The City of Seattle is committed to being a safe, vibrant, interconnected, and affordable city for all.

Week Overview

The rapid pace of this session continued into the third week as the Legislature shifted its focus from bill introduction to moving bills through committees. Though bill introduction has slowed, between all of the prefiled bills, the reintroduced bills from last year, and the newly introduced bills from 2018, there are over 3,700 bills currently alive. This number will drop significantly once we pass the House of Origin policy cutoff on February 2nd. After this date, bills that have not been heard and passed by their respective policy committee in their house of origin, will not longer be considered unless they are deemed necessary to implement the budget (NTIB).

Priority Areas

Homelessness & Housing

Accessory Dwelling Units: <u>HB 2503</u>, sponsored by Rep. Vick, allows certain local governments to allow development and placement of accessory apartments within or outside Urban Growth Areas. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Community Development, Housing & Tribal Affairs on January 23rd. It is scheduled for executive session on either January 30th, January 31st, or February 1st.

Affordable Housing Development: HB 1797, sponsored by Rep. McBride, allows cities to apply for a one-time remittance of 4.37 percent of the state sales and use tax on public purchases for affordable housing development or public infrastructure to support such development, allows the governing body of a county with a population over 1.5 million and the cities within such county to authorize the existing 0.1 percent local sales and use tax used for mental health services and affordable housing, and allows revenue from the local real estate excise tax to be used for affordable housing development through 2022, so long as other local capital projects have adequate funding. It was placed on second reading by Rules Committee on January 16th.

Affordable Housing Investments: <u>HB 2437</u>, sponsored by Rep. Robinson, authorizes the governing body of a county to impose a local sales tax, credited against the state sales tax, for affordable or supportive housing. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Finance on January 16th.

Condominium Bylaws: <u>SB 6001</u>, sponsored by Sen. Keiser, provides an alternative process for acquiring and counting votes to amend condominium bylaws, requires notice of a vote to owners who

fail to vote and subtracts the number of unreturned ballots from the total number of unit owners before applying the minimum percentage required to amend. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Law & Justice on January 25th and is scheduled for executive session on February 1st.

Density Plans: SB 6077, sponsored by Sen. Palumbo, concerns minimum density standards for comprehensive plans adopted by cities and sets a minimum density standard of no less than six dwelling units per acre for areas designated as residential in an urban growth area. SB 6077 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Local Government on January 11th.

Facilities Financing: HB 2364/SB 6371, sponsored by Rep. Ryu and Sen. Mullet, concerns facilities financing by the housing finance commission (HFC). The bill increases the Housing Finance Commission's debt limit from \$6 billion to \$8 billion and expands the organizations eligible for lower-cost financing through the HFC's Nonprofit Facilities Program. HB 2364 was voted out of the House Committee on Community Development, Housing & Tribal Affairs on January 16th and is scheduled for a hearing in the House Capital Budget Committee on January 30th and executive action on February 2nd. SB 6371 has been passed to Rules for second reading as of January 26th.

Housing Opportunity Zones: SB 6417, sponsored by Sen. Palumbo, creates a voluntary pilot program for cities and counties to establish housing opportunity zones in order to enable and encourage compact and efficient development within a one-half mile distance around transit facilities. It has been scheduled for public hearing in the Senate Committee on Local Government on January 30th.

Property Tax Exemptions: HB 1532/SB 5143, sponsored by Rep. Lytton and Sen. Zeiger, concerns the exemption of property taxes for nonprofit homeownership development by specifying that land that is to be leased for 99 years or life to a low-income household qualifies for the exemption. HB 1532 was voted out of the House Committee on Finance on January 19th and has been referred to the Rules Committee. SB 5143 passed the Senate on January 24th and received 41 yeas and 8 nays.

<u>SB 6242</u>, sponsored by Sen. Braun, authorizes a \$100,000 assessed value homestead exemption for state property taxes, subject to approval by the voters of a constitutional amendment. It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Ways & Means on January 25th.

SB 6251, sponsored by Sen. Dhingra, modifies the qualifying income thresholds for the property tax exemption and deferral programs for low-income senior citizens, individuals with disabilities, and veterans, beginning in calendar year 2020. It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Ways & Means on January 25th.

<u>HB 2597/SB 6314</u>, sponsored by Sen. Dhingra and Rep. Sullivan, extends the existing state property tax exemption for residences of senior citizens and disabled persons to local regular property taxes. HB 2597 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Finance on January 23rd.

<u>SB 6361</u>, sponsored by Sen. Billig, allows the governing authority of certain cities to adopt a local property tax exemption program, under which qualifying new construction is exempt from local property tax for ten years. It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Economic Development & International Trade on January 25th.

<u>SJR 8212</u>, sponsored by Sen. Braun, amends the Constitution to authorize the creation of a homestead exemption for state property taxes. It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Ways & Means on January 25th.

Homeless Housing Surcharge: <u>HB 1570</u>, sponsored by Rep. Macri, concerns access to homeless housing and assistance and provides that the temporary document recording fee \$40 housing and assistance surcharge be made permanent. It also allows counties to charge and retain an additional surcharge for homeless housing and assistance. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Appropriations on January 17th and executive action was taken on January 22nd. It has been placed on second reading.

Housing Opportunity Zones: HB 2711, sponsored by Rep. Ryu, creates a process for the designation and development of Housing Opportunity Zones (HOZs), exempts certain developments within HOZs from certain development regulations and fees, allows jurisdictions to request reimbursement of development fees and certain other costs, and allows residential development within HOZs to qualify for local multifamily property tax exemptions. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Community Development, Housing & Tribal Affairs on January 18th and has been scheduled for executive session on February 1st.

Notice of Termination of Tenancies: HB 2040/SB 5408, sponsored by Rep. Frame and Sen. Cleveland, extends the required notice period for termination of a periodic tenancy. HB 2040 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Judiciary on January 10th. SB 5408 was placed on second reading by the Rules Committee on January 25th.

Real Estate Excise Tax Exemption: <u>HB 2444</u>, sponsored by Rep. Slatter, provides a real estate excise tax exemption for the transfer of a qualified low-income housing development or controlling interest in a qualified low-income housing development. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Finance on January 16th.

Rental Fires: SB 6473/HB 2864, sponsored by Sen. Liias and Rep. Eslick, directs the state fire marshal to convene a task force of stakeholders to investigate ways to prevent fire deaths in rental dwellings and report findings and recommendations to the Legislature by December 1, 2019. It received a public hearing and executive action in the Senate Committee on Financial Institutions & Insurance on January 23rd and has been referred to the Ways and Means committee on January 24th. HB 2864 has been scheduled for a public hearing and executive session in the House Committee on Local Government on January 30th.

