RE: September 2021 Annual Surveillance Technologies Usage Review Extension Request

I am writing to discuss the due date for the next annual Surveillance Technologies Usage Review, which our office is scheduled to provide in September 2021, and to request an extension for that report to September 2022.

As you know, Seattle Municipal Code Chapter (SMC) 14.18 requires our office to produce a Surveillance Usage Review every year in September on non-Seattle Police Department technologies. Because of delays in finalizing Surveillance Impact Reports and our loss of consultant funding due to a budget cut, our first two Surveillance Usage Reviews were published relatively recently:

- Surveillance Usage Review: Seattle Department of Transportation (SDOT) License Plate Readers (LPR), published on 12/30/20.
- Surveillance Usage Review: SDOT Closed Circuit Television Cameras (CCTV), published on 6/30/21.

The SMC requires the second annual Usage Reviews on these two technologies to be filed by September 2021. We do not believe it makes sense to produce the second Usage Reviews for LPR and CCTV by then for the following reasons:

- Our first two reports would be less than a year old, and there would be little in the way of new information or progress on their recommendations.
- SDOT reported that they plan to replace the LPR technology with Acyclica technology by the end of 2021. If SDOT does this, it may not make sense to review this technology again; we will know about this in time.
- The individual who has led our Surveillance Technologies work, Megumi Sumitani, is retiring on July 20 and our current budget will not allow us to hire her replacement until early 2022. From a personnel viewpoint, I could use the extra time to figure out who should replace Megumi in this body of work.

Therefore, I would like to request City Council approval for the second Surveillance Usage Reviews, covering all activities in 2021, for SDOT's LPR and CCTV technologies to be due in September 2022 instead of September 2021.

Please note that we are, in September 2022, required to complete the first Usage Reviews of any existing and new surveillance technologies that the City Council approves in 2021. In fact, we are currently faced with the challenge of producing initial Usage Review reports in September 2022 on one Fire Department and three City Light surveillance technologies.

If you approve this request, this will get our annual Usage Reviews back on the September due date schedule specified in the SMC, as well as giving our office time to implement a sustainable process for completing these reviews annually with our current resources.

Purpose

On March 26, 2021, Seattle IT transmitted the <u>Group 4 SIR extension request memo</u> to the City Council requesting the retroactive SIR submission deadline be extended to September 1, 2021 from March 1, 2021. The City Council approved the memo through <u>Clerk File 314471</u> on April 12, 2021. As noted below from the prior memo, Seattle IT is following up with this subsequent extension memo to coincide with the Group 4 SIR and public engagement timelines. Seattle IT and stakeholder departments respectfully request a sixmonth extension to the previously identified deadline of September 1, 2021 to March 1, 2022. The sixmonth extension interval is consistent with the previous extension request.

The extension request memo for <u>Clerk File 314471</u> stated, "In an effort to answer that call and ensure completion of the SIR review process for all Master List technologies according to ordinance deadlines, we, on behalf of stakeholder departments and with concurrence with the Community Surveillance Working Group, request the retroactive SIR submission deadline be extended to September 1, 2021 from March 1, 2021. As indicated in the included revised Group 4 SIR work plan, this extension will allow for an extended public engagement process that will include an increased number of comment opportunities facilitated by the City. To accommodate this extended, 9-month engagement process, we expect to submit on behalf of the Community Surveillance Working Group a subsequent extension memo in August to coincide with the Group 4 SIR timelines included below."

Summary

In addition to accommodating the Working Group's request for addition public comment, the City recognizes the challenges the COVID-19 pandemic brought to the completion of the Surveillance Impact Report ("SIR") review process and supports an extension request. The City's COVID-19 response has resulted in unexpected delays to SIR submissions, specifically:

- Re-prioritization of City efforts in response to COVID-19 pandemic has delayed work on non-COVID related activities, including work on SIRs.
- Compliance with Washington State Governor's <u>Proclamation 20-28.15</u> in effect since January 2021 and the provisions contained in <u>Proclamation 20-28.14</u> requiring public meetings be held remotely.

While the proclamation orders are in place, we have used interactive, online public meeting technologies, like WebEx, to meet the Surveillance Ordinance public engagement requirements and ensure ample opportunity for community input. The updated schedule and public engagement plan is provided in Exhibit A, which provides a timeline for submitting the remaining SIRs by December 31, 2021.

