





## **Child Care Assistance Program Spotlight**

Helps eligible Seattle families with children ages 1mo – 12 years old afford childcare through subsidies accepted by participating providers

- History: Created in 1970s as part of Model Cities federal funding initiative to eradicate poverty and expanded overtime with City General Fund support
- **Partners:** Over 250 participating licensed child care providers citywide
- Eligibility: Families 60.1-94% SMI
- Quality: CCAP providers serving children under age 5 required to participate in <u>Early</u> Achievers

## Seattle Preschool Program Spotlight

Award-winning preschool program serving 3- and 4-year-olds citywide with free or affordable high-quality learning environments to promote kindergarten readiness

- Partners: Community-based organizations, Seattle Public Schools, and Family Child Care (FCC) programs
- Quality: SPP exceeds national averages for teachers meeting standards (US DHHS, 2020)



## Opportunities and Access Spotlight

Increases youth access to expanded learning and college and career readiness programs through partnerships with community-based organizations

- History: While DEEL has a long history of investment in CBOs and youth programming, the O&A strategy began in SY 2020-21 with funding from the 2018 FEPP Levy

## Seattle Promise Spotlight

College tuition and success program that guides students from high school to college and promotes completion of certificate, credential, degree, or transfer to four-year institution

- **History:** Builds from the success of the 13<sup>th</sup> Year Scholarship established at South Seattle College in 2008, and expanded to all campuses in 2017 with support from 2018 FEPP Levy
- Partners: Seattle Colleges and Seattle Public Schools
- Impact: Seattle Promise 3-year completion rates are roughly 16% higher than for non-Promise first-time students at Seattle Colleges