Rent Regulation: <u>HB 2583/SB 6400</u>, sponsored by Rep. Macri and Sen. Saldaña, repeals provisions that prohibit towns, cities, and counties from enacting, maintaining, or enforcing ordinances which regulate the amount of rent to be charged for single-family or multiple-unit residential rental structures. HB 2583 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Judiciary on January 23rd. SB 6400 has been scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Financial Institutions & Insurance on January 30th.

REET: <u>SB 6490</u>, sponsored by Sen. Takko, removes a provision requiring voter approval before a county choosing to plan under the Growth Management Act (GMA) and cities within those counties may impose additional real estate excise taxes (REET II). It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Local Government on January 23rd and executive action on January 25th. It has been passed to the Rules Committee for second reading.

Restrictive Covenants: <u>SB 6379/SB 2674</u>, sponsored by Sen. Fain, clarifies that a local government wishing to remove a restrictive covenant from land it owns need not first hold a public hearing unless

the restrictive covenant is recorded. SB 6379 received a public hearing and executive action in the Senate Committee on Local Government on January 23rd and was passed to the Rules Committee on January 25th. HB 2674 received a public hearing the House Committee on Local Government on January 26th and executive session on January 30th.

Single Family Housing: <u>HB 2480</u>, sponsored by Rep. McBride, allows a county or city to establish a program to exempt property taxes for up to 12 years on portions of single family properties that provide affordable housing to low income tenants. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Community Development, Housing & Tribal Affairs on January 23rd and executive session on January 25th.

Source of Income: SB 5407/HB 1633, sponsored by Sen. Frockt and Rep. Riccelli, concerns the preservation of housing options for tenants and prohibits landlords from refusing to rent property, expelling tenants, discriminating, or discouraging a rental to a tenant based on their source of income. The bill also creates a landlord mitigation program in the Department of Commerce allowing landlords to seek reimbursement for repairs of documented damages to qualifying rental units. SB 5407 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Financial Institutions & Insurance on January 11th and executive action on January 25th. HB 1633 has been referred to the House Committee on Judiciary. Rep. Riccelli also introduced an additional source of income bill, HB 2578, which received a public hearing in the House Committee on Judiciary on January 23rd and has been scheduled for executive session on February 1st.

Surplus Property: <u>HB 2382</u>, sponsored by Rep. Ryu, promotes the use of surplus public property for public benefit. The bill was voted out of the House Committee on Community Development, Housing & Tribal Affairs on January 18th and received a public hearing in the House Committee on Capital Budget on January 23rd. It is scheduled for executive session on January 30th or February 2nd.

Safety Net & Civil Rights

Ban the Box/Fair Chance Act: The Washington Fair Chance Act, <u>SB 6110</u> and <u>HB 1298</u>, sponsored by Sen. Saldaña and Rep. Ortiz-Self, prohibits employers from making inquiries related to criminal records until after initially determining the applicant is qualified for the position. It also prohibits ads or policies excluding applicants with criminal records and authorizes the attorney general to enforce the Act and provides penalties. SB 6110 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Labor & Commerce on January 10th and passed out of committee on January 22nd. It is scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Ways & Means on January 30th. HB 1298 passed out of the House Committee on Labor & Workplace Standards on January 9th and has been placed on second reading.

Civil Service Qualifications: SB 6145, sponsored by Sen. Saldaña, changes the civil service qualification for police officers, fire departments, and county sheriff departments by expanding who can apply for a position to include a lawful permanent resident. SB 6145 received a public in the Senate Committee on Labor and Commerce on January 18th and passed out of committee on January 22nd. It has been passed to the Rules Committee for second reading.

Equal Pay: The Equal Pay Act, <u>HB 1506</u> and <u>SB 5140</u>, sponsored by Rep. Senn and Sen. Cleveland, prohibits discrimination in providing employment opportunities based on gender and prohibits retaliation for certain workplace discussions about wages and other matters. HB 1506 was voted out of the House on January 17th with a 69 - 28 vote count and has been referred to the Senate Committee on Labor & Commerce. SB 5140 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Labor

Commerce on January 10th and passed out of committee on January 22nd. It has been passed to the Rules Committee for second reading.

Family in Need of Services: SB 6467, sponsored by Sen. Darneille, creates a families in need of services (FINS) petition model that replaces and merges the at-risk youth (ARY) and child in need of services (CHINS) petition model, while expanding the definition of petitioner to include a youth, parent, or other suitable adult. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Human Services & Corrections on January 22nd and has been scheduled for a public hearing on January 30th.

HEN Entitlement: SB 6116, sponsored by Sen. Darneille, provides that the Essential Needs and Housing Support Program (HEN) is an entitlement, removes a mandate that individuals who are homeless or are at substantial risk of losing stable housing receive HEN services before other eligible individuals receive services, removes language that would allow a support entity to refuse to provide HEN services to a person referred to the entity, requires the Department of Social and Health Services and Department of Commerce to conduct a study to determine the appropriate benefit amount for persons eligible to receive HEN or aged, blind, or disabled (ABD) assistance program services. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Human Services & Corrections on January 17th and passed out of Committee on January 24th. It has now been referred to the Senate Committee on Ways & Means.

HEN Expansion: HB 2667/SB 6502, sponsored by Rep. Macri and Sen. Dhingra, expands eligibility for referrals to the Essential Needs and Housing Support (HEN) program to include recipients of the Aged, Blind, or Disabled cash assistance program and requires information sharing of limited recipient data between the Department of Social and Health Services, the Department of Commerce, and HEN providers. HB 2667 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Early Learning & Human Services on January 17th and was voted out on January 19th. It has now been referred to the House Committee on Appropriations. SB 6502 is scheduled for public hearing in the Senate Committee on Human Services & Corrections on January 29th.

I-200 Repeal: SB 6406, sponsored by Sen. Chase, repeals the 1998 Initiative 200 (I-200) language regarding discrimination and preferential treatment in the operation of public employment, education, or contracting. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on State Government, Tribal Relations & Elections on January 26th and has been scheduled for executive action on January 31st.

Keep Washington Working Act: SB 5689/HB 1985, sponsored by Sen. Wellman and Rep. Ortiz-Self, establishes a statewide policy supporting Washington state's economy and immigrants' role in the workplace. The bill enacts the Keep Washington Working Act and establishes a Steering Committee, requires the Attorney General to publish model policies for limiting immigration enforcement to the fullest extent possible consistent with the law, restricts the use of state resources to assist in unconstitutional or illegal registration or surveillance programs or any other unconstitutional or illegal laws, rules, or policies targeting Washington residents on the basis of race, religion, immigration, or citizenship status, or national or ethnic origin, and restricts agencies and other departments from using their resources or transferring or detaining an individual to federal immigration authorities absent a proper warrant. SB 5689 was voted out of the Senate Committee on Labor & Commerce on January 17th and has been scheduled for public hearing in the Senate Committee on Ways & Means on January 30th.