Over the course of June and July, ITD held two public engagement meetings with SPD attending to provide a presentation and summary of four technologies under review in Group 4A: Callyo, Audio Recording Systems, I2 iBase, and Maltego. These meetings provided opportunities for questions and answers as well as more information on the usage and protections associated with the technologies. Additionally, as requested by members of the public and the Working Group, this comment period was open for approximately 59 days to allow for open comment opportunities regarding the technologies. We expect to continue a similar length for the next grouping considering the sensitive nature of the technologies.

Despite these delays in public engagement and SIR submission, work has continued on compliance efforts related to the Surveillance Ordinance, including the on-time submission of all CTO Quarterly Determination Reports, as well as collaboration with the City Auditor's Office on the Annual Surveillance Usage Review. Additionally, during this time, the Privacy Office (on behalf of the CTO) will prepare the CTO's September 2021

SIR Status

With Group 1, Group 2, and Group 3 SIRs transmitted by the March 1, 2021 date, 14 of the 28 technologies on the Master List have been submitted to the City Council. The Working Group has been consulted to determine the scope and timeline to finalize Group 4 SIRs, with public engagement conducted through August 2021. This Revised Master List with the "subgrouping" of Group 4 into 4A and 4B respectively ensures there is adequate time for review devoted to each technology without overlap between the many technologies under review.

Working Group Engagement

The Working Group plays a role in drafting an impact assessment as a part of the SIR process and will be engaged to ensure any revised timelines include the 6-8 week review time described by the Surveillance Ordinance:

At the conclusion of the public engagement period, the CTO shall share the final proposed SIR with the Working Group at least six weeks prior to submittal of the SIR to Council for approval. The Working Group shall provide its impact assessment in writing to the Executive and the City Council for inclusion in the SIR within six weeks of receiving the final proposed SIR. If the Working Group does not provide the impact assessment before such time, the Working Group must ask for a two-week extension of time to City Council in writing. If the Working Group fails to submit an impact assessment within eight weeks of receiving the SIR, the department and City Council may proceed with ordinance consideration without the impact assessment.

Public Engagement

Given the statewide orders regarding public meetings as well as social distancing guidelines for protecting public health continuing into 2021, we needed to reconcile the public engagement limitations with Ordinance requirements. Specific language in the Ordinance follows:

14.18.020.C: Prior to requesting Council approval pursuant to subsection 14.18.020.A, the department must complete one or more community meetings with opportunity for public comment and written response. The Council may direct the department to conduct additional community engagement before approval, or after approval as a condition of approval. The community meeting or meetings should be accessible, be noticed in multiple languages, be held in communities impacted by the proposed acquisition, and collect information about potential disparate impacts on disadvantaged groups.

14.18.040.B.4: A description of any community engagement held and any future community engagement plans, including statistics and demographics on attendees, a compilation of all comments

received and departmental responses given, and departmental conclusions about potential neighborhood and disparate impacts that may result from the acquisition.

Although there are challenges and limitations with hosting virtual public meetings, we expect to be able to satisfy the public involvement requirements of the Ordinance regarding location, inclusion of attendee demographic information, comments, answers and analysis in the SIR submission. Additionally, per the requests from community stakeholders, a longer public engagement period of approximately 60 days (per each subgroup) will occur. In order to ensure opportunities for attendance, at least two public engagement meetings will be scheduled.

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Executive Summary

The Seattle City Council passed <u>SMC 14.18</u> known as the "Surveillance Ordinance", to provide greater transparency to City Council and the public when the City acquires technology that meets the City's definition of surveillance. The Surveillance Ordinance, which took effect on September 1, 2017, outlines requirements that include: surveillance technology review and approval by City Council before acquisition, Council review and approval via ordinance for existing technologies, and reporting about surveillance technology use and community impact.

The original master list was submitted to Council and the City Clerk on November 30, 2017. Surveillance Ordinance section three required the City's Chief Technology Officer to compile a Master List of surveillance technologies in use by City departments as of the date the Surveillance Ordinance took effect ("Master List"), and to submit this report within 90 days of the Surveillance Ordinance's effective date. Department privacy champions worked with the Seattle IT Privacy Team to identify surveillance technologies in use. The list in this report represents the best effort of departments to identify existing technologies based on the definition and criteria outlined in the Surveillance Ordinance. Should additional technologies that were in use as of September 1, 2017 be discovered, this report will be amended and resubmitted.

