



SEATTLE SHORELINE MASTER PROGRAM-BACKGROUND

- 1971 State Shoreline Management Act
- 1972 Seattle adopted first Shoreline Master Program (SMP)
- 2015 Comprehensive Seattle SMP Update



DEPT OF ECOLOGY SMP GUIDELINES

- Establishes the requirement for shoreline regulations;
- Establishes a balance of authority between local and state government;
- Cities and Counties are the primary regulators;
- Department of Ecology has authority to review local shoreline programs and permit decisions.

SEATTLE SHORELINE DISTRICT

- Water bodies including:
 - Puget Sound
 - Shilshole Bay
 - Elliott Bay
 - > Duwamish River
 - Ship Canal/Lake Union
 - Lake Washington
 - Green Lake
- Lands extending 200-feet landward from the ordinary high water mark (OHWM)
- Associated floodplains, wetlands and river deltas

VESSEL DEFINITION AMENDMENT

Purpose and Intent

- Addresses unintended consequences of a 2016
 Seattle Hearing Examiner's decision that ruled
 that an existing conventional recreational
 vessel with a broken engine was not a vessel;
- Instead could be considered a "structure" and thereby be verified as a floating on-water residence; and
- Increase the consistency of the use of terms in the regulations.

VESSEL DEFINITION AMENDMENT

Proposed Legislation

- Clarify the terms "designed for navigation" and "used for navigation" in the definition of vessel (SMC 23.60A.942);
- Replace "vessel" with "house barge" (SMC 23.60A.204); and
- Replace "vessel" with "structure" (SMC 23.60A.916).

SMP LIMITED AMENDMENT PROCESS

Joint Review with Department of Ecology

(WAC <u>173-26-104</u> and WAC <u>173-26-110</u>)

SDCI and Ecology

- Joint 30 day comment period on proposed amendments
- Joint Public Hearing

SDCI

- > Reviews comments received
- Makes changes to the proposal, as needed
- Submits proposed amendment to Ecology

SMP LIMITED AMENDMENT PROCESS

Joint Review with Department of Ecology

(WAC <u>173-26-104</u> and WAC <u>173-26-110</u>)

- Ecology provides initial determination within 30 to 45 days
- **SDCI** works with Ecology on any needed changes
- Ecology provides written determination of consistency with applicable laws and rules
- SDCI works with City Council to adopt the amendment as an ordinance and submits the ordinance to Ecology for final approval