Occupational Disease: <u>SB 6213/HB 2633</u>, sponsored by Sen. Ranker and Rep. Doglio, adds medical conditions to the presumption and extending the presumption to certain publicly employed firefighters

and investigators and law enforcement. SB 6213 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Labor & Workplace Standards on January 15th and January 17th, and was then passed out of Committee on January 24th. It has been passed to the Rules Committee for second reading. HB 2633 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Labor & Workplace Standards on January 15th and was passed out of committee on January 23rd. It has been referred to the House Committee on Appropriations.

Posttraumatic Stress: SB 6214, sponsored by Sen. Conway, allows industrial insurance coverage for posttraumatic stress disorders affecting law enforcement officers and firefighters. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Labor & Commerce on January 15th and January 17th and was then passed out of committee on January 24th. It has now been passed to the Rules Committee for second reading.

Public Defense: HB 2687, sponsored by Rep. Frame, phases in state reimbursement of county and city public defense costs by 2028, requires the Office of Public Defense (OPD) to disburse appropriated funds, establish policies for the distribution of funds, and monitor trial-level public defense services to determine eligibility for reimbursement and repeals the county formulas for the OPD public defense services grant program. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Judiciary on January 24th and has been scheduled for executive session on February 1st.

Sexual Harassment: SB 5996, sponsored by Sen. Keiser, prohibits an employer from requiring an employee, as a condition of employment, to sign a nondisclosure agreement that prevents the employee from disclosing sexual harassment or sexual assault, provides that any nondisclosure agreement that has the purpose or effect of preventing an employee from disclosing or discussing sexual harassment or sexual assault is void and unenforceable, and provides that it is an unfair practice under the Washington Law Against Discrimination (WLAD) for an employer to retaliate against an employee for disclosing or discussing sexual harassment or sexual assault. The bill received a public hearing a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Labor & Commerce on January 24th and has been scheduled for executive action on January 29th.

<u>SB 6313</u>, sponsored by Sen. Keiser, provides that certain employment agreements are void and unenforceable unless they preserve the employee's right to file a sexual harassment or sexual assault complaint in a court of competent jurisdiction and with the appropriate state or federal agency. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Labor & Commerce on January 24th.

Voting Rights: HB 1800, sponsored by Sen. Gregerson, enacts the Washington voting rights act by establishing a state voting rights act that seeks to protect the equal opportunity for minority groups to participate in local elections, creates a cause of action and authorizes courts to order appropriate remedies for a violation of the act, including redistricting within a political subdivision and authorizes local governments to change their election system to remedy violations of the act. The bill was voted out of the House Committee on State Government, Elections & Information Technology on January 16th and has been placed on second reading by the Rules Committee.

SB 6002, sponsored by Sen. Saldaña, enacts the Washington voting rights act of 2018. SB 6002 creates a state voting rights act to protect the equal opportunity for minority groups to participate in local elections and elect candidates of choice, creates a cause of action and authorizes courts to order appropriate remedies for a violation of the voting rights act, including redistricting within a political subdivision and authorizes local governments to change their election systems to remedy potential violations of the act. The bill was voted off the Senate floor with a 29 - 19 vote count. It has moved

to the House for consideration where it has received a public hearing in the House Committee on State Government, Elections & Information Technology on January 26th.

Wrongful Death: HB 2262/SB 6015, sponsored by Rep. Santos and Sen. Hasegawa, concerns actions for wrongful injury or death and makes a number of changes to statutes governing wrongful death and survival causes of action, including changes to the beneficiaries entitled to recoveries and the damages that may be recovered under these actions. HB 2262 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Judiciary on January 11th and has been scheduled for executive action on February 1st. SB 6015 received a public hearing on January 18th in the Senate Committee on Law & Justice and executive action on January 25th. It has been scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Ways & Means on January 31st.

Health Care

Opioid Treatment and Prevention: <u>HB 2489/SB 6150</u>, requested by Governor Inslee and sponsored by Sen. Cleveland and Rep. Cody, modifies the protocols for using medication-assisted treatment for opioid use disorder, requires the Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS), the Health Care Authority (HCA), and the Department of Health (DOH) to partner on initiatives that promote a statewide approach in addressing opioid use disorder, permits the Secretary of Health to issue a standing order for opioid reversal medication and establishes new requirements for how electronic health records integrate with the prescription monitoring program (PMP) and how PMP data can be used. HB 2489 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Health Care & Wellness on January 19th. It is scheduled for executive session on January 31st or February 2nd. SB 6150 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Health & Long Term Care on January 15th.

Substance Disorder Treatment: <u>HB 2572</u>, sponsored by Rep. Cody, prohibits state health plans, private insurance plans, and behavioral health organizations from establishing prior authorization requirements for substance use disorder treatment and mandates coverage for up to 14 days of acute treatment and clinical stabilization services for substance use disorders. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Health Care & Wellness on January 19th and is scheduled for executive session on January 31st or February 2nd.

Opioid Prescriptions: <u>HB 2272/SB 6050</u>, requested by the Attorney General and sponsored by Rep. Cody and Sen. Cleveland, concerns restrictions on prescriptions for opiates and provides that practitioners prescribing an opiate to a patient for the first time for outpatient use may only issue a prescription for no more than a seven-day supply for patients twenty-one years and older and a three-day supply for those under twenty-one. HB 2272 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Health Care & Wellness on January 12th. SB 6050 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Health & Long Term Care on January 15th.

Prescription Monitoring Program: HB 2325/SB 6028, requested by the Attorney General and sponsored by Rep. Riccelli and Sen. Van De Wege, requires practitioners prescribing an opiate or benzodiazepine to review the patient's controlled substance history in the prescription monitoring program. HB 2325 was voted out of the House Committee on Health Care & Wellness on January 12th. SB 6028 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Health & Long Term Care on January 15th.

<u>HB 2501</u>, sponsored by Rep. Caldier, requires that the prescription monitoring program (PMP) be integrated with all federally-certified health record technologies and directs the Department of Health

to establish a technical assistance program to help health care providers and facilities attempting to access the PMP. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Health Care & Wellness on January 19th.

Claims-Based Reinsurance Program: HB 2355/SB 6062, requested by the Insurance Commissioner and sponsored by Rep. Cody and Sen. Cleveland, establishes a claims-based reinsurance program in Washington, including parameters for collecting assessments from health carriers and third-party administrators, and for providing reinsurance payments to eligible health carriers and third party administrators. HB 2355 was voted out of the House Committee on Health Care & Wellness on January 16th and has been placed on second reading. SB 6062 was voted out of the Senate Committee on Health & Long Term Care on January 23rd and then voted out of the Senate Committee on Ways & Means on January 25th.