The Master List has been re-ordered to reflect changes in use of technology and Council delivery schedule.

About The Master List

This report was mandated as part the Surveillance Ordinance approved by City Council in August 2017. It was compiled with active input of all City departments. The Master List was compiled through the process detailed in Appendix A, using the criteria detailed in Appendix B.

March 2021 Re-Submission

Per SMC 14.18.050.B. Section 3, "the CTO may make corrections to the master list, which must be timely filed with the City Clerk." The Master List of Surveillance Technologies is being re-submitted to Council, City Clerk, and the Mayor's Office to:

- 1. Revise the order and cadence at which the retroactive SIRs will be submitted.
- 2. Accommodate the timeline and submission cadence of the Surveillance Advisory Working Group and associated public engagement efforts.

August 2021 Re-Submission

Per SMC 14.18.050.B. Section 3, "the CTO may make corrections to the master list, which must be timely filed with the City Clerk." The Master List of Surveillance Technologies is being re-submitted to Council, City Clerk, and the Mayor's Office to:

- 1. Update table for Group 4A and Group 4B. The March 2021 revised Master List grouped three technologies under one (Undercover/ Technologies). They are now represented individually as three separate technologies (Audio Recording Systems, Camera Systems, and Tracking Devices) for an updated total of 28 total technologies. After the ungrouping, Audio Recording Systems was moved to Group 4A and GeoTime was moved to Group 4B. The table for Group 4A and Group 4B has been revised to reflect these updates.
- 2. Accommodate the timeline and submission cadence of the Surveillance Advisory Working Group and associated public engagement efforts.

Surveillance Ordinance

<u>SMC 14.18</u>, also referred to as the "Surveillance Ordinance", took effect on September 1, 2017 and has implications for the acquisition of new technologies by the City, and technologies that are already in use that may fall under the new, broader definition of surveillance.

SMC 14.18.020.B.1 charges the City's Executive with developing a process to identify surveillance technologies subject to the Ordinance. Seattle IT, on behalf of the Executive, developed and implemented a process through which a privacy and surveillance review is completed prior to the acquisition of new technologies. This requirement, and the criteria used in the review process, are documented in Seattle IT Policy PR-02, "Surveillance Policy".



Master List Requirements

Surveillance Ordinance SMC 14.18.050.B. Section 3 requires the City's Chief Technology Officer to compile a Master List of technologies in use as of September 1, 2017 that meets the definition of surveillance technology ("Master List"). Specifically, the Surveillance Ordinance states:

Section 3. Notwithstanding the provisions of Chapter 14.18 of the Seattle Municipal Code, each City department may use surveillance technology that has not received prior Council approval under Chapter 14.18 when the technology is, as of the effective date of this ordinance, (1) in the department's possession or (2) in the execution or closeout phase of acquisition or has had a purchase order issued, pursuant to the Chief Technology Officer's authority under subsection 3.23.030.C of the Seattle Municipal Code; provided, that the department complies with the procedures set forth in this section for Council approval. The SIRs on all identified retroactive technologies on the Master Technology List must be submitted to Council by March 1, 2020. The Executive shall by September 1, 2019 submit to the Council a status report on the development of the SIRs for retroactive technologies. The report shall describe the public engagement and workgroup process that is completed or planned for each SIR as well as a timeline for when the department expects to finish work on all SIRs for retroactive technologies.

Each City department shall compile a list of all surveillance technology that it controls and is utilizing as of the effective date of this ordinance that is not covered by an exemption or exception to the requirements of Chapter 14.18 of the Seattle Municipal Code, and submit it to the CTO, or submit an affirmative statement that there are no such technologies. The list shall identify for each technology whether the technology has received prior Council approval under Chapter 14.18, and if so, the ordinance number. The CTO shall compile a master list that contains the information submitted by each department and that identifies separately for each department the order and timeframe in which the technology is recommended to be brought to the Council for ordinance approval. The master list shall be filed within 90 days of the effective date of this ordinance with the City Clerk, with an electronic copy to the Chair of the committee responsible for technology, the Director of Central Staff, the Chief Technology Officer, and the Inspector General for Public Safety. The CTO may make corrections to the master list, which must be timely filed with the City Clerk. Each City department shall submit requests for surveillance technology ordinance approval for technologies on the master list consistent with Chapter 14.18 of the Seattle Municipal in the order and timeframe contained in the master list, beginning no later than January 31, 2019, and at a rate of at least 12 in a 12-month period. The Council may revise or re-order the master list by resolution.

