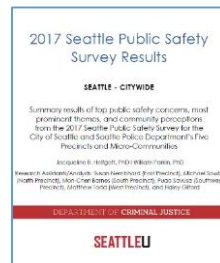
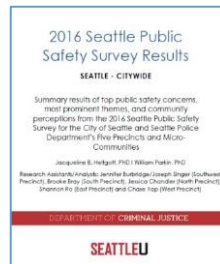
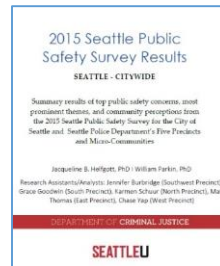
MCPP and the Seattle Public Safety Survey

- **POLICE-COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT AT THE MICRO-COMMUNITY LEVEL** to engage with the community to develop priorities, and strategies.
- **MCPP RESEARCH ANALYSTS** in all five of the Seattle Police precincts.
- **SEATTLE PUBLIC SAFETY SURVEY** administered annually to measure public safety concerns at the micro-community level.
- **COMMUNITY FOCUS GROUPS** held in all micro-communities.
- **DATA COLLECTION SYSTEM** establishing a framework that triangulates data on citizen perceptions, police /activity logs, and crime.
- Development of a **PUBLIC-FACING SPD MCPP WEBSITE** to offer public access to information on the MCPP



What the MCPP and the Seattle Public Safety Survey do for Seattle