Community Healthcare Workers: <u>HB 2436</u>, sponsored by Rep. Robinson, defines community health worker and the ten roles of community health workers. The bill received public hearing in the House Committee on Health Care & Wellness on January 16th and was substituted on January 23rd when it received executive action.

Conversion Therapy: SB 5722, sponsored by Sen, Liias, restricts the practice of conversion therapy and makes it unprofessional conduct for a licensed health care provider to perform conversion therapy on a patient under the age of 18. SB 5722 passed out of the Senate on January 19th with a 32 - 16 vote count. Now in the House, it has been referred to the Committee on Health Care and Wellness.

Preventive Services Coverage: <u>HB 1523</u>, sponsored by Rep June Robinson, requires health plans to cover, with no cost sharing, all preventive services required to be covered under federal law as of December 31, 2016. HB 1523 is currently on the Hour Floor calendar.

Essential Coverage: SB 6084, sponsored by Sen. Cleveland, requires residents of Washington, unless exempted, to ensure that they and any of their dependents maintain minimum essential health care coverage for each month. It also provides categories of individuals that are exempted from the maintenance of minimum essential coverage requirement and defines what types of coverage constitute minimum essential coverage. SB 6084 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Health & Long Term Care on January 9th and was passed out of committee on January 23rd. It has been passed to the Rules Committee of second reading.

Individual Market Access: <u>HB 2408</u>, sponsored by Rep. Cody, requires a health carrier offering a health plan approved by the School Employees' Benefits Board to offer a qualified health plan in counties where no qualified health plans are offered on the Health Benefit Exchange and reduces the premiums for enrollees in the Washington Health Insurance Pool in counties where there is no other individual market coverage available. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Health Care & Wellness on January 17th and has been scheduled for executive session on January 31st or February 2nd.

LGBTQ Long-term Care: SB 5700, sponsored by Sen. Ranker, requires training for long-term care providers on the needs of the LGBTQ population. The bill was moved out of the Senate Committee on Health & Long Term Care on January 16th and has been placed on second reading by the Rules Committee.

Medicaid Access: SB 6304/HB 2660, sponsored by Sen. Frockt and Rep. Stonier, aligns the income eligibility standards for the Apple Health for Kids program (Program) with the current federal standards and removes requirements that funds must be specifically appropriated for the Program. SB 6304 was voted out of the Senate Committee on Health & Long Term Care on January 25th and has been referred to the Ways & Means Committee. HB 2660 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Appropriations on January 24th.

Tobacco Use Age: HB 1054/SB 6048, requested by the Attorney General and the Department of Health, and sponsored by Rep Harris and Sen. Kuderer, raises the age at which a person may purchase and possess cigarettes, tobacco, and vapor products from 18- to 21-years of age and requires licensed retailers to display signs stating the age restriction for purchasing tobacco or vapor products. HB 1054 was voted out of House Finance this past week and is currently in Rules. SB 6048 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Health & Long Term Care on January 22nd.

Ecig taxation: <u>HB 2165</u>, sponsored by Rep Harris, imposes a 60 percent tax on vapor cartridges and "e-liquid.", creates the Essential Public Health Services Account, and authorizes the Governor to enter into vapor products taxation compacts with federally recognized Indian tribes and establishes requirements for such compacts. The bill passed out of House Finance on January 23rd and was sent to Appropriations.

Education

Basic Education Provisions: There were a suite of bills modifying the education bill from the 2017 session, HB 2242, which received a hearing on Monday January 22nd. These bills include: <u>SB 6362</u> sponsored by Sen. Wellman, <u>SB 6397</u> sponsored by Sen. Hunt, and <u>SB 6483</u> sponsored by Sen. Conway.

Breakfast After the Bell: <u>HB 1508</u>, sponsored by Rep. Stonier, promotes student health and readiness through meal and nutrition programs by requiring qualifying high-needs schools, beginning in the 2018-19 school year and until June 30, 2027, to offer breakfast after the bell programs to students after the beginning of the school day. The bill was voted off the House floor on January 10th with a 83 - 15 vote count. In the Senate, HB 1508 has been voted out of the Ways & Means Committee and passed to the Rules Committee for second reading.

<u>SB 6003</u>, sponsored by Sen. Wellman, concerns breakfast after the bell programs in certain public schools and requires high-needs schools to offer breakfast after the bell to each student beginning in the 2019-20 school year and only in years in which funding is specifically provided in a budget. The bill was voted off the Senate floor on January 19th with a 40 - 8 vote count and has been referred to the House Committee on Education.

Childcare Subsidy: SB 6100, sponsored by Sen. Ranker, allows individuals participating in higher education programs, including public or private four-year colleges or universities, to be eligible for Working Connections Child Care (WCCC) benefits and provides that these individuals do not need to work as a condition of receiving WCCC benefits. It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Early Learning & K-12 Education on January 23rd.

CTC Academic Employee Collective Bargaining: <u>SB 5993</u>, sponsored by Sen. Keiser, authorizes boards of trustees of community and technical colleges to provide additional compensation to academic

employees that exceeds the amount or percentage established by the Legislature. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Labor & Commerce on January 15th. It passed out of committee on January 24th and was referred to Ways & Means.

Early Learning Levy: <u>HB 2898</u>, sponsored by Rep. Kagi, authorizes school districts to levy an additional enrichment levy of up to \$0.25 per \$1,000 of assessed property value to support high quality early learning programs. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Early Learning & Human Services on January 26th and has been scheduled for executive action on January 30th.

ECEAP Eligibility: <u>HB 2659</u>, sponsored by Rep. Goodman, modifies the family income limit for Early Childhood Education and Assistance Program (ECEAP) eligibility from 110 percent of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) to 185 percent of FPL, adds prioritization criteria for ECEAP enrollment, and phases in biennial funding and extends the date for full statewide implementation of ECEAP from the 2022-23 school year to the 2028-29 school year. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Early Learning & Human Services on January 26th and is scheduled for executive action on January 30th.

Financial Aid and DACA students: SB 5074, sponsored by Sen. Frockt, aligns residency requirements for certain state financial aid programs and includes individuals granted Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) status, if they meet other statutory requirements, under the term resident student, as well as establishes the term nonresident student does not pertain to certain visa holders that meet other statutory requirements regarding residency. The bill was passed out of the Senate on January 24th with 38 yeas and 11 nays and has been referred to the House Committee on Education on January 26th.

<u>HB 1488</u>, sponsored by Rep. Hansen, expands higher education opportunities for certain students by allowing students who qualify for resident tuition under the "1079" category to be eligible for the College Bound Scholarship program. HB 1488 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Higher Education and was substituted in executive session on January 24th. It has now been referred to the House Committee on Appropriations.