Note that technologies exempted from Surveillance Ordinance in SMC 14.18.030 are not included in the Master List.

	Parking Enforcement Systems	Several applications are linked together to comprise the enforcement system and used with ALPR for issuing parking citations. This is in support of enforcing the Scofflaw Ordinance SMC 11.35.

ITD is planning to submit the SFD Emergency Scene Cameras and Hazmat Cameras SIR legislation in August for Council consideration. As a retroactive technology, Acyclica is part of Group 4A, but SDOT is currently examining the possibility of discontinuing the use of Acyclica and will provide a status update at the Transportation and Utilities Committee meeting in September 2021. The extended public engagement process and completing the review of four SPD technologies in Group 4A and seven SPD technologies in Group 4B is a 9-month process. The eleven remaining technologies in Group 4A/4B to accommodate an extended public engagement process will be ready for Council submission no later than December 2021.


Appendix A: Retroactive Technology Identification Methodology

The following steps were taken to complete the Master List requirement.

- 1. The Mayor's Office sent a City-wide email to notify City staff, department leaders, and privacy champions that the surveillance audit and inventory of technologies was required.
- 2. The Chief Privacy Officer presented the process and timeline to City executives and leaders to request resources and cooperation.
- 3. Privacy staff met with departments individually to discuss the overall process, discuss specific technologies, and make determinations about Master List technology inclusion.
- 4. Privacy champions and staff were provided with the surveillance checklist (see below) to assist in identifying surveillance technologies that meet Surveillance Ordinance requirements.
- 5. The list of technologies was validated against selection criteria and reviewed by the Chief Technology Officer prior to submission.

Full-Time Equivalent (FTE):

A term that expresses the amount of time a position has been budgeted for in relation to the amount of time a regular, full-time employee normally works in a year.

For budget and planning purposes, a year of full-time employment is defined as 2,088 hours.

A position that has been budgeted to work half-time for a full year, or full-time for only six months, is 0.50 FTE.

Position Type:

There are two type of positions authorized through the Citywide Position List. They are identified by one of the following characters: "F" for full-time or "P" for part-time.

- **Regular Full-Time** is defined as a position budgeted for 2,088 compensated hours per year, 40 hours per week, 80 hours per pay period, and is also known as one full-time equivalent (FTE).
- **Regular Part-Time** is defined as a position that has been designated as part-time, and that requires an average of 20 hours or more, but less than 40 hours of work per week during the year. This equates to an FTE value of at least 0.50 and no more than 0.99. In addition, regular part-time includes Firefighter Pre-Recruit positions, which is budgeted at 0.29 FTE due to the limited time an employee typically occupies the job title while attending recruit school.

ORDINANCE _____

COUNCIL BILL

AN ORDINANCE relating to the Seattle Police Department; banning the ownership, purchase, rent, storage, or use of less lethal weapons; and amending Section 3.28.146 of the Seattle Municipal Code.

WHEREAS, in 2020, tens of thousands of community members joined mass demonstrations in Seattle in

support of black lives and against police violence; and

WHEREAS, the Seattle Police Department (SPD) responded to these protests against police violence with devices designed to cause severe discomfort and/or pain, including tear gas, pepper spray and explosive devices such as blast balls and stun grenades; and

WHEREAS, Seattle's Office of Professional Accountability reported on June 3, 2020 that it had received

15,000 complaints of police misconduct related to SPD's response to these protests; and

- WHEREAS, studies into the impacts of policing at protests have determined that escalating force by police at protests leads to increasing violence; and
- WHEREAS, on June 15, 2020, the City Council adopted Ordinance 126102 banning the ownership, purchase, rent, storage, or use of crowd control weapons, defined as kinetic impact projectiles, chemical irritants, acoustic weapons, directed energy weapons, water cannons, disorientation devices, ultrasonic cannons, or any other device that is designed to be used on multiple individuals for crowd control and is designed to cause pain or discomfort; and
- WHEREAS, on July 24, 2020, the Honorable Judge James L. Robart of the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Washington imposed a temporary restraining order against enactment of Ordinance 126102,

expressing concern that "by removing all forms of less lethal crowd control weapons from virtually all police encounters, the Directive and the CCW Ordinance will not increase public safety," and asked the Office of Police Accountability, the Community Police Commission, and the Office of the Inspector General to review its possible impact on court-mandated police reforms. Judge Robart also expressed concern in the temporary restraining order that the CCW Ordinance did not "provide time for police training in alternative mechanisms to de-escalate and resolve dangerous situations if the crowd control implements with which the officers have been trained are abruptly removed"; and

