A non-profit advocate for P-Patch Program

•A Land Trust:

- Owns all or part of 6 P-Patches Through Conservation Easements

An All Volunteer Board with one paid accountant

•A Fiscal Sponsor to 45 P-Patches & Community Gardens

Provider of liability insurance for 89 P-Patches

Contributing partial plot fees for low-income gardeners

Providing leadership training for volunteer site leaders

Funded by donations - No City funding



Department of Neighborhoods P-Patch Staff - Current Status -

•Staff of 5 FTE manages 89 P-Patches across Seattle

- Each staff person manages/administers 18 gardens and approximately 600 gardeners
- •22 P-Patches with low income and English-as-a-second language gardeners
 - 550 families require more hands-on assistance from staff
 - Many P-Patches have multiple languages spoken
 - Two-thirds of P-Patches have Site Leadership Teams who manage day-to-day activities at the gardens

 Current workload lengthens response time for service requests from Site Leadership Teams

- Due to current staff workload, there is a moratorium on new garden development
 - missed opportunities

P-Patches are about Building Community

P-Patches are developed with community involvement from planning to construction, utilizing

volunteer labor where possible / a hallmark of the program

Majority of P-Patches were built with DON grant monies and volunteer labor

P-Patches are on land owned by Parks, City Light, SPU. SDOT, Seattle Center, & DON

- 13 are on Seattle Housing Authority land
 - 10 are on private or church property
 - 6 are Conservation Easements held by GROW

Oldest garden is **Picardo** built in 1973 & the "P" in the name stands for Picardo

DON staff leveraged \$2.427 million from the 2008 Parks & Open Space Levy to create

28 new or expanded gardens that provided 800 plots for new gardeners

Seattle Park District allocated \$200,000 annually for rebuild of aging infrastructure in older P-

Patches that excludes gardens on SHA, church/private and GROW properties

 SHA properties have the most vulnerable populations of gardeners who cannot write and administer grants to make improvements