Hunger-Free Student's Bill of Rights: HB 2610, sponsored by Rep. Peterson, requires schools to provide a meal that qualifies for federal reimbursement to students requesting a meal regardless of the students' ability to pay, prohibits schools and districts from publicly identifying or stigmatizing a student who cannot pay for a school meal, and requires local liaisons for homeless students to coordinate with the applicable school nutrition program to ensure that each homeless student has proper access to free school meals. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Education on January 15th and was passed out of committee on January 25th.

Landmarked Schools: SB 5805, sponsored by Sen. Frockt, concerns the application of landmark or historic preservation regulations and provides that school district property in districts with more than 50,000 students is subject to state and local landmark or historic preservation regulations only to the extent explicitly approved by the school district board of directors. The bill requires the school district board of directors to consult with relevant state and local landmark or historic preservation authorities. SB 5805 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Early Learning & K-12 Education on January 11th.

Lunch Co-Pays: <u>HB 2712</u>, sponsored by Rep. Gregerson, eliminates lunch copays for students who qualify for reduced-price lunches under the National School Lunch Program. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Appropriations on January 24th.

Puget Sound Taxpayer Accountability Account: <u>HB 2488/SB 6306</u>, sponsored by Rep. Sullivan and Sen. Frockt, allows counties to use funding distributed from the Puget Sound Taxpayer Accountability Account for facilities to improve educational outcomes, in addition to educational services. HB 2488 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Appropriations on January 24th. SB 6306 has been scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Transportation on January 31st.

Opioid Medications: HB 2390/SB 6469, sponsored by Rep. Pollet and Sen. Palumbo, allows kindergarten through twelfth grade (K-12) schools to obtain, maintain, and administer opioid overdose medication through a standing order from a health care practitioner for the purpose of assisting a person at risk of experiencing an opioid related overdose. The bill includes provisions related to K-12 school opioid-overdose policies, staff trainings, and liability. It also requires certain public institutions of higher education to develop plans for the maintenance and administration of opioid overdose medication in and around the residence halls. HB 2390 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Education on January 16th and executive action on January 25th. SB 6469 has been referred to the Senate Committee on Health & Long Term Care but has not received any action.

Washington Promise: HB 1840/SB 5666, sponsored by Rep. Pollet and Sen. Frockt, establishes the Washington Promise Program to provide free community and technical college tuition and fees to eligible students. No action has been taken on either of these bill since in 2018.

Public Safety

Closing Loopholes: On January 23rd, the Senate Law and Justice Committee held a hearing on three bills that would help keep firearms away from people who are at risk of harming themselves or other people. SB 6297, sponsored by Sen. Dhingra, allows restriction of firearm possession by people who have been found incompetent to stand trial and who have a history of one or more violent acts. SB 6298, sponsored by Sen. Dhingra, adds domestic violence harassment to the list of offenses for which a person is prohibited from possessing a firearm. And SB 5441 allows the temporary restriction of firearm rights for individuals detained for 72 hours under the mental health involuntary treatment act. SB 6297 and 6298 have been scheduled for executive session on January 30th. SB 5441 has been scheduled for executive session on February 1st.

Domestic Violence: HB 2457, sponsored by Rep. Goodman, specifies timeframes for which domestic violence no-contact orders entered as a condition sentence remain in effect and extends the maximum time that a superior court may suspend a non-felony domestic violence sentence to five years. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Public Safety on January 15th and January 25th, when it was also voted out of Committee.

DNA Samples: HB 2331, sponsored by Rep. Orwall, addresses the collection of DNA biological samples and applies the DNA collection and analysis law to persons convicted under a municipal ordinance that is equivalent to a state criminal statute for which DNA is collected upon conviction. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Public Safety on January 9th and has been scheduled for executive session on January 30th or February 1st.

Enhanced Assault Weapon Background Checks, Restoration of Local Authority, Protecting Preschools: On January 25th, the House Judiciary committee held a packed hearing on several gun safety measures. These included restoring local authority to create gun safety laws (HB 2666), requiring that people be 21 years old and pass an enhanced background check to own an Assault

Weapon (<u>HB 1387</u>), protecting early learning facilities (<u>HB 2293</u>) and ensuring a thorough background check and victim notification process is followed before a concealed pistol license is returned (<u>HB 2519</u>).

Electronic Monitoring: SB 6292, sponsored by Sen. Wilson, defines electronic monitoring to include electronic monitoring with victim notification technology (EMVNT) that is capable of notifying a victim or protected party if the monitored individual is nearby, requires the Administrative Office of the Courts to develop a list of vendors that can provide EMVNT and an informational handout for victims on the availability of EMVNT and, to the extent funds are appropriated, provide funding to counties to cover the cost of EMVNT. The bill also gives state and local government immunity from liability for the utilization of EMVNT unless it acted with gross negligence or in bad faith. It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Law & Justice on January 23rd and has been scheduled for executive session on January 30th.

First Informer Broadcasters: <u>HB 2415</u>, sponsored by Rep. Chapman, requires the Military Department Emergency Management Division to authorize a private entity to establish a program for certifying first informer broadcasters and requires state and local governments to allow certified first informer broadcasters access to areas affected by emergencies in some circumstances. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Public Safety on January 15th and executive action on January 25th.

Immunity from Prostitution Offenses: <u>HB 2361</u>, sponsored by Rep. Pellicciotti, provides immunity from prosecution for prostitution if the evidence for the charge was obtained as a result of a person seeking emergency assistance in certain circumstances. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Public Safety on January 16th and has been scheduled for executive action on January 30th or February 1st.

Machine Gun Loophole -- Trigger Modification Devices: <u>SB 5992</u>, sponsored by Sen. Van de Wege, closes the machine gun loophole by prohibiting bump stocks designed to accelerate a firearms' rate. On January 25^{th} , the bill passed out of the Senate with a 29 - 20 vote.

Modifying Rape Offense: HB 2465, sponsored by Rep. Orwall, modifies the crime of Rape in the third degree by removing the language requiring that lack of consent was clearly expressed by the victim's words or conduct. Instead, a person commits Rape in the third degree when such person engages in sexual intercourse with another person where the victim did not consent to sexual intercourse with the perpetrator or where there is threat of substantial unlawful harm to the property rights of the victim. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Public Safety on January 16th and executive action on January 25th.

No-Contact Violations: <u>HB 2466</u>, sponsored by Rep. Orwall, includes no-contact orders issued in Promoting Prostitution and Trafficking cases in the list of orders to which the warantless arrest statute applies. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Public Safety on January 16th and executive action on January 25th.