- WHEREAS, on August 10, 2021, the Honorable Judge Richard Jones of the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Washington issued a preliminary injunction extending a ban on SPD's use of less lethal chemical and projectile weapons against peaceful protesters; and
- WHEREAS, on September 11, 2020, as requested in Ordinance 126102 and consistent with the advisory roles established in the Accountability Ordinance (Ordinance 125315), subsection 3.29.030.B, the Office of Police Accountability, the Community Police Commission, and the Office of the Inspector General reported their findings with respect to the impact of banning less lethal weapons to the Council's Public Safety and Human Services Committee. The findings showed consensus among the three reports to allow specific non-crowd control uses of pepper spray, 40-millimeter launchers and noise flash diversionary devices, and to ban patrol officers' use of tear gas; and
- WHEREAS, on October 1, 2020, the Honorable Judge James L. Robart converted the Court's temporary restraining order regarding Ordinance 126102 into a preliminary injunction in order to facilitate review under the process set forth in paragraphs 177 to 181 of the Consent Decree ("Policy Review Process"); and
- WHEREAS, on December 7, 2020, the Honorable Judge Richard Jones found the Seattle Police Department in contempt of court for the indiscriminate use of blast balls and noted that "Of the less lethal weapons, the

Court is most concerned about SPD's use of blast balls"; and

- WHEREAS, the City Council recognizes the role of the Chief of Police to prescribe rules and regulations for the government and control of the police department; and
- WHEREAS, at the time of passing this ordinance, pursuant to a federal consent decree, the United States Department of Justice, the Honorable James L. Robart of the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Washington, and the court-appointed Seattle Police Monitor exercise oversight of SPD's policies related to the use of force; and
- WHEREAS, on February 26, 2021, the U.S. District Court for the Western District of Washington issued an order in United States v. City of Seattle, Civil Case Number 12-1282, approving SPD's revised use of force and crowd management policies, which included authorization of the deployment of officers trained in the use of use of 40-millimeter launchers in crowd management events, upon approval of the Chief of Police, and authorization of the use of a pepperball launcher "only when such force is objectively reasonable, necessary, and proportional to protect against a specific imminent threat of harm to officers or identifiable others or to respond to specific acts of violence or destruction of property"; and
- WHEREAS, on May 18, 2021, Governor Inslee signed ESHB 1054, establishing requirements for tactics and equipment used by peace officers, which include 1) restricting law enforcement agencies from using tear gas unless necessary to alleviate a present risk of serious harm posed by a: (a) riot; (b) barricaded subject; or (c) hostage situation; 2) requiring that, prior to using tear gas the law enforcement officer or employee must exhaust alternatives to the use of tear gas, obtain authorization to use tear gas from a supervising officer, announce to the subject or subjects the intent to use tear gas, and allow sufficient time and space for compliance with the officer's or employee's directives; and 3) directing that, in the case of a riot outside of a correctional, jail, or detention facility, the law enforcement officer or employee may use tear gas only after receiving authorization from the highest elected official of the

jurisdiction in which the tear gas is to be used; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. Section 3.28.146 of the Seattle Municipal Code, enacted by Ordinance 126102, is amended as follows:

3.28.146 Prohibition of the use of ((crowd control)) less lethal weapons

A. Unless exempted or excepted, no City department shall own, purchase, rent, store or use ((crowd control)) less lethal weapons.

B. Law enforcement agencies operating under mutual aid agreements are prohibited from using ((erowd eontrol)) less lethal weapons in a manner inconsistent with this Section 3.28.146 while rendering aid to the Seattle Police Department. Seattle Police Department mutual aid agreements for crowd control must prohibit other law enforcement agencies from using ((erowd control)) less lethal weapons ((for the purpose of crowd dispersal)) in a manner inconsistent with this Section 3.28.146.

C. As used in this Section 3.28.146((,)):

"For the purpose of crowd control" means with the intent to move or disperse a crowd.

