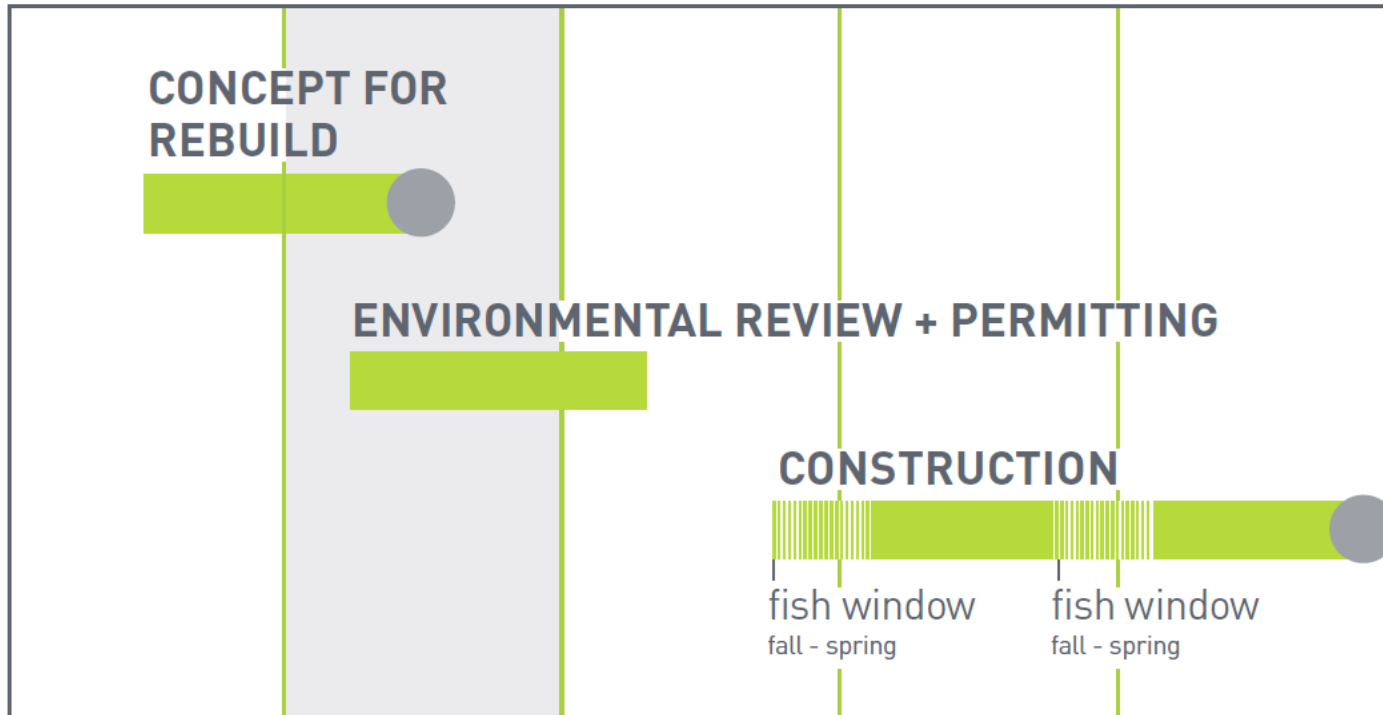

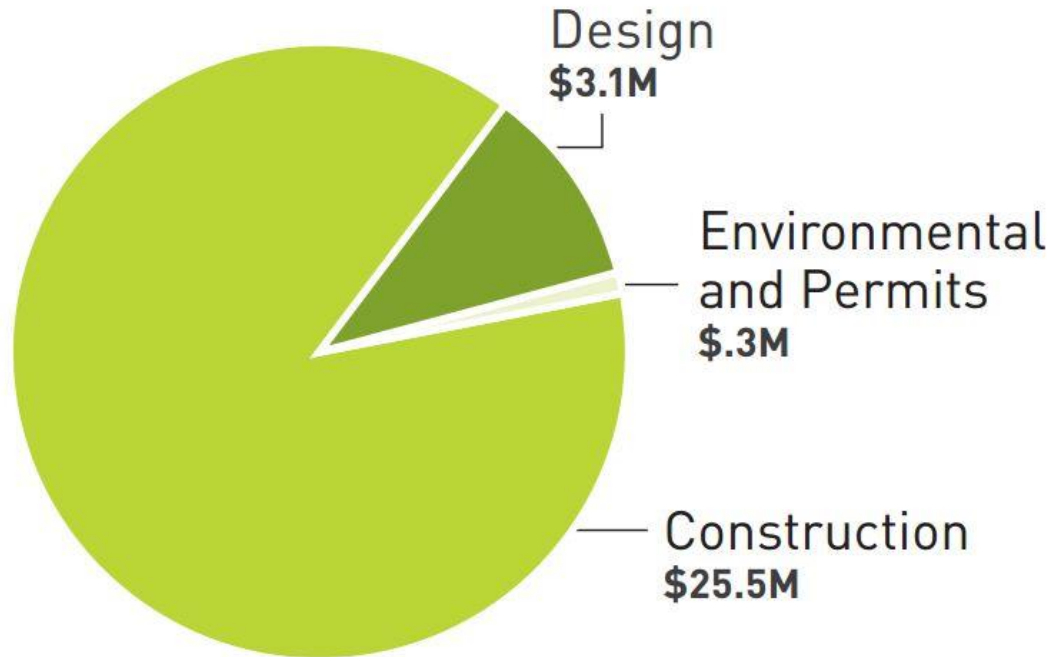
PIER 62/63 REBUILD – SCHEDULE

