1. BILL SUMMARY

1. Legislation Title:

AN ORDINANCE relating to funding for housing and community development programs; adopting the 2018-2022 Consolidated Plan for Housing and Community Development ("Plan") and authorizing its submission to the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD); authorizing acceptance of grant funds from HUD for programs and activities included in the Plan; amending Ordinance 124496, which adopted the 2014 Annual Action Plan to the 2014-2017 Consolidated Plan for Housing and Community Development, to repurpose funds to the Office of Economic Development; amending Ordinance 125493, which amended the 2018 Budget (Ordinance 125475); and ratifying and confirming certain prior acts; all by a 3/4 vote of the City Council.

2. Summary and background of the Legislation:

This legislation adopts the 2018-2022 Consolidated Plan for Housing and Community Development and the 2018 Annual Action Plan, authorizes submittal to the US Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) and amends the 2018 Budget. The Consolidated Plan brings together the principal housing and community development planning documents, informs HUD about the City's strategies for using the City's annual allocation of funds from four HUD programs over the five-year period covered by the Plan and provides an allocation plan for current year's funds. In total, the funds amount to approximately \$17 million in 2018. Funds are used to provide services, housing, and facilities to low- and moderate-income persons, businesses and neighborhoods. The legislation authorizes the acceptance of these funds.

HUD provides annual allocations to the City from four of its programs. These allocations differ from the estimated allocations that were included in the 2018 Adopted Budget due to timing; the net difference by program from the Adopted Budget is shown below:

To receive the annual allocations, jurisdictions must submit a Consolidated Plan, which describes the policies governing the City's use of these funds, and an annual allocation plan which identifies the specific uses of the funds for a particular program year. Funds are allocated to the Human Services Department, Office of Housing, Office of Economic Development, Office of Immigrant and Refugee Affairs, the Department of Parks and Recreation and the Office of Planning and Community Development to fund core services and support activities, such as homeless shelters, preservation and development of affordable housing, homelessness and affordable housing planning and research, investments in community and economic development to support small businesses and microenterprises, job training and creation, and park improvements.

Significant Changes:

One-time:

- Neighborhood Business District Only in Seattle & Planning/Technical Assistance/Staffing: One-time funding to assist with additional planning work.
- King Station Commercial Affordability: This project is starting to move forward to expend funding this year. The funds have been identified to compete a feasibility study and to begin project expenditures.
- Homeless Services One-time increase to homeless services to maximize the 2018
 Public Service cap. The public service cap on CDBG is determined using the current
 years funds and the prior year's program income. CDBG received an unexpected amount
 of Program Income in 2017 from the sale of property which increased the available
 Public Service cap.

On-going:

- The increase in HOME funding will allow the Office of Housing to pursue additional affordable housing development.
- Alpha Cine Section 108 Repayment: Approximately \$98,000 of CDBG will be set aside to repay the loan obligation for 2019. With continued delays in the passage of the federal budget, CDBG allocation for this loan obligation is to be allocated one year in advance to guarantee the availability of CDBG funding to make the payment on time. This is anticipated to be an ongoing obligation for the remaining 12 years of the loan term.
- 2018 is the second year for implementation of the new HOPWA fund distribution formula. This new formula allocation method is being phased in over 5 fiscal years starting with 2017 in which no grantee will received a less than a 5% loss or 10% increase from the prior year; barring impacts in appropriation levels by Congress. The old formula was determined using cumulative AIDS cases and is not based on individuals living with HIV or AIDS.

Appropriations Notes:

The 2018 Adopted Budget contains estimates of these revenues. This legislation provides the actual revenue numbers and adjusts the appropriations in the Adopted Budget to match the actual numbers.
