1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE accepting the gift of funds for design and purchase of plantings at four business nodes along Delridge Way SW as part of the Delridge Way SW – RapidRide H Line project.

Summary and background of the Legislation: this legislation authorizes the Seattle Department of Transportation (SDOT) to accept a conditional gift of funds from the Delridge Neighborhoods Development Association (DNDA) for landscape design and purchase of plantings to be installed at four neighborhood business nodes along Delridge Way SW identified by DNDA: Andover, Youngstown, Brandon, and Orchard.

Delridge residents have long seen the Delridge multimodal corridor project, going to back to the initial planning open houses for the Multimodal Corridor program in 2014, as an opportunity to enhance the identity of neighborhood business nodes along the corridor. In furtherance of that goal, DNDA wishes to make a gift of \$6,633.52 to the City for landscape design and plantings in the medians and curb bulbs that have been integrated into the 60% design for the RapidRide H project. Most expenditures would be made during construction, currently scheduled in 2020 and 2021.

Without this funding, plantings included in the median and curb bulbs would be more uniform and less consistent with community desires.