Patronizing a Prostitute: <u>HB 2360</u>, sponsored by Rep. Pellicciotti, raises the classification for the crime of Patronizing a Prostitute from a misdemeanor to a gross misdemeanor. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Public Safety on January 16th and has been scheduled for executive action on either January 25th, January 30th, or February 1st.

Repealing the Death Penalty: SB 6052, sponsored by Rep. Walsh, eliminates the death penalty and provides that all persons convicted of Aggravated First Degree Murder must be sentenced to life in prison without the possibility of release or parole. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Law and Justice Committee on January 22nd and passed out of committee on January 25th. It has now been passed to the Rules Committee for second reading.

Reviewing Sexual Predatory Standards: SB 6217, sponsored by Sen. Dhingra, provides review standards for the court to follow in determining whether to order a full evidentiary hearing on whether to order the unconditional discharge or conditional release (CR) to a less restrictive alternative (LRA) of a person committed as a sexually violent predator (SVP). It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Human Services & Corrections on January 24th.

Sexual Assault Kits: <u>HB 2353</u>, sponsored by Rep. Orwall, provides funding for processing of the 6,000+ untested rape kits, for investigative training and increased rights for victims of sexual assault. HB 2353 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Public Safety on January 9th and executive action on January 25th.

Sexual Assault, Statute of Limitations: <u>HB 1155</u>, sponsored by Rep. Griffey, eliminates the statute of limitations for felony sexual offenses, including rape in the first and second degrees, child molestation and sexual exploitation of a minor is ready to be voted on the House floor. The bill has been placed on third reading by the House Rules Committee.

Sexual Harassment Unified Table: <u>HCR 4413</u>, sponsored by Rep. Tarleton, creates a unified table on sexual harassment and establishing a sexual harassment work force was passed on a voice vote on January 18 and is headed to the Senate. The task force will be made up of eight legislators (representing the four corners), four lobbyists and one representative each from the Office of the Secretary of the Senate and the Chief Clerk of the House. It was adopted in the House on January 18th and has been placed on the Senate's second reading calendar.

Suicide Prevention/Voluntary Waiver: SB 5553, sponsored by Sen. Pedersen, is a suicide prevention policy that allows people to sign a voluntary waiver of firearms rights. Among other things, it requires entry of the voluntary waiver into the Washington State Patrol electronic database and prohibits transfer of a firearm to a person with a voluntary waiver in effect. The bill passed unanimously out of the Senate on January 24th.

Vacating Criminal Convictions: <u>HB 2890</u>, sponsored by Rep. Hansen, modifies the process for obtaining a certificate of discharge and expands eligibility criteria for vacating criminal convictions. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Public Safety on January 23rd and has been scheduled for executive session on February 1st.

Wireless Device Tax/Internet Crimes Against Children: HB 2389, sponsored by Rep. Sawyer, levies a 40 cent tax on each retail sale in the state of a wireless device used to access the internet and dedicates the revenue of the new tax to the Washington Internet Crimes Against Children Account. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Finance on January 12th and executive action on January 30th.

General Government

B&O Tax/Sale of Personal Information: <u>HB 1904</u>, sponsored by Rep. Smith, imposes a business and occupation tax on the sale of personal information in Washington. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 16th and executive action on January 24th.

Construction Defect Claims: <u>HB 2475</u>, sponsored by Rep. Ryu, revises the notice and opportunity to cure process in a construction defect action, adding a mediation process and further detail with respect to the termination of this process and extends tolling provisions and provides for tolling in the context of claims by one construction professional against another. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Judiciary on January 23rd and is scheduled for executive session on February 1st.

Consumer Rights to Internet Transparency: SB 6446, sponsored by Sen. Carlyle, requires providers of broadband Internet access services to publicly disclose information regarding the network management practices, performance, and commercial terms of its broadband internet services, makes a violation of the disclosure requirements, a violation of the Consumer Protection Act (CPA), and prohibits state agencies from entering into new contracts with Internet service providers who do not commit to providing equal connection to all users to lawful Internet content, applications, and services. It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment & Technology on January 18th.

Distributed Energy Resource Planning: <u>HB 1233</u>, sponsored by Rep. Morris, authorizes an electric utility to develop an annually updated, 10-year Distributed Energy Resources Plan. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 23rd and executive action on January 25th.

Electrical Billing: SB 5624, sponsored by Sen. Hasegawa, concerns transparency in retail electrical customer billing and requires each electric utility to provide either written or electronic notice of public hearings where changes in electricity rates will be considered or approved and requires that an electric utility must disclose the local tax rate imposed on the electric utility by a city or town on each billing statement. SB 5624 was voted out of the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment & Technology on January 18th and has been passed to the Rules Committee for second reading.

Internet Privacy: SB 5919, sponsored by Sen. Ranker, concerns consumer protection of internet privacy and requires broadband Internet providers to obtain opt-in consent to sell or transfer certain customer information. It also, requires broadband Internet providers to obtain opt-in consent to send or display an advertisement to a customer based on certain customer information. SB 5919 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment & Technology on January 11th.

<u>HB 2200</u>, sponsored by Rep. Hansen, concerns consumer protection of internet privacy and requires Internet providers to obtain opt-in consent to sell or transfer certain customer information, it also requires Internet providers to obtain opt-in consent to send or display an advertisement to a customer based on certain customer information. The bill received a public hearing on January 18th in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development and is scheduled for executive session on January 30th.

Net Neutrality: <u>HB 2282</u>, sponsored by Rep. Hansen, prohibits Internet providers from blocking content, applications, services, or non-harmful devices; impairing or degrading traffic on the basis of content, application or service; or favoring some traffic over others in exchange for benefit. It also

requires Internet providers to make certain disclosures related to service. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 18th and executive action on January 25th.

<u>HB 2284</u>, sponsored by Rep. Smith, protecting consumers by prohibiting blocking, throttling, or paid prioritization in the provision of internet service in Washington State. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 18th and executive action on January 25th.

Property Tax Task Force: <u>SB 6382</u>, sponsored by Sen. Carlyle, creates a task force on state and local property tax reform. It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Ways & Means on January 25th.

Public Facilities: HB 2093/SB 5725, sponsored by Rep. Santos and Sen. Hasegawa, concerns the mitigation of public facilities in certain cities. The bill requires a city with a population greater than 550,000 that permits, constructs, or operates a public facility in a neighborhood with a high poverty level or high rate of ethnic diversity to assume the responsibility for negative impacts that the public facility has had, or may have, on the surrounding neighborhood. The bill requires a qualifying city to develop a mitigation plan and consider the potential or actual disparate racial, social, and economic impacts of the public facility on nearby residents and authorizes a qualifying city to negotiate with other local jurisdictions who have a direct interest in having created the negative impacts, but the residents must be held harmless. HB 2093 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Local Government on January 9th.

