8	WHEREAS, the Urban Forestry Commission was created by Ordinance 123052 in 2009; and
9	WHEREAS, the Commission currently has nine highly technical members and a Get Engaged

1	WHEREAS, the Commission would benefit from environmental justice, public health, and
2	community and neighborhood perspectives; and
3	WHEREAS, these new perspectives would complement the highly technical expertise in the

15	WHEREAS, the three new positions would help increase diversity among Commission members
6	encouraging inclusion of underrepresented communities; NOW, THEREFORE,
7	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:
8	Section 1. Section 3.72.020 of the Seattle Municipal Code, last amended by Ordinance
9	124671, is amended as follows:

21	A. The Commission is comprised of ((ten)) 13 members:
22	1. A wildlife biologist, preferably with expertise in ornithology (Position ((#))1);
23	2. An urban ecologist, preferably with expertise in the field of restoration ecology

25	3. A representative of a local, state, or federal natural resource agency or an
26	accredited university (Position ((#))3);

1	4. A hydrologist or similar professional, preferably with expertise in the study of
2	natural drainage, climate or air quality, or a combination thereof (Position ((#))4);
3	5. An arborist, with one or more of the following qualifications:

5	the International Society of Arboriculture; or
6	b. Certification by the American Society of Consulting Arborists; or
7	c. Background and experience in Tree Risk Assessment from a
8	credentializing agency or a professional organization.

0	6. A landscape architect, with certification from the International Society of
1	Arboriculture (Position ((#-))6);
12	7. A representative of a non-profit or non-governmental organization whose
13	mission is to advocate for preservation or enhancement of urban forests, wildlife habitat, or
14	similar natural systems (Position ((#))7);
15	8. A representative of either the development community, including
16	developers, builders, architects, or realtors, with experience in projects developed under
17	Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED), or a representative from a non-city
18	utility (Position ((#))8);
19	9. An economist, financial analyst, Washington State licensed real estate broker
20	or any other similar professional, with expertise preferred in land use planning, environmental
21	planning, or either residential or commercial development ((-)) (Position ((#))9); ((and,))
22	10. A designated young adult position in accordance with Chapter 3.51 ((-))

1	11. An environmental justice representative, with understanding or experience
2	developing policies or programs in either environmental justice or race and social justice; and
3	who has experience or understands community engagement and community-led processes

5	12. A public health representative, with experience in behavioral health,
6	environmental health, epidemiology, or providing direct services to individuals or families; or
7	experience implementing activities that promote health and access to health care in Seattle
8	communities; or has experience helping neighborhoods and schools become places that nurture
9	health and well-being for Seattle residents (Position 12); and
10	13. A community/neighborhood representative from an underrepresented group in
11	the environmental field, including communities of color, immigrants, refugees, low-income, and
12	youth, who is able to display strong and regular connection to the community and interest in the
13	natural environment, especially trees and the benefits they provide (Position 13).
14	Section 2. Section 3.72.030 of the Seattle Municipal Code, last amended by Ordinance
15	124671, is amended as follows:
16	3.72.030 The Commission – Appointment and ((Term)) term
17	All positions are numbered ((one)) $\underline{1}$ through ((ten)) $\underline{13}$. Individuals shall be appointed into those
18	numbered positions. Members in ((odd numbered positions from position one to position seven))
19	positions 1, 3, 5, 7, 11, and 13 shall be appointed by a majority vote of the Council. Individuals
20	in ((even numbered)) positions ((from position two to position eight)) 2, 4, 6, 8, and 12 ((to
21	position eight)) shall be appointed by the Mayor, subject to confirmation by a majority vote of
22	the City Council. Position ((nine)) 9 shall be appointed by a majority vote of the members ((in

positions one through eight)). Position ((ten)) 10 shall be appointed in the manner provided for in ((section)) Section 3.51.030. ((For the initial round of appointments, the positions will be staggered: position one, two and nine shall serve one-year terms, positions four, five and six shall serve two-year terms and positions three, seven, eight shall serve three-year terms. At the conclusion of the initial term of each appointment, all subsequent terms of each position shall be for three years and the term of 1/3 of the positions shall expire each year. Persons)) All terms shall be for three years, renewable for one additional three-year term, except that persons appointed to position ((ten)) 10 shall serve for a one year, non-renewable term. All terms shall expire on March 31. A Commission member whose term has expired shall continue to hold office until a successor has been appointed and qualified. No members shall serve more than two consecutive terms. For purposes of calculating consecutive terms, serving any part of a term counts as a serving a term. Any vacancy for an unexpired term shall be filled in the same manner as for an original appointment under this ((section)) Section 3.72.030.

1	Section 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force 30 days after its approval by					
2	the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten days after presentation, it					
3	shall take effect as provided by Seattle Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.
