







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


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


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
Many Have Witnessed Crime – But Majority Do Not Report It

For example: panhandling, graffiti, illegal dumping, shoplifting, more


Why Don't People Report Crime?



"The police don't speak my language" was not a significant deterrent to reporting violent or non-violent crime (cited by 8% and 3.2%, respectively).

Non-Violent Crime Is Pervasive


How Often Do You Witness The Following Behaviors?




Police-Community Relations Need Improvement

No Safe Harbor in CID

45% of respondents stated that they do not have a safe place to go in the CID in case of an emergency.

Respondents' feeling of safety declined as age increased.

Public Safety is a Public Health Issue

When asked to rate the statement,


"I feel anxiety or stress due to public safety,"

71% characterized that statement as somewhat or very true.


29% characterized that statement as not true.

The Problem Is Larger than Language

When asked why they didn't report a crime, language ranked low in comparison with low expectations of police follow through and concerns for their own safety.

Participate in & support long-term neighborhood investments

in the CID with public safety components.
