1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE relating to the Ethics Code; amending Sections 4.16.030 and 4.16.070 of the Seattle Municipal Code; requiring elected officials to disclose financial interests in legislative matters prior to participating in those matters; and creating a limited exception to the requirement that elected officials disqualify themselves from participating in such matters.

Summary and background of the Legislation: The Ethics Code defines a "Covered Individual" as a City officer, City employee, City contractor or City volunteer. Covered Individual also includes every individual who was a City officer, City employee, City contractor or City volunteer at the time of the act or omission that is alleged to have violated this chapter, even if he or she no longer has that status. Covered Individual includes elected city officials.

Covered individuals are disqualified from acting on City business in certain circumstances. The Ethics code defines the circumstances, relationship and situations where the covered individual would be disqualified.

The proposed ordinance would provide a limited exception for covered individuals who are elected officials, to act on City business if the:

legislative matter establishes or adjusts assessments, taxes, fees or rates for water, utility or other broadly provided public services or facilities are applied equally, proportionally, or by the same percentage to the elected official's interest and other businesses, properties, or individuals subject to the assessment, tax, fee, or rate and a disclosure is made in accordance with the Ethics code; and

Any other similar circumstance prescribed by the Ethics and Elections Commission.

Before participating the elected official must publicly disclose their financial interest on the officials webpage, file a copy with the City Clerk and the Executive Director of the Ethics and Elections Commission.