Small Cell Deployment: HB 2592, sponsored by Rep. Morris, creates a designation process for local governments that demonstrate investment readiness for small cell infrastructure. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 18th and has been scheduled for executive action on January 30th, January 31st, or February 1st.

SB 5935, sponsored by Sen. Sheldon, requires cities and towns to enact an ordinance for issuing master permits for siting and installing small cell facilities, creates the Governor's Office on Broadband Access, establishes a Broadband Taskforce to review existing initiatives, policies, and public/private investments, creates a broadband deployment partnership initiative for underserved or unserved areas, authorizes rural port districts to acquire and operate telecommunications facilities for their own internal telecommunications needs within and outside of its district, and to provide wholesale telecommunications services within its district limits and extends the state Universal Service Fund until 2021. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment & Technology on January 25th.

Environment

Carbon Pricing: SB 6203, requested by Governor Inslee and sponsored by Sen. Carlyle, introduces a tax on carbon at the price of twenty dollars per metric ton. The tax would increase by the rate of inflation plus 3.5% annually. It directs the proceeds from the tax into three accounts for activities that reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions connected to energy use and other activity in Washington; provides assistance to vulnerable communities and workers in fossil fuel industries; and increases the resilience of Washington's natural resources to the impacts of climate change. SB 6203 also establishes the Clean Energy Investment Program to allow an electric or gas utility to claim a credit of up to 100 percent against the carbon tax for approved investment in projects that reduce or offset carbon

emissions from the utility. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment & Technology on January 16th.

Clean Energy Investments: HB 2283, sponsored by Rep. DeBolt, suspends the 15 percent annual renewable resource target under the Energy Independence Act beginning January 1, 2028 and requires that electric utilities use electricity generated by clean energy resources to meet any new energy or capacity need beginning January 1, 2028. It also establishes tax preferences for certain renewable energy and carbon reduction investments. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 16th.

Energy Independence Act: <u>HB 2402</u>, sponsored by Rep. Tarleton, extends the requirement to pursue all available conservation that is cost-effective, reliable, and feasible under the Energy Independence Act (EIA) to small utilities and natural gas utilities. It also adds additional targets under the EIA. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 23rd.

Net Metering: HB 2510, sponsored by Rep. Morris, increases the maximum capacity of systems eligible for net metering to 1,000 kilowatts, requires an electric utility to offer to make net metering available to eligible customer-generators until the cumulative generating capacity of net metering systems equals 0.5 percent of the utility's peak demand during 2006, and authorizes the Department of Commerce and the Washington State University Extension Energy Program to coordinate to provide technical assistance to small utilities for the purpose of implementing net metering. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 16th.

SB 6081, sponsored by Sen. Palumbo, removes the 0.5 percent utility cap for the cumulative generating capacity for net metering systems, requires, as of March 31st, any remaining unused kilowatt-hour (kWh) credit generated for the calendar year to be used to assist low-income residential utility customers and requires electric or gas utilities to include on customer bills the total amount of kWh of electricity consumed for the most recent 12-month period. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment & Technology on January 17th. It passed out of committee on January 23rd and has been referred to Ways & Means.

Oil Transportation Safety: SB 6269, sponsored by Sen. Ranker, applies the barrel tax to crude oil received by pipeline and raises the oil spill administration tax from \$0.04 to \$0.06 cents per barrel, requires the Department of Ecology (Ecology) to review, assess, and provide a report on vessel traffic safety in northern Puget Sound, requires Ecology to establish the Salish Sea Shared Waters forum, requires Ecology to update contingency plan rules to address situations where oils may sink or submerge in water and authorizes Ecology to require at least one joint large-scale, multiple plan equipment deployment drill of onshore and offshore facilities and covered vessels, every 3 years. It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment & Technology on January 25th.

On-Bill Repayment: <u>HB 2410</u>, sponsored by Rep. Doglio, authorizes a qualifying utility to count the conservation savings associated with an on-bill repayment program as cost-effective conservation under the Energy Independence Act. The received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 17th.

Optional Alternative Energy Purchases: <u>HB 2413/SB 6477</u>, sponsored by Rep. Doglio and Sen. Rolfes, requires utilities to provide the option for residential customers to purchase qualified alternative energy

resources. HB 2413 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 17th. SB 6477 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment & Technology on January 23rd.

Paris Climate Agreement: HB 2294, sponsored by Rep. Slatter, aligns the Washington's greenhouse gas emissions limits with those established by the United States' commitment under the 2015 Paris climate agreement by modifying state greenhouse gas emissions reduction targets to 26 percent below 2005 levels by 2025. The bill also directs the departments of Commerce and Ecology to document and report state and local efforts at reducing carbon emissions. HB 2294 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Environment on January 9th.

Reclaimed Water: HB 2743, sponsored by Rep. Springer, requires a reclaimed water permit applicant or permittee to enter into certain written agreements with a Group A public water system before the applicant or permittee may use, store, or deliver reclaimed water within the service area of the Group A public water system, requires the written agreements between the reclaimed water permit applicant or permittee and the Group A public water system to address, among other subjects, protection of groundwater quality and other water resource, an identification of the areas in which reclaimed water will be provided, and rates and charges for reclaimed water and establishes a dispute resolution process in which a Group A public water system and a reclaimed water permit applicant or permittee may petition the Secretary of the Department of Health for a decision in the event the parties are not able to reach an agreement. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Agriculture & Natural Resources on January 24th.

Renewable Energy Incentives: HB 2281, sponsored by Rep. Morris, specifies that no Renewable Energy Cost Recovery Incentive Payment Program customer who recertifies their renewable energy system with the Washington State University Extension Energy Program (WSU Energy Program) may continue to receive incentive payments if the cumulative dollar amount of incentive payments made to the customer exceeds 100 percent of the total price of the renewable energy system and establishes that only applicants whose systems were installed and operational after July 1, 2010, must provide system operation data when applying to the WSU Energy Program for recertification. HB 2281 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 11th. The bill was substituted and moved out of Committee on January 24th. It has now been referred to Appropriations.

Solar Gardens: HB 2280/SB 6130, introduced by Rep. Morris and Sen. McCoy, establishes requirements for community solar garden programs and provides utilities and organizations to develop solar gardens that they can sell units in increments of 1kW to subscribers. HB 2280 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 11th. SB 6130 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment & Technology on January 17th.