- Recognition that **crime = crime + community perception** of crime
- **Micro-community level data** to guide police response based on both crime and community perception of crime.
- A way to measure city, precinct, and micro-community **quality of life** to holistically and collaboratively and dynamically address public safety issues over time.

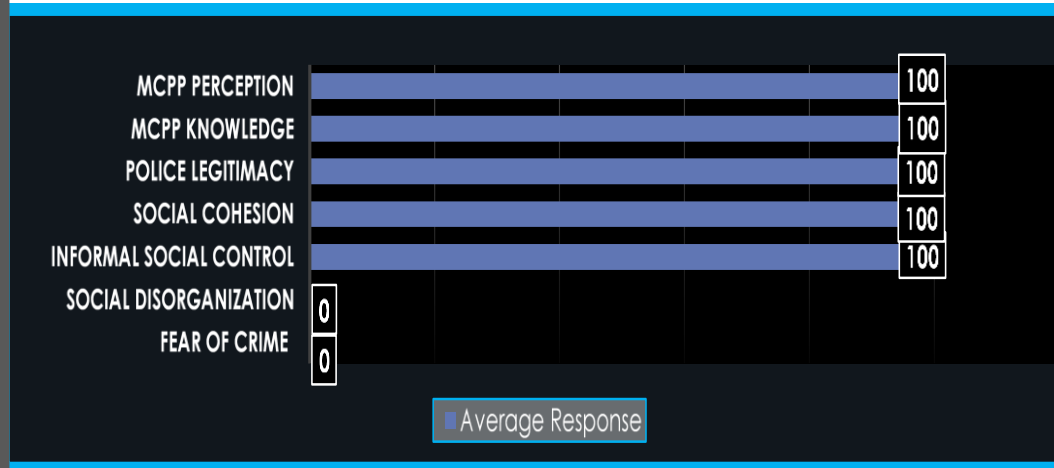
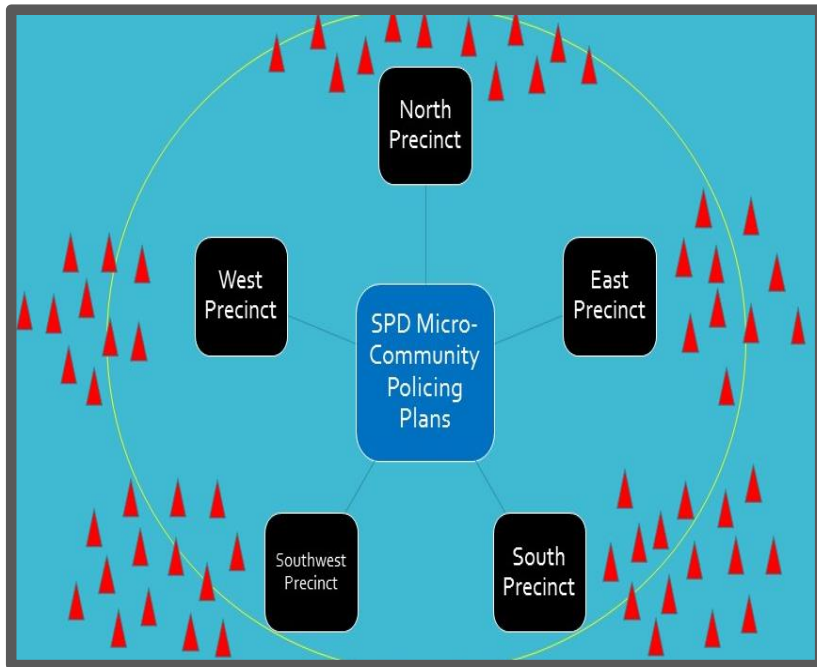

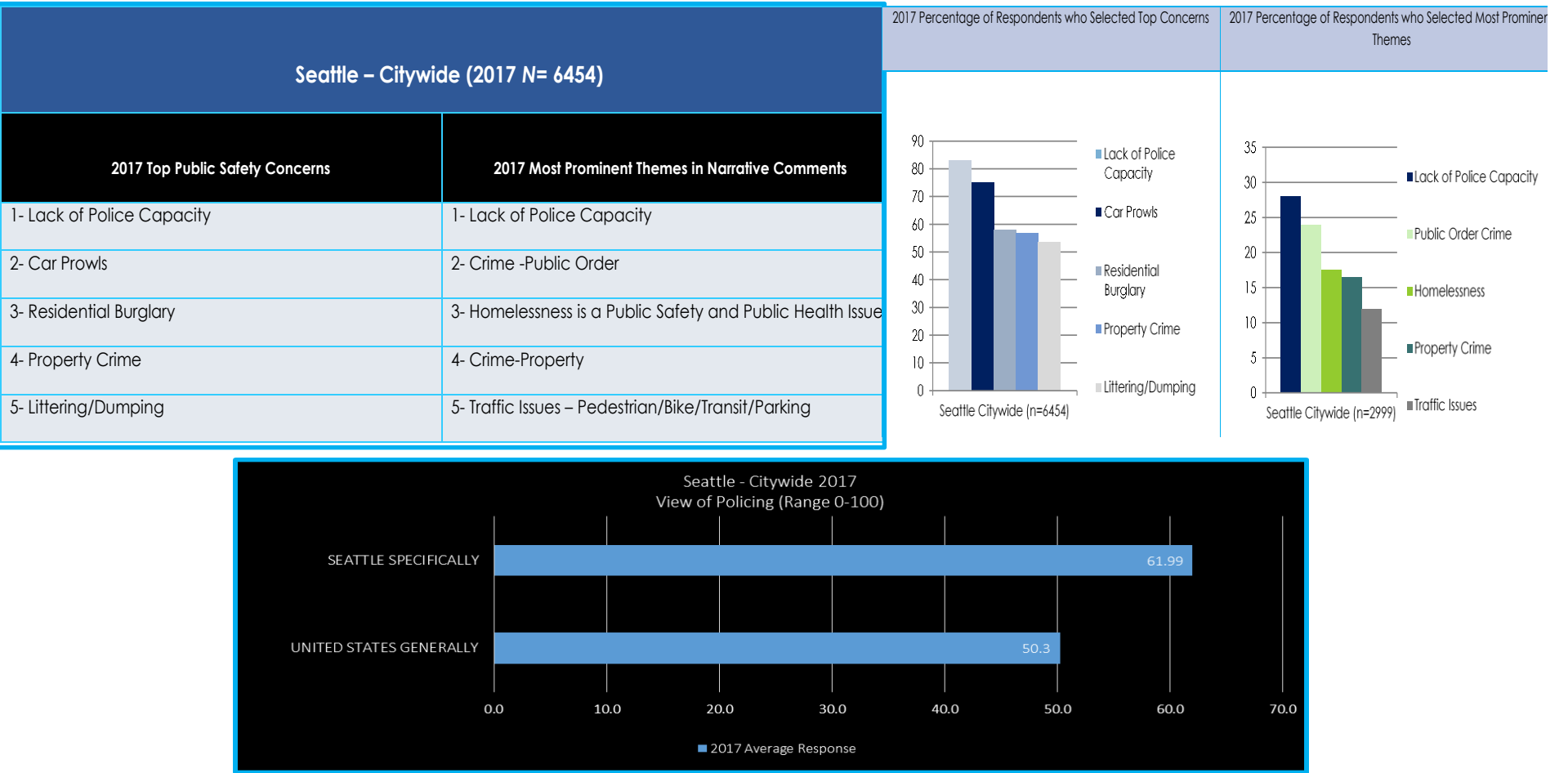

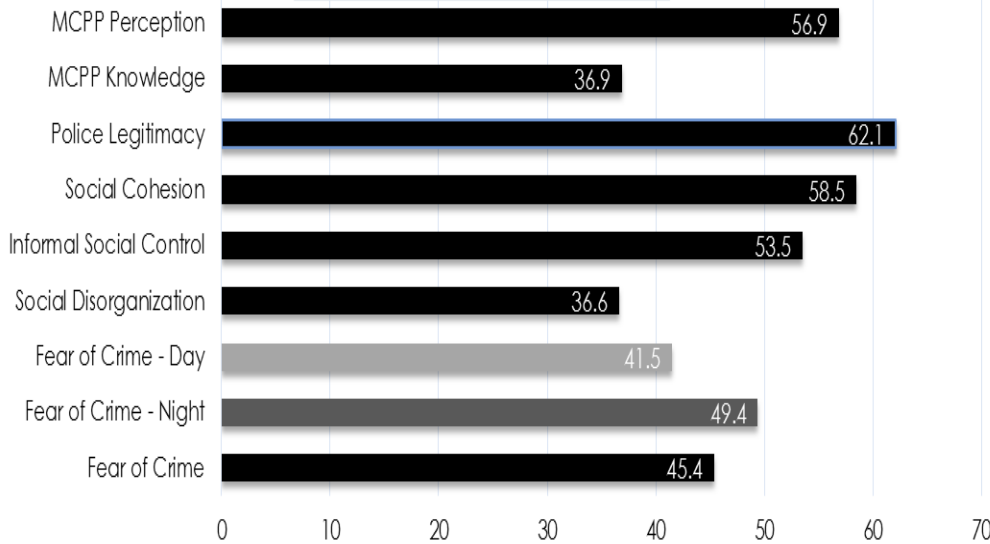
Seattle Public Safety Survey Results 2017- *Citywide Concerns*



