Onyx Successes



- Successful exhibition history in the Pacific Northwest (Seattle, Tacoma, Richland, Olympia and Portland for the past twelve years.
- Established a vibrant and informational website (www.onyxarts.org).
- Became a non-profit organization in 2010.
- Documentary filmed about Onyx by Seattle Channel 21 was nominated for the Northwest Regional Emmy Award in the arts/entertainment category (www.seattlechannel.org/videos/video.asp?ID=3170804).
- Increasing number of artwork being showcased.
- Established a retail gallery venue called "Gallery ONYX" in the Seattle Belltown neighborhood at 2407 1st Ave. Seattle, WA.

Onyx Successes (cont'd)



- Onyx was given the "Commitment to Diversity" award by African American Community Cultural & Educational Society and Washington State University during the Tri-Cities Martin Luther King Jr. Celebration. The award recognized the success of Onyx in establishing an artistic presence for artists of African descent in the Pacific Northwest.
- The number of artists identified for exhibits has increased from 10 to 155 in 12 years.
















Continued growth showcasing artists of African descent