"((crowd control)) Less lethal weapons" means kinetic impact ((projectiles)) launchers used to deploy chemical irritants; (($_{7}$)) chemical irritants, including but not limited to pepper spray and tear gas; (($_{7}$)) acoustic weapons(($_{7}$)) ; directed energy weapons(($_{7}$)) ; water cannons(($_{7}$)) ; disorientation devices, including but not limited to blast balls and noise flash diversionary devices; ultrasonic cannons(($_{7}$)) ; or any other device that is primarily designed to be used on multiple individuals for crowd control and is designed to cause pain or discomfort.

<u>"Violent public disturbance" means any gathering where 12 or more persons who are present</u> together use or threaten to use unlawful violence towards another person or group of people and the conduct of them (taken together) is such as would cause a person of reasonable firmness present at the scene to fear for his

personal safety.

D. ((Oleoresin capsicum (OC) spray is not a crowd control weapon for purposes of owning, purchasing, renting, or storing under subsection 3.28.146.A. Use of OC spray is prohibited under subsection 3.28.146.A if

1. It is used in a demonstration, rally, or other First Amendment-protected event; or

2. When used to subdue an individual in the process of committing a criminal act or presenting an imminent danger to others, it lands on anyone other than that individual.))

Noise flash diversionary devices are not banned as less lethal weapons for purposes of subsection 3.28.146.A if used by Special Weapons and Tactics (SWAT) officers outside the setting of a demonstration or rally in circumstances in which the risk of serious bodily injury from violent actions outweighs the risk of harm to bystanders.

E. Forty-millimeter launchers used to deploy chemical irritants and launchers used to deploy pepperballs are not banned as less lethal weapons for purposes of subsection 3.28.146.A if:

1. Used by SWAT officers outside the setting of a demonstration or rally in circumstances in which the risk of serious bodily injury from violent actions outweighs the risk of harm to bystanders; or

2. Used by SWAT officers in a demonstration or rally for purposes other than crowd control in circumstances in which the risk of serious bodily injury from violent actions outweighs the risk of harm to bystanders.

F. Oleoresin capsicum (OC) spray is not banned as a less lethal weapon for purposes of subsection 3.28.146.A if:

1. It is being used outside the setting of a demonstration or rally and the risk of serious bodily injury from violent actions outweighs the risk of harm to bystanders; or

2. It is being used at a demonstration or rally, but not for the purpose of crowd control, and the risk of serious bodily injury from violent actions outweighs the risk of harm to bystanders; or

3. It is being used at a demonstration or rally for the purpose of crowd control, during a violent

public disturbance, and the risk of serious bodily injury from violent actions outweighs the risk of harm to bystanders.

G. Tear gas is not banned as a less lethal weapon for purposes of subsection 3.28.146.A if:

1. It is being used by SWAT officers outside the setting of a demonstration or rally, the use is reasonably necessary to prevent threat of imminent loss of life or serious bodily injury, and the risk of serious bodily injury from violent actions outweighs the risk of harm to bystanders; or

2. It is being used in a violent public disturbance, under direction of or by officers who have received training for its use within the previous 12 months, with a detailed tactical plan developed prior to deployment, the use is reasonably necessary to prevent threat of imminent loss of life or serious bodily injury, and the risk of serious bodily injury from violent actions outweighs the risk of harm to bystanders.

((E))<u>H</u>. A person shall have a right of action against the City for physical or emotional injuries proximately caused by the use of ((erowd control)) less lethal weapons in violation of this Section 3.28.146((for erowd dispersal)) after this ordinance takes effect. <u>A person who, in the judgment of a reasonable person,</u> commits a criminal offense at or immediately prior to the use of less lethal force may not recover under this <u>Section 3.28.146</u>.

((F))<u>I</u>. Absent evidence establishing a greater amount of damages, the damages payable to an individual for injuries proximately caused in violation of this Section 3.28.146 shall be \$10,000, added to attorney fees and court fees. This does not preclude any other legal recovery or process available to a person under federal and state law.

Section 2. In accordance with United States of America v. City of Seattle, 12 Civ. 1282 (JLR), during the pendency of the consent decree Council requests that notice of this action be submitted by the City Attorney to the Department of Justice and the Monitor.

Section 3. Council will engage with the Labor Relations Director and staff as they work with the City's

labor partners in the implementation of this ordinance.

Section 4. Within 60 days after this ordinance takes effect, the Seattle Police Department shall draft revisions to the Seattle Police Manual to bring it into compliance with this ordinance and publish the proposed revisions on its website.

