CITY LIGHT STRATEGIC PLAN/ENERGY COMMITTEE WORKPLAN

Coordinate work of the Energy Committee, City Light Review Panel, and City Light on the next Strategic Plan Update.

DENNY SUBSTATION AND NODO NETWORK

Monitor the permitting process for the Denny Substation and the subsequent construction of it.

Monitor the City's progress towards the enrollment targets established by the Mayor and recommend any changes to the approach taken by City Light and HSD that may be needed to increase the likelihood of success.

Issues routinely arise (for example, the electrocution of a dog by a City Light power pole which garnered a great deal of media attention, and the explosion of Unit 53 at Boundary Dam) that consume staff time but are not on the work program.

MUNICIPAL BROADBAND

Explore options to build a city owned municipal broadband utility, and investigate the possibility of integrating it into the fiber cable that Seattle City Light needs for Advanced Metering Infrastructure. Joint with Public Safety, Civil Rights, and Technology.

PLANNING AND OVERSIGHT

CITY LIGHT REVIEW PANEL

Support the Review Panel in its review of City Light's cost allocation methodology, rate design, and update to the strategic plan.

REGIONAL/NATIONAL ISSUES

Monitor the Bonneville Power Administration to ensure that City Light rate payers are not unfairly burdened with the costs. Monitor Federal Energy Regulatory Commission decisions for impacts on the Northwest and on City Light. Monitor the Western Climate Initiative and similar initiatives at the national level and provide policy support and direction to the utility as needed. Monitor development of the NW Energy Imbalance Market and recommend whether City Light should participate.

REPORTS AND METRICS

Review periodic reports and performance metrics to ensure City Light is meeting it targets under the Strategic Plan.

RATES

CITY LIGHT RATE DESIGN

Review City Light's Rate Design, focusing especially on ways to encourage the efficient use of electricity while ensuring that City Light collects sufficient revenue to meet its financial targets. Recommend updated rate design to the Council.

Review City Light's Cost Allocation approach to see if there are fruitful areas for improvement
