






About The Survey

- 423 respondents

- Survey conducted in English, Chinese, and Vietnamese
 online and via paper surveys


Demographics: Gender




Demographics: Primary Language



Demographics: Age




Demographics: CID Affiliation






Perceptions of CID Safety Are Improving

2016 "Streets and public areas in the CID are safer than they were one-year ago"





Many Trust the Police



But Trust in Police is Conditional



Interestingly, those whose primary language was not English, trusted police officers more often. However, those who were proficient in speaking English trusted police more often than those whose English proficiency was limited or could not speak English at all.

Perceptions of Neighborhood Cleanliness Improving







Many Do Not Report Crimes






Top Reasons for Not Reporting Crimes

- The respondent believed the police would not follow up.
 - The respondent did not want to get involved.
 - The respondent thought the police couldn't do anything.

Stress Related to Perceived Lack of Safety

"I feel anxiety or stress because I feel unsafe going outside in the CID."





Continue to focus on efforts to support community / Seattle Police Department relations

- Perceptions of neighborhood safety are improving

Continue to support trainings related to emergency preparedness, education around mental health and chemical dependency in the CID

Continue to support street cleaning and coordination for sanitation contracts in the CID.
