2015- Juno Therapeutics, Seattle, WA

❖ A major Tenant Improvement at 400 Dexter to house a groundbreaking company focused on developing therapeutic cures for cancer. The culture and design walk hand-in-hand in this 140,000 SF facility which includes a variety of features designed to enable round-the-clock progress into cancer research.

2015- Seattle Childrens Research Institute, Seattle, WA

• A major ground-up facility for Seattle's leading institution on paedeatric medicine to house 400,000 square feet of research space within environs that are culturally attuned to their mission.

2015- School of Medicine, University of Idaho, Moscow, ID

• Programming and conceptual design for a 40-seat incubator school of medicine, first of its kind, on the University of Idaho campus.

2015- The Bridges Research Campus, University of Arizona, Tucson, AZ

• The Bridges Research Campus combines the cutting edge incubator environment for developing businesses and research facilities for University of Arizona's science and engineering faculty on a 32-acre campus. A combination of mission driven program and adjacency to airport and campus make this a one-of-a-kind facility, housing up to 1.2m square feet of research as well as a four-star hotel and conferencing facility.

Ben de Rubertis with Genus Architecture:

2014- Glendale 180, Glendale, CO

A study in urban planning for a 5.5-acre site at the crossroads of the two most significant arterials in Denver and sited adjacent to South Cherry Creek along a wetland corridor with dense riparian zones and natural beauty.

2015- Art Lofts, Denver, CO

Built adjacent to a sprawling highway, the art lofts create a new skyline for west Denver by using clever building orientation and siting to insulate the residences from neighbors and provide them with commanding views over the Highlands neighborhood.

2015- Chief Joseph Village Renovations & Additions, Washington State University, Pullman WA

Built adjacent to a sprawling wetlands, this project uses a nature trail and series of interpretive centers to create student communities reminiscent of the cultural patterns of the Wallowa Indian Tribe.

2015 Global Scholars Hall, Washington State University, Pullman, WA

• A student center and mixed use project framing the most exciting center of campus at WSU. The mixed-use project features a fresh market, the first of its kind on campus, serving locally-sourced fresh meats and produce for use by students in individual and community kitchens.

Public Art installation at WSU which incorporates visual depictions of cities built on hills in various regions of the world. The documentation is all accomplished through hand sketching and focuses on shantytowns, favelas and other human habitations which are more informal in character.

2014 Footprints, Public Art, University of Colorado Health Sciences Center, Arvada, CO
Footprints is artwork donated to University of Colorado Health Sciences by the first graduating class

of the new facility. Meant to evoke the permanence of education in the fleeting time of its pursuit, this project will act as a gateway to the medical education building.

2010 Poet-Tree, Public Art, University of Arizona, Tucson, AZ

This art piece graces the front door of the international honors college at University of Arizona. The concept is a tree grown from words, the words are poems harvested from local poets who write about the earth. The trees they form are desert acacia jerusalemia, an import to the region, planted on the same site to honor a message of peace between Israel and the west. The acacias no longer grow on the site, but the form of the trees remains in the Poet-Tree.

2010 Arribal, Public Art, University of Arizona, Tucson, AZ

Arribal is a public art installation at University of Arizona conceptualized and executed by Ben de Rubertis and Tom Philabaum, a local glass artist. This project is a glass wall with changing chroma, made from dalle de verre cast-glass elements.

• One of three invited entries, the design for the new student center at Gonzaga focused on Jesuit teachings and the ultimate goals of fellowship and interdisciplinary support for students.

2012 Northside Campus Master Plan, Washington State University, Pullman, WA

• Only a handful of greenfield sites remain at WSU. The master planning for collegiate housing was out of date and waefully in need of updating. The master plan illustrates how to take the same land resource and update housing that allows the re-purposing of out-of-date housing and conference facilities. The completed master plan boasts 1,100 beds against the 700 estimated maximum of the previous housing study.

Northside Residence Hall, Washington State University, Pullman, WA

O Northside Hall establishes a new concept for block development on campus, a shift away from a "buildings on a quad" to a "city on the hill" metaphor for the development of land resources at WSU. This project has been so successful in its increased density and design quality that it is regularly toured by other Pac-12 campuses.

2011 Likins Hall, University of Arizona, Tucson, AZ

• Likins Residence Hall is conceived around an urban "arroyo" or major storm water passage. The design precedent is the latitude of the building: 32 degrees N. The design team looked at models of indigenous housing at this latitude around the world and appropriates methodologies for solar control from these other models.

2010 Arból de la Vida, University of Arizona, Tucson, AZ

• Arból de la Vida is home of the University of Arizona Honors College. It is conceived around the concept of the desert "slot canyon": coal canyons which are formed by the action of water over time and which preserve the temperatures at the ground level through the cooling effect of thermal mass. The first level walls of the building are primarily concrete because of this concept. Thermal mass holds the cool of the night so that the public areas and courtyards stay active and enlivened.