Toxic Chemicals: <u>SB 6413</u>, sponsored by Sen Van De Wege, prohibits the sale, manufacture, and distribution of firefighting foam that has perfluoroalkyl and polyfluoroalkyl chemicals (PFAS) intentionally added, requires sellers of firefighting personal protective equipment (PPE) containing PFAS, to notify purchasers of the equipment and makes a violation of the act subject to a civil penalty not to exceed \$5000 for each first offense and up to \$10,000 civil penalty for subsequent violations. It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment & Technology on January 25th.

Transportation Electrification: SB 6187, sponsored by Sen. Palumbo, authorizes the governing bodies of a municipal utility or a public utility district commission to adopt a transportation electrification plan that, at a minimum, establishes a finding that utility outreach and investment in the electrification of transportation infrastructure is cost-effective to ratepayers. The bill received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment & Technology on January 17th and was passed out of committee on January 23rd. It has been referred to the Rules Committee for second reading.

<u>HB 2897</u>, sponsored by Rep. Morris, requires the governing authority of a municipal electric utility or the commission of a public utility district to engage in a distributed energy resources planning process that accomplishes certain goals before developing a transportation electrification plan and authorizes the governing authority of a municipal electric utility or the commission of a public utility district to offer programs in the electrification of transportation for its customers if it makes a cost-effectiveness determination in accordance with a transportation electrification plan. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Technology & Economic Development on January 23rd.

Transportation Fuel Emissions: HB 2338, sponsored by Rep. Fitzgibbon, aims to reduce the greenhouse gas emissions associated with transportation fuels. The bill directs the Department of Ecology (ECY) to adopt a rule establishing the Clean Fuels Program to limit the greenhouse gas emissions per unit of transportation fuel energy to 10 percent below 2017 levels by 2028, excludes exported fuel, fuel used by vessels, railroad locomotives, and aircraft, and certain other categories of fuel from Clean Fuels Program requirements, requires the Clean Fuel Program to include processes for the tracking of compliance obligations and bankable, tradeable credits, requires annual reporting by the ECY on the Clean Fuels Program, as well as an analysis of the program's first five years by the Joint Legislative Audit and Review Committee, and retains the current distribution of revenue under the 2015 Transportation Revenue Package, eliminating changes that would have been triggered as a result of legislative enactment of a Clean Fuels Program. HB 2338 received a public hearing in the House Committee on Environment on January 9th. The bill was substituted and voted out of Committee on January 23rd and has now been referred to the Transportation Committee.

Underground Storage: <u>HB 2453/SB 6159</u>, requested by the Department of Ecology and sponsored by Rep. Peterson and Sen. Takko, extends the expiration date for the state Underground Storage Tank program from 2019 to 2029. HB 2453 was voted out of the House Committee on Environment on January 18th and has been referred to Appropriations. SB 6159 was voted out of the Senate Committee on Energy, Environment & Technology on January 18th and has been passed to the Rules Committee for second reading.

Vehicle Fuel Standards: <u>HB 2328</u>, sponsored by Rep. Morris, adopts California vehicle standards for zero-emission vehicles and for medium duty trucks. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Environment on January 18th.

Wasted Food: HB 2411, sponsored by Rep. Doglio, establishes a goal of reducing wasted food in the state by 50 percent by 2030 and directs the Department of Ecology to work with the departments of Health and Agriculture to develop a food waste reduction plan by 2020 to achieve the 2030 wasted food reduction goal. The bill received a public hearing in the House Committee on Environment on January 18th. It is scheduled for executive session on January 30th or February 1st.

Transportation

Alaskan Way Viaduct: <u>HB 2741/SB 6378</u>, sponsored by Rep. Clibborn and Sen. Hobbs, establishes that tolls must be used to re-pay the transportation partnership account for any amounts transferred from the transportation partnership account to the highway bond retirement fund. HB 2741 is scheduled for public hearing in the House Committee on Transportation on January 31st.

Electric Bicycles: HB 2782/SB 6434, sponsored by Rep. Kilduff and Sen. Rolfes, concerns electric-assisted bicycles. SB 6434 is scheduled for a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Transportation on January 31st. HB 2782 is scheduled for public hearing in the House Transportation Committee on January 31st.

Regional Transit Authority Board Members: SB 6301, sponsored by Sen. O'Ban, modifies the election and authority of regional transit authority board members. SB 6301 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Transportation on January 24th.

RTA Adjustment: SB 5955, sponsored by Sen. Kuderer, requires a regional transit authority (RTA) to implement a market value adjustment program, which calculates a credit on motor vehicle excise taxes and requires the RTA to implement the program in a manner that allows the delivery of the system and financing plan approved by the RTA's voters to the extent practicable. It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Transportation on January 24th.

SB 6303, sponsored by Sen. O'Ban, requires a Regional Transit Authority (RTA) to establish a motor vehicle excise tax (MVET) market value adjustment program (MVAP), requires that the amount of a credit under the MVAP is the difference between the current MVET and an assumed MVET of 0.5 percent based on base model Kelley Blue Book values or National Automobile Dealers Association (NADA) values, whichever is lower and requires Department of Licensing (DOL) to only contract with an RTA for collection of a MVET if it has implemented a MVAP, and any contract with a RTA must provide DOL with full cost recovery. It received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Transportation on January 24th.

RTA MVET Payment Plans: <u>HB 2357</u>, sponsored by Rep. Reeves, allows for semiannual or quarterly payment plans for regional transit authority motor vehicle excise taxes. It received a public hearing in the House Committee on Transportation on January 11th and is scheduled for executive session on January 31st.

Transit-Only Lane Enforcement Cameras: HB 2403, sponsored by Rep. Fitzgibbon, allows local governments to enact an ordinance allowing for the use of transit-only lane enforcement cameras. HB 2403 received a hearing in the House Committee on Transportation on January 15th and was passed out of committee on January 17th. It was referred to the Rules Committee.

Transportation Network Companies: SB 6043/HB 2716, sponsored by Sen. Hobbs and Rep. Tarleton, provides statewide uniform regulation for transportation network companies. SB 6043 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Transportation on January 22nd and HB 2716 is scheduled for a public hearing in the House Committee on Transportation on February 1st.

<u>SB 6500/HB 2945</u>, sponsored by Sen. Saldaña and Rep. Fey, also concerns transportation network companies. SB 6500 received a public hearing in the Senate Committee on Transportation on January

22nd and HB 2945 is scheduled for a public hearing in the House Committee on Transportation on February 1st.

Looking Ahead

Budget proposals from the House and Senate are expected shortly after the quarterly revenue review by the Revenue Forecasting Council on February 15th.

The first round of cut off dates, Policy Committee Cutoff and Fiscal Committee Cutoff, are set for February 2nd and February 6th. Bills need to be passed out of their policy and fiscal committees on or before that date in order to continue to be considered this session. Exceptions to these deadlines include bills necessary to implement the budget. The House of Origin Cutoff is on February 14th.