Section 5. Section 1 of this ordinance shall take effect and be in force 30 days after the Court in United States v. City of Seattle, Western District of Washington Civil Case Number 12-cv-1282, has approved the revised policies required by Section 4 of this ordinance.

Section 6. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force 30 days after its approval by the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten days after presentation, it shall take effect as provided by Seattle Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.

Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE relating to the Seattle Police Department; banning the ownership, purchase, rent, storage, or use of less lethal weapons; and amending Section 3.28.146 of the Seattle Municipal Code.

Summary and background of the Legislation: This legislation would restrict City use of several less lethal weapons, including tear gas, pepper spray, and noise flash diversionary devices, and it would prohibit the use of blast balls, acoustic weapons, directed energy weapons, water cannons and ultrasonic cannons. It also provides up to 90 days for the Seattle Police Department to revise its policies with respect to the use of less lethal weapons and train officers on implementation of the new policies. If passed, the bill would supersede the total ban on less lethal weapons imposed by Ordinance 126102, which was passed by Council on June 15, 2020 and is currently subject to a preliminary injunction by the US District Court.

AN ORDINANCE relating to parking enforcement; amending Ordinance 126237, which adopted the 2021
 Budget; transferring positions out of the Seattle Police Department; and ratifying and confirming certain prior acts.
 WHEREAS, throughout the summer of 2020, Seattle residents took to the streets to protest the unjust murders

of Black Americans, including George Floyd and Breonna Taylor and the shooting of Jacob Blake; all of

these individuals experienced violent and lethal force at the hands of the police; and

WHEREAS, in response to this local and national civil rights reckoning, community members and civic

leaders, including the Mayor and members of the City Council, have committed to a holistic review and

community-led discussion around the effectiveness of the current way that community safety is

provided in Seattle; and

- WHEREAS, the shared vision for reimagining Seattle's system of community safety recognizes the importance of providing alternatives to armed police officer response, including civilian and community-based services and solutions; and
- WHEREAS, based on community input, the Mayor and the City Council have pursued the transfer of certain functions out of the Seattle Police Department, including Emergency Management, 9-1-1 Dispatch, Crime Victim Advocates, and Parking Enforcement; and
- WHEREAS, Ordinance 126233 passed by the City Council on November 23, 2020, created within the Executive Department a Community Safety and Communications Center to provide timely, accurate, and vital information to the City's first responders, city service providers, and to the public and to

provide civilian and community-based services and solutions to community safety challenges; and

- WHEREAS, Ordinance 126233 established as the first two functions of the Community Safety and
 Communications Center to: 1) act as the city's Primary Public Safety Answering Point (PSAP),
 providing 24-hour public safety communication and dispatch services for 9-1-1- calls originating in
 Seattle; and 2) provide parking enforcement to assist in the administration of traffic laws, to the extent
 allowed by the commission of Parking Enforcement Officers as Special Police Officers and in
 coordination with the Seattle Police Department and the Seattle Department of Transportation, effective
 June 1, 2021; and
- WHEREAS, Ordinance 126353, passed by the City Council on May 24, 2021 and signed by the Mayor on May 28, 2021, transferred all 9-1-1 Dispatch positions from the Seattle Police Department to the Community Safety and Communications Center; and
- WHEREAS, Ordinance 126350, passed by the City Council on May 24, 2021 and signed by the Mayor on May 28, 2021, modified a budget proviso to enable positions in the Parking Enforcement Officers Unit to remain in the Seattle Police Department until September 1, 2021; and
- WHEREAS, the City Council has determined that a potentially expanded role for parking enforcement officers in traffic safety best aligns with the Seattle Department of Transportation's mission and existing operations; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

COUNCIL BILL _____

AN ORDINANCE relating to land use and zoning; adopting interim provisions by amending Sections 23.76.004, 23.76.006, and 23.76.032 of, and adding a new Section 23.42.041 to, the Seattle Municipal Code to facilitate occupancy of street-level spaces downtown during the COVID-19 civil emergency; and adopting a work plan.

