From taking part in the Seattle Youth Commission I hope to learn more about government and the process in which changes are made in our city. I want to take action to make a difference in
my community and help my neighborhood. I see problems that are stopping my community from
growing and thriving and I don't want to just stand by. I'd like to continue to expand my knowledge about the different cultures in Seattle and build a better awareness of the unique
issues each culture faces. I also know this is a great opportunity to meet new people who share
the same interests and drive as me.
What do you think makes your perspective unique to others?
Two years ago I moved from Mercer Island to Lake City. It was a sudden and big change for me
but I grew to love my new town. Seeing Lake City after living on Mercer Island for 13 years I
immediately noticed so many things that I never expected to live in the middle of, Mercer Island
was secluded and groomed and for a long time I thought that the whole world was like this. I
thought everybody had white picket fences and properly trained dogs. I moved, and everything I
had believed was proved wrong. Not every town is clean and a strong community. I know this and have seen both sides. I have seen a perfect manicured community and I have seen a newly
assembled community. I am ready to take what I know and make an impression on Lake City.
