1. BILL SUMMARY

a. Legislation Title:

AN ORDINANCE relating to the regulation of marijuana businesses; amending Sections 6.500.020, 6.500.030, 6.500.040, 6.500.050, 6.500.060, 6.500.070, 6.500.080, 6.500.110, 6.500.160, and 6.500.170 of the Seattle Municipal Code; adding a new Section 6.500.143 to the Seattle Municipal Code; and ratifying and confirming certain prior acts.

b. **Summary and background of the Legislation:** In 2015, Ordinance 124807 was enacted by the Mayor and City Council adding Chapter 6.500 to the Seattle Municipal Code, creating a marijuana regulatory business license and accompanying regulations that created a civil regulatory system that allowed for the full transition of the unregulated marijuana industry to a regulated system.

Since 2015 there have been several updates to state law that have affected items such as signage for marijuana retail establishments and minor access requirements which require amendments to provisions of Chapter 6.500. Other amendments are advisable to provide clarity, improve facilitation and compliance, and allow for effective application and enforcement of Chapter 6.500.

Communities of color have been historically prosecuted in a higher proportion for marijuanarelated crimes than their white counterparts. This legislation allows for the continued use of civil remedies to enforce violations of marijuana laws as opposed to criminal law to ease that disparity. Further, this legislation will allow for civil enforcement against unlicensed marijuana establishments that have tended to open in lower income or more ethnically diverse neighborhoods which has put an unfair burdens on those communities.