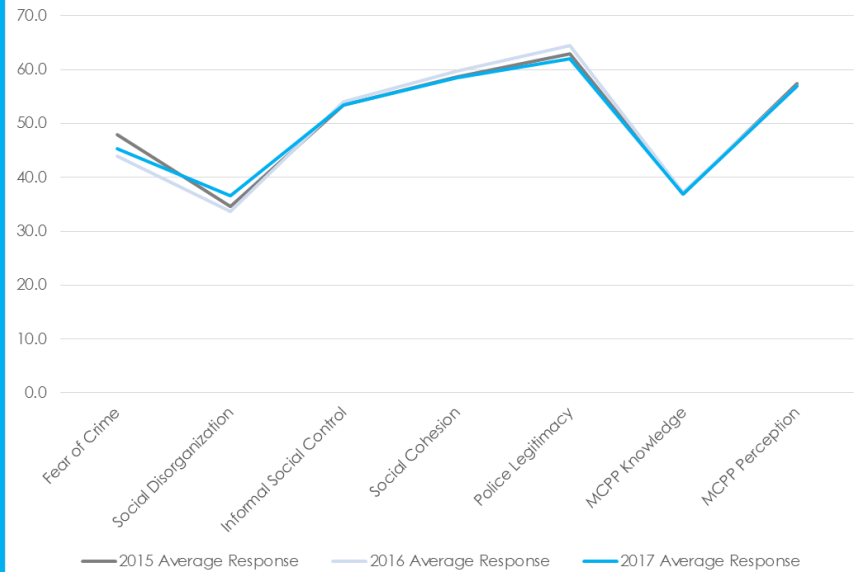
Seattle Public Safety Survey Results 2017- *Citywide Scale Ratings*

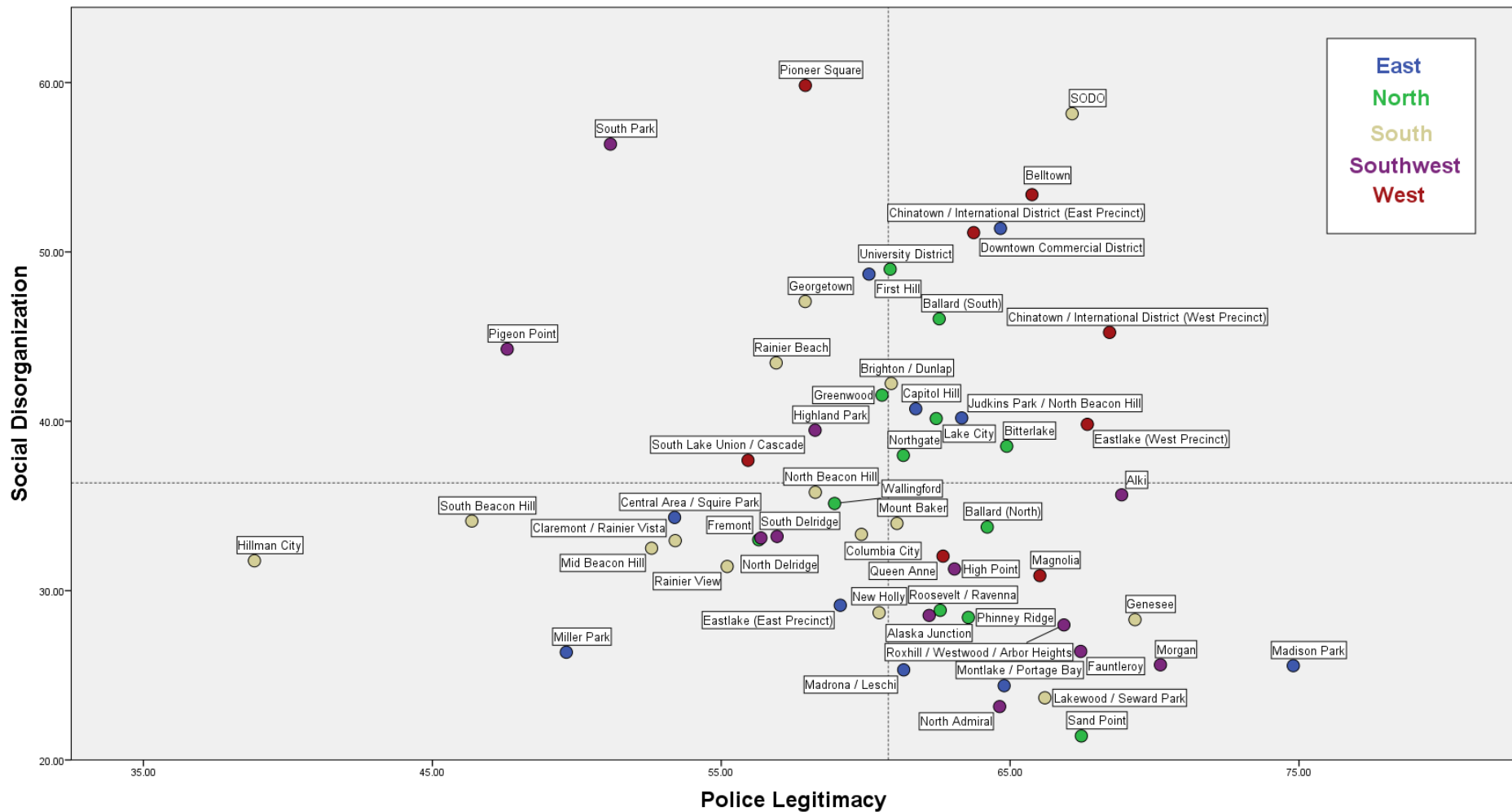

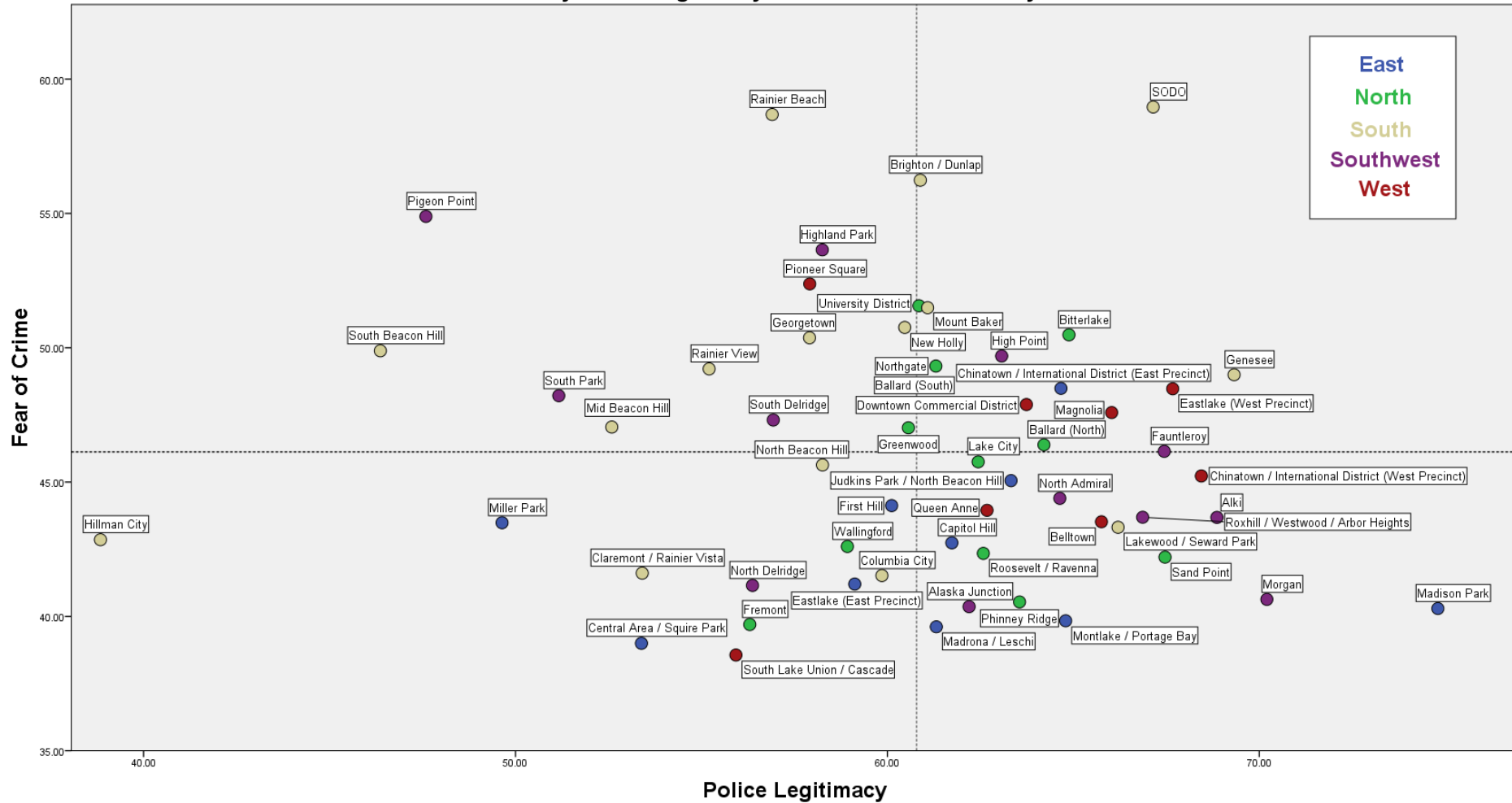

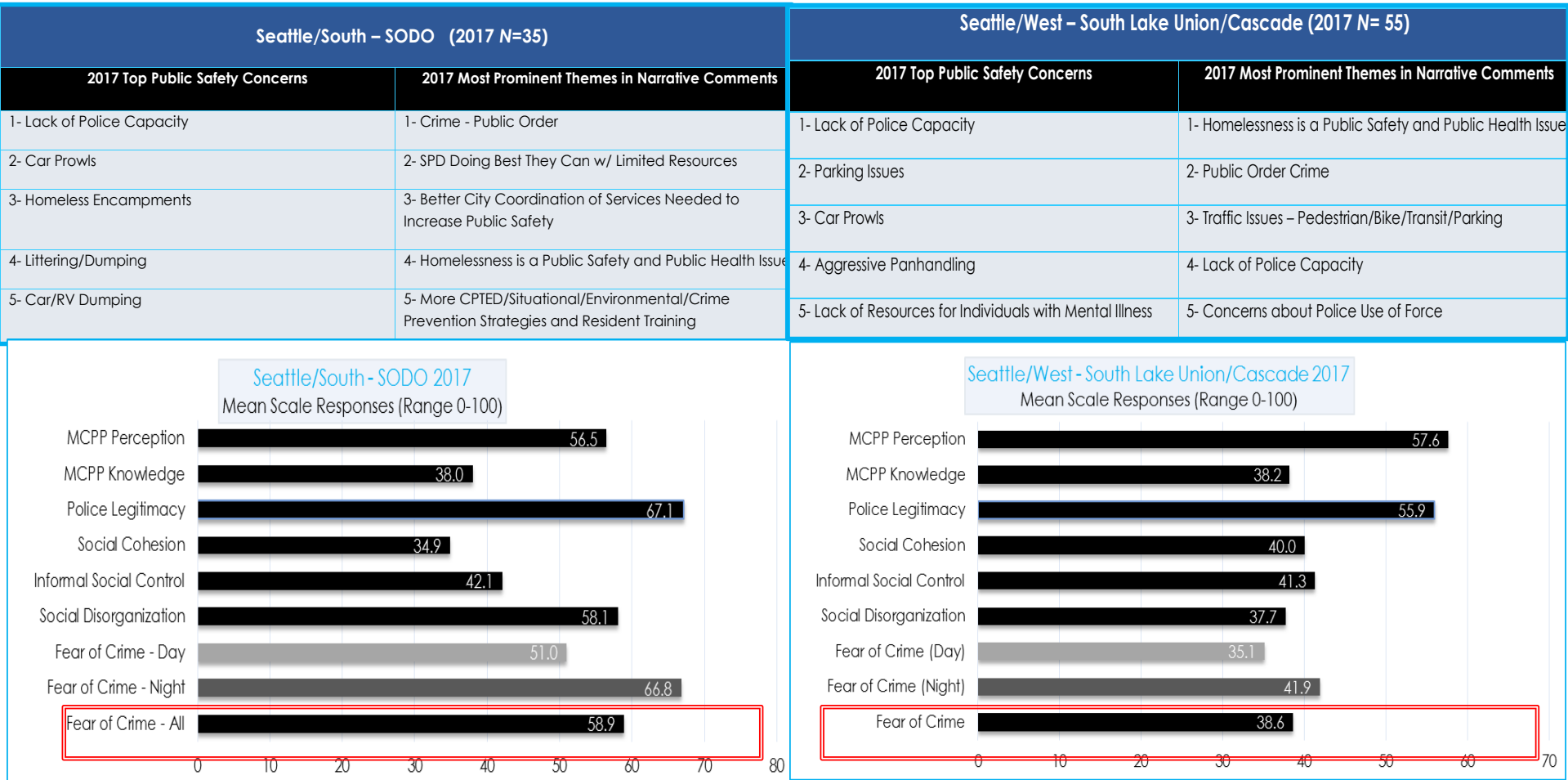
Micro Community Police Legitimacy & Social Disorganization Scales by Precinct