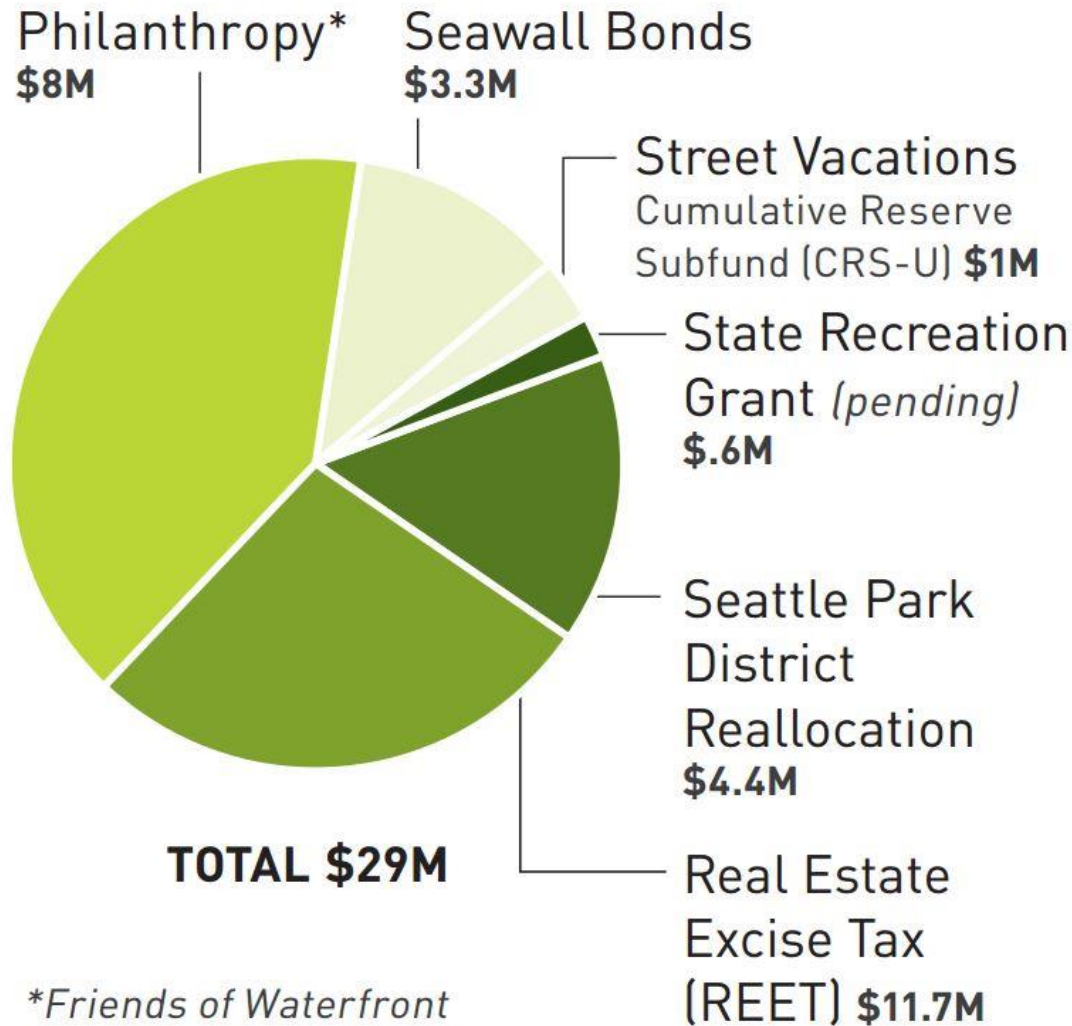


PIER 62/63 REBUILD – COSTS (100% PLANS)



