## **Education Action Plan – Process**

#### History

- Spring, 2016: 20 Community Conversations & on-line forums (>1,500 people)
- April 30, 2016: Mayor's Education Summit (>500 people)
- February 29 October 18, 2016: Education Advisory Group Convening
- November 17, 2016: Education Advisory Group Issues 19 Recommendations
- November 21, 2016: Mayor and Council adopt 2017 City budget with initial investments
- April 27, 2017: Mayor announced Education Action Plan with funding proposal



## **Education Action Plan – Vision & Goal**

#### Advisory Group's "North Star:"

#### **VISION**

A City-led and broad-based community effort will shape Seattle as a city where children of all races and ethnicities thrive and succeed.[...] By transforming our public education system, we change the course of Seattle children's futures and our own.

#### **GOAL**

Through targeted City, District, and other partnership investments across the education continuum, with specific emphasis on African-American/Black students and other students of color who have been historically underserved by the education system, postsecondary credential attainment for all SPS graduates shall rise to 70 percent by 2030.



# **Education Action Plan – Implementation Guidelines**

- I. All strategies and funding must be directly tied to eliminating educational disparities for African American/Black and children of color. The impacts and changes for these communities of color must be tracked and monitored.
- II. Ensure ongoing, authentic community, family, and student engagement.
- III. Continue a whole-child approach to the City's support for Seattle's children and families.
- IV. Engage community-based and cultural/language-based organizations to achieve outcomes for Seattle's students.
- V. Focus on systemic change through implementation of the recommendation strategies.



## Education Action Plan – Initial Investments

In the 2017 budget, Mayor and Council added funding consistent with the Advisory Group's draft recommendations, including funding for:

- Expanding the Families and Education Levy innovation school model in one high school.
- New Summer Learning with an emphasis on programs offering culturally specific and gender specific curriculum.
- Ensuring high school graduates remain engaged during the summer and successfully enroll in college.
- Expanding the Parent-child Home Program visitation program.
- Studying how to improve the quality of Family Child Care programs consistent with current research
- Expanding a Seattle Public Schools partnership for an elementary summer literacy program.
- Providing Executive function training in Middle Schools.
- Funding the non-tuition expenses of the Seattle Colleges 13<sup>th</sup> Year Scholarship Program.



#### **Overview**

- \$9.7M annually to implement Education Advisory Group Recommendations (ramped up over 2 years)
  - Promoting Family Engagement & Collaboration
  - Enhancing Before & After School STEM Opportunities
  - Expanding School-Based Mentoring
  - Reducing Disproportionality in Discipline

- Increasing Innovation School Investments
- Growing Summer Learning Programs
- Adding Workplace-Based Learning Programs
- Supporting Educator Workforce Diversity
- \$5M one-time investment for 13<sup>th</sup> Year program
- \$5.75M annually for Birth to 5 Year programs



# 1. Promoting Family Engagement and Collaboration - \$1.9M



 Investments to increase parents' ability to support their child's learning and educators' ability to engage parents

### 2. Enhancing Before & After School Opportunities - \$38K



 Increase wraparound programs outside of regular school hours, including STEM opportunities and partnerships



#### 3. Expanding School-Based Mentoring - \$469K



 Match a caring adult with every child who is struggling to keep up with school requirements

### 4. Reducing Disproportionality in Discipline - \$1.1M



 Provide students having issues in school with personalized case management, and train teachers and staff on how to reduce discipline disparities



### 5. Increasing Innovation School Investments - \$3.2M



 Expand the number of middle and high schools getting flexible funds – a model that asks the school to creatively meet the needs of their students

#### 6. Growing Summer Learning Programs - \$1.3M



 Provide students with additional time to catch up with peers, free and nutritious meals, and high quality enrichment experiences



### 7. Adding Workplace-Based Learning Programs - \$1.1M



 Foster post-secondary success and workplace preparedness by providing stipends for students to experience career opportunities

## 8. Supporting Educator Workforce Diversity - \$456K



• Create opportunities for more instructional assistants to earn teaching certificates, increasing diversity among the teacher corps



### 9. Expanding Birth to 5 Year Investments - \$5.7M



 Build on existing Pre-K investments by expanding programs to care for and prepare children with social and academic skills, setting them up for academic success in school

## 10. 13<sup>th</sup> Year Investment - \$5M (one-time)



 Funding will help build an endowment to expand first year scholarship and tuition assistance at Seattle Colleges for graduates from Seattle Public High Schools



# Education Action Plan – Ongoing Partnership

We are working to establish a cross-sector partnership/collaboration of City, District, education stakeholders, business, philanthropy, students, parents and community based organizations to facilitate implementation of Education Advisory Group recommendations. The charge of the group will include:

- Researching best practices on collective impact collaboration models in education;
- Coordinating learning/listening site visits to explore other jurisdictions' best practices and successfully implemented collaboration models;
- Development of a strategic plan that provides rationale, structure, scope and grounding for the work/partnership;
- Setting clearly defined roles and responsibilities for those involved in the work; and
- Adopting an outcomes-based framework with measurable goals and defined systems and structures