2009 Vine Residences, University of Arizona, Tucson, AZ

Commissioned to pursue sweeping advances in the design of residence halls, U of A initiated this pilot project to address increasing student demand for sustainable living options on the campus. The project goals were to meet, if possible, the threshold of a Living Building, a popular term that defines the point at which building performance over its lifetime and the resources required to construct it achieve balance.

2008 Golden High School, Golden, CO

This school re-establishes the connection between a 100-year school site and the surrounding topography. The earliest incorporated high school in Colorado; Golden High is in every way an icon of its town. Design for the school revealed a deep sense of history and connection between Golden residents, and the building reuses and repurposes historical friezes, statuary, artwork, and building materials from earlier incarnations of the school.

2008 Osborne Center for Research, University of Colorado at Colorado Springs, CO

• The Osborne Center is the first STEM-inclusive research facility at the UCCS campus, introducing a host of interdisciplinary and collaborator learning environments that are first-of-kind for the developing science and mathematics curricula. This award-winning facility included a moster plan which tamed a significant sloping site and introduced a series of pedestrian connections.

2007 Campus Village Apartments, University of Colorado at Denver, Denver, CO

• Conducted the intensive site feasibility study with Sue Powers and Walnut Development LLC, establishing site unit capacity, open space, security, utilities, construction schedule and budget information leading up to pro forma and letter of intent. Worked on the development of preliminary unit plans and sizes with Michael Pyatok and a site stormwater mitigation strategy with Ron Straka. Did not participate in the design of the facility.

2007 Center for Bioethics and Humanities, University of Colorado Health Sciences Center

• Designed forum space, patterned after the Aspen Institute's main chamber and taking precedence from the design for the UN and other buildings emphasizing transparency in human communication and research.

Anschutz Medical School, University of Colorado Health Sciences Center, Arvada, CO

This building assists in bringing to form the changing pedagogy of medical education. Students enrolled in once-separate degree programs collaborate on shared assignments and research across the broad spectrum of medical academic disciplines. The building utilizes transparency and flexible space planning to create a configurable and customizable educational environment.

2005 LASP Space Technology Center, University of Colorado Research Park, Boulder, CO

This research facility embraces a quintessential Colorado landscape to provide flexible collaborative spaces of every scale for research scientists and engineers. A simple building on a simple budget, the success of the building is in its relationship to the surrounding landscape and economical design.

Posada San Pedro Residences, University of Arizona, Tucson, AZ

Designed to a small budget, this multiple award-winning neighborhood plan began with a study of new urbanism and ended with four new courtyard-formed structures defining micro-alleys and pedestrian pathways in a brand new neighborhood on campus.

2003 Villa del Puente Residences, University of Arizona, Tucson, AZ

Villa del Puente and "El Portal", the first two buildings of Highland District Housing, frame a significant Gateway on the University of Arizona campus. After consideration of many potential forms to address this popular but difficult intersection of the campus, the design team settled upon the "diagonal" street intersecting a Neighborhood Square.

Kenneth King Performing Arts Center, Auraria Higher Education Center, Denver, CO

This facility is sprawling with 16 classrooms, 42 faculty offices, and 9 performance venues including a concert hall, recital hall, theater-in-the-round, busker's alley, three black box theaters and an exterior space dedicated to impromptu performance. This is the first fully ADA accessible performance venue in the US.

East Campus Renovation, Pima County Community College, Tucson, AZ

Economy of design and placemaking put the emphasis for this project on a natural desert arroyo feature running north-south through the academic structures.

2000 Northwest Campus, Pima County Community College, Tucson, AZ

1999 Emily Griffith Opportunity School Training Center, Denver, CO

Ben de Rubertis with Yale Urban Design Workshop and the Professional Schools Neighborhood Clinic

1997-8 Church Street South Redevelopment, New Haven, CT

The planning and design of a new community at the existing train station to replace low-income housing with workforce housing as part of a mixed-use transit-oriented development.

1998 Timothy Dwight Elementary School, New Haven, CT

The design of a 10,000-squarefoot multipurpose center to serve the Dwight Elementary School was published in <u>Architectural Record</u> in <u>March 2001</u>. The design was recognized as a thoughtful response to the site and as a form of "low-cost, high-energy urbanism."

1998 Shaw's Supermarket, New Haven, CT

Land and tenant agreements for the installation of a national supermarket into a blighted urban neighborhood. Duties included grant-writing, site feasibility studies, and market analysis.

1998 Campus Master Plan, Yale University, New Haven, CT

An extensive existing building survey, street survey, campus utilities and infrastructure survey, and campilation of the documentation into the Master Plan became a web-based database of project

pages with direct links to existing building drawings and infrastructure database. The Master Plan included Case Studies which evaluated opportunities existing on campus to improve compus streets (as in the Elm Street Case study) through the introduction of increased building frontage, sidewalk planning, lighting planning, and the introduction of 2-way traffic. Case Studies on Precincts identified opportunity sites for future building planning and ways to maximize benefit on those sites.

An extensive existing building survey, street survey, campus utilities and infrastructure survey, and compilation of the documentation to provide Madison with precedent studies and case studies for the improvement of their town center.
