1. BILL SUMMARY

- 1. Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE relating to the Seattle Fire Department; authorizing the Fire Chief to execute and administer, for and on behalf of The City of Seattle, an interlocal agreement with 29 agencies that operate independent fire departments within King County to provide one another with automatic emergency response services under certain circumstances.
- 2. Summary and background of the Legislation: This legislation authorizes the Fire Chief for the City of Seattle to enter into an agreement among 29 other fire chiefs in King County committing to provide each other with fire, rescue, and emergency services when any of the 30 signatory fire agencies or departments is faced with an emergent situation that is beyond its own capacity to meet. The agreement is attached to the ordinance as Attachment A ("Martin Luther King County Interlocal Agreement for Automatic Aid") and the signature page, which lists the participating agencies, is Attachment B.

The legislation supersedes, in many cases, automatic or mutual aid agreements that have been in effect between and among various of these fire agencies, sometimes for a period of several decades. Mutual Aid agreements are those in which agencies agree to provide aid to fellow signatory agencies upon request. Automatic Aid agreements, such as the one that the legislation addresses, are those in which assistance is dispatched automatically based on computer-aided dispatch. The benefit of an automatic aid agreement is that response resources can arrive at the scene of an emergency as quickly as they can arrive there. The benefit of an automatic aid agreement with a large number of signatories is that each of them can count on the support of the others to meet response needs.

This agreement has been in development for the past year and Chief Harold Scoggins of the Seattle Fire Department has been working in partnership with the other signatories to develop the current agreement.
