Oversight Structure and Functions

OPA – Investigation of misconduct

OIG – Professional oversight of management, operations, and policies

CPC - Community-based oversight including input of broad and diverse perspectives on policies and practices

What is Community-Based Oversight?

- Brings perspectives of Seattle communities and subject matter/technical experts to SPD proposals, policies, practices, and training
- Shares these perspectives with SPD and City officials and collaborates to help improve the effectiveness of SPD services
- Seeks balance among competing interests

Who is the Community?

- Everyone who lives or works in Seattle
- Those who use or provide Seattle police services
- People who feel their neighborhoods are underpoliced or over-policed
- Members of groups who are politically disconnected
- Racial, ethnic, LGBTQ, and other groups who historically have had challenging relationships with the police
- Advocates, activists, social service, business and faith leaders

Why is Community-Based Oversight Important?

- Builds trust and credibility
- Ensures range of perspectives is taken into account on significant issues
- Better ensures police services are delivered in line with community expectations
- Identifies patterns of misconduct, problematic deployment of police resources, and service, policy, and practice issues

What are CPC's goals?

- Create and steward a welcoming space for all community members to be involved, express diverse views, and seek improvements in policing
- Assist SPD in identifying issues and concerns from a community perspective, providing input to critical SPD proposals, policies, practices, and training before they are implemented
- Ensure SPD and the police accountability system are responsive to community expectations

What are CPC's goals?

- Engage effectively with those in the community who historically have been marginalized or disenfranchised
- Maintain respectful and productive relationships with other police oversight bodies and SPD
- Serve as a credible broker in bringing multiple perspectives to the table, focusing on problemsolving and consensus-building