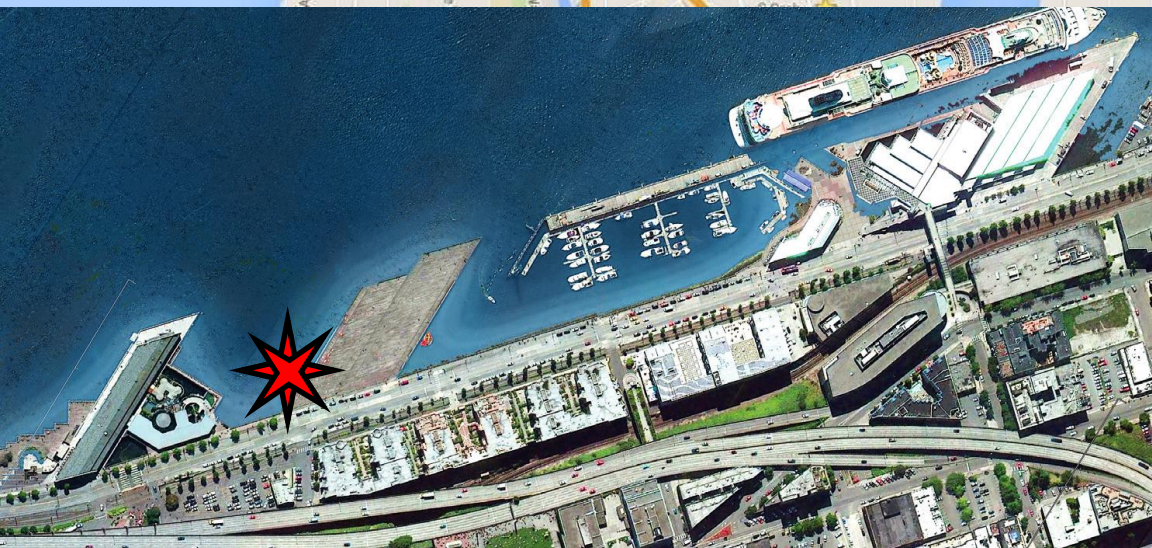
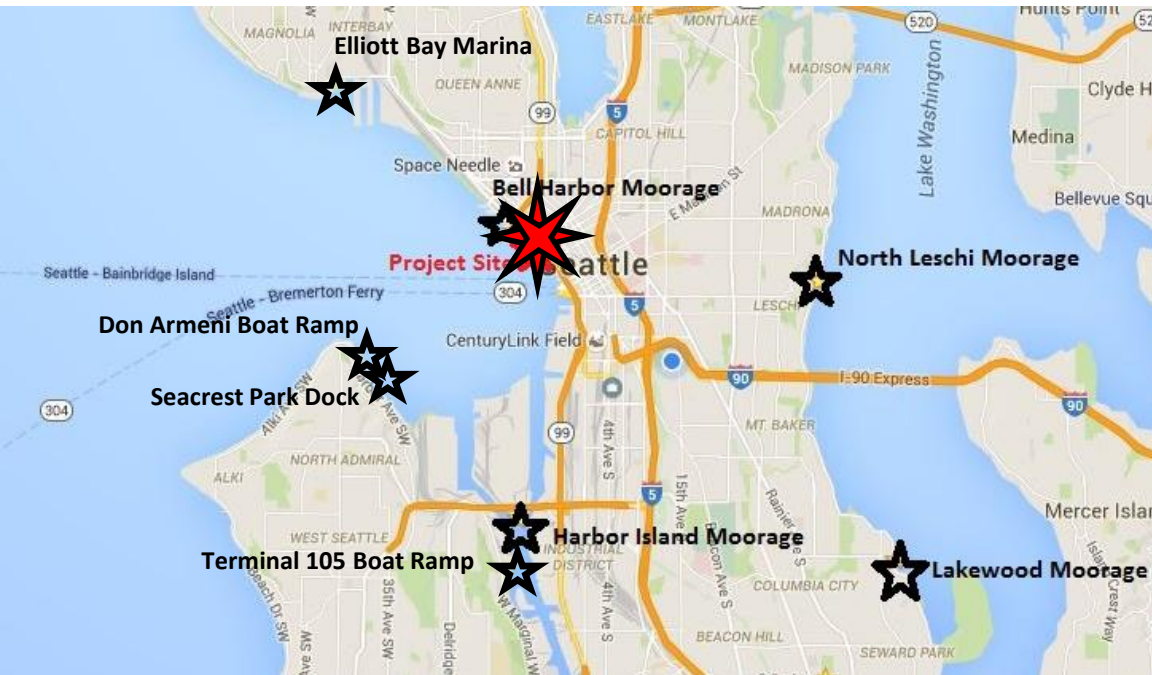

1 – PUBLIC NEED: LACK OF FACILITIES



- Many opportunities for recreational boating around Elliott Bay
- Bell Harbor – five transient slips
- Often turns away recreational boaters – recommends reservations
- Pier 62 Dock will be only free moorage on Central Waterfront

2 – SITE SUITABILITY: WATERFRONT CONTEXT



- Centrally located on Seattle's waterfront between Seattle Aquarium and Bell Harbor Cruise Terminal
- Takes advantage of interest in aquatic, maritime and boating activities
- Provides recreational boating access to one of state's top tourism destinations

Access

- Provide resources and funding to improve access in the Seattle-King County region
- Increase recreation accessibility for the financially challenged

Equity

- Consider the implications of changing demographics when making recreation decisions
- Increase attention to segments of Washington’s residents that are not participating in outdoor recreation at rates commensurate with their population proportions in the State
- Increase and improve access for residents with disabilities
