A RESOLUTION reaffirming Seattle as a welcoming city and condemning all forms of oppression throughout the world.

WHEREAS, previous Seattle City Councils have affirmed that Seattle is a welcoming city and have periodically condemned certain instances of oppression in various parts of the world; and

WHEREAS, "oppression" is defined by the Cambridge Dictionary as "a situation in which people are governed in an unfair and cruel way and prevented from having opportunities and freedom" and is defined by Merriam-Webster as an "unjust or cruel exercise of authority or power;"

WHEREAS, as a Human Rights City, Seattle is committed to protecting and promoting human rights and dignity, including civil, political, social, economic, and cultural rights; and WHEREAS, Seattle continues to promote inclusion, integration, equity, and acceptance of a wide range of diverse opinions and encourages civic participation by all its residents; and WHEREAS, the City has a history of stating its commitment to human rights with the creation in 1963, of the Seattle Human Rights Commission to make recommendations "with regard to the development of programs for the promotion of equality, justice and understanding among all citizens of the City" and recommend policies "affecting civil rights and equal opportunity;" and

WHEREAS, Resolution 31730, adopted by the Council in February 2017, affirmed the City of Seattle as a Welcoming City that promotes policies and programs to foster inclusion, serves its residents without regard to immigration and refugee status or other protected

1	class status, and continues its commitment to advocating and supporting the well-being of
2	all residents; and
3	WHEREAS, in response to the Trump administration's January 25, 2017 Executive Orders,
4	which expanded the scope and speed of immigration law enforcement, the Council
5	passed Ordinance 125296, providing the Office of Immigrant and Refugee Affairs \$1
6	million to contract with organizations to provide legal representation or guidance and
7	referral services for legal representation to indigent persons in need of representation for
8	matters related to immigration status; and
9	WHEREAS, in October 2017, the Council adopted Resolution 31775, strengthening public
10	safety by affirming the City's support for immigrant and refugee witnesses, survivors,
11	and victims of crime through exploration of strategies and partnerships to help them feel
12	safer in reporting crimes given the potential for the Trump administration's policies to
13	create a chilling effect on reporting; and
14	WHEREAS, in October 2017, the Council also adopted Resolution 31779, affirming Seattle's
15	support of immigrant communities through support of the Deferred Action Childhood
16	Arrival (DACA) program and committing to policies that protect vulnerable communities
17	while opposing national and federal policies and rhetoric targeting immigrants and
18	immigrant communities; and
19	WHEREAS, the Council in June 2018 adopted Resolution 31822, opposing the Trump
20	administration's practices of separating and detaining migrant families seeking asylum at
21	the U.SMexico border and detention camps in violation of the Universal Declaration of
22	Human Rights; and

1	WHEREAS, the Council adopted Resolution 31844 in October 2018, affirming that the
2	principles adopted by the Council in being a welcoming city also apply to human rights
3	defenders, responding to the increase in targeting for persecution human rights defenders
4	in Washington State by the federal administration; and
5	WHEREAS, in December 2018, the Council adopted Resolution 31858, affirming and
6	commending the validity of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights to uphold the
7	rights and dignity of Native peoples and the human rights of immigrants, as well as all
8	other residents and visitors to Seattle; and
9	WHEREAS, in May 2019, the Council adopted Resolution 31890, declaring the City's support
10	as a welcoming city for providing permanent protection and a path to citizenship for
11	immigrant youth and temporary protected status (TPS) and Deferred Enforced Departure
12	(DED) recipients; and
13	WHEREAS, seven of the nine-member City Council were sworn into office on January 6, 2020;
14	and
15	WHEREAS, the new City Council is in agreement with previous Councils in standing in
16	solidarity with the City's residents and opposing all forms of oppression affecting
17	communities throughout the world; and
18	WHEREAS, the City Council remains committed to standing against global oppression and
19	requests that our elected officials representing Seattle at the federal level, currently U.S.
20	Senators Patty Murray and Maria Cantwell and Representatives Pramila Jayapal and
21	Adam Smith, continue to support and take action to object to such oppression; NOW,
22	THEREFORE,
23	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEATTLE THAT:
