1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: A RESOLUTION reclaiming the inherent responsibility of the City to protect its most vulnerable populations; acknowledging the disproportionally high rate of violence against women of Indigenous communities; urging City departments to deliver sustainable investments that address the Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls (MMIWG) crisis, and establish a new, racially appropriate framework of understanding an approach to ending violence against Indigenous women and girls; and calling on the Mayor of Seattle to drive systemic reform that requests and empowers and holds accountable related City departments to work in cooperation with Native Communities to build trust and engagement for stronger government-to-government relations.

Summary and background of the Legislation: The United Indian Health Institute (UIHI), a division of the Seattle Indian Health Board (SIHB), has been studying violence against women in Indigenous communities. UIHI issued a report, "Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls," which tried to assess the number of cases nationwide and found that Seattle was the city with the highest number of MMWIG cases. The report also reported on the lack of quality data on violence in Indigenous communities due to racial misclassification, inconsistent data collection, and reporting practices. In response to this and other reporting and discussion of legislative efforts at the federal and state level, this resolution outlines the City's intent to address MMIWG.