WHEREAS, due to the COVID-19 outbreak, street-level businesses downtown have been impacted and many

have gone out of business due to the lack of customers, particularly office workers, tourists, and

convention attendees; and

- WHEREAS, the Seattle Comprehensive Plan has as a Goal (G1) to: Maintain Downtown Seattle as the most important of the region's urban centers-a compactly developed area supporting a diversity of uses meeting the employment, residential, shopping, culture, service, and entertainment needs of the broadest range of the region's population; and
- WHEREAS, the Seattle Comprehensive Plan has as a Policy (P11) to: Regulate uses at street-level in certain areas in order to generate pedestrian interest and activity in conformance with policies for the pedestrian environment. Promote street-level uses to reinforce existing retail concentrations, enhance main pedestrian links between areas, and generate new pedestrian activity where appropriate to meet area objectives without diluting existing concentrations of retail activity. Promote active and accessible uses at the street-level of new development where it is important to maintain the continuity of retail activity. Consider measures to promote street-level space of adequate size and sufficient flexibility to accommodate a variety of retail and service activities. Encourage incorporation, as appropriate, of street

-level uses as part of open space public amenity features provided for a floor area bonus to promote activity and increase public use of these spaces. To encourage active and accessible street-level uses throughout Downtown, consider appropriate exemptions of these uses from floor area limits; and

WHEREAS, the Land Use Code amendments proposed in this ordinance would expand opportunities for new businesses to occupy vacant street-level spaces Downtown, consistent with and in furtherance of Comprehensive Plan goals and policies; NOW, THEREFORE,

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:

Section 1. The City Council finds and declares that:

A. On February 29, 2020, Governor Inslee proclaimed a State of Emergency for all counties throughout the State of Washington as a result of the confirmed person-to-person spread of COVID-19 in Washington State.

B. The COVID-19 disease, caused by a coronavirus that spreads easily from person to person and which may cause serious injury and death, has spread throughout King County and the City of Seattle.

C. On March 3, 2020, Mayor Durkan issued a Proclamation of Civil Emergency declaring a civil emergency within the City of Seattle based on the confirmed spread of COVID-19 in King County and resulting deaths.

D. In recognition of the danger that hospitals may become overwhelmed with COVID-19 patients unless the spread of the disease is slowed, on March 23, 2020, Governor Inslee imposed a stay-home order throughout Washington State prohibiting all people in the State from leaving their homes or participating in gatherings with only limited exceptions for participating in essential activities or essential business services. While the order initially was for a term of two weeks, the Governor has issued numerous subsequent orders in 2020 and in 2021 limiting business and economic activity to prevent the further spread of the coronavirus and maintain hospital capacity for people with severe cases of COVID-19.

E. Pursuant to the Governor's Orders, all businesses except essential businesses were forced to close or operate virtually for much of the last 18 months.

F. While many citizens have obtained COVID-19 vaccinations in the first two quarters of 2021 and while most COVID-19 occupancy restrictions were lifted on June 30, 2021, the rapid spread of the Delta variant of the coronavirus may require renewed occupancy limitations.

G. Limitations on business and economic activity over the last 18 months have disproportionately impacted businesses at street-level in downtown and in South Lake Union, which are acutely impacted by the lack of office workers in these neighborhoods as well as the lack of tourists and conventions. This impact has and continues to deprive these businesses of the customers previously available to support them, and this extended period of closure and significantly reduced capacity has resulted in numerous street level businesses downtown unable financially to continue to operate at reduced levels and with such a reduced customer base. The Downtown Seattle Association conducted a count in 2021 and found 161 vacant storefronts downtown. The South Lake Union Chamber has identified 23 business closures during the pandemic, for which there has only been a partial recovery.

H. The changes in this ordinance are designed to allow more types of businesses to be located at streetlevel downtown, thereby increasing the opportunities to fill those spaces and generate income and activity downtown. This is especially important given the length of time that the State shutdown order has been in place because much in-person business activity continues to be limited.

I. Providing regulatory flexibility for street-level businesses will keep more businesses operating and speed the economic recovery once COVID-19 restrictions are lifted.

J. The City Council determines that the foregoing creates a basis for adopting interim regulations under RCW 36.70A.390 which authorizes adoption of the ordinance without a required pre-adoption public hearing and a SEPA threshold determination. Following the standard process would delay the proposed changes for

several months. During that period, for the reasons discussed above, more businesses may fail leading to increased unemployment and continued lack of potential customers, workers, and visitors downtown. Both continued closure of businesses and continued lack of customers, workers and visitors downtown will delay the City's and region's recovery from the COVID-19 emergency.

K. The City has legal authority to establish interim measures pursuant to the authority granted by Article 11, Section 11 of the Washington Constitution, the Growth Management Act, RCW 36.70A.390, and *Matson v. Clark County*, 79 Wn. App. 641 (1995).

Section 2. A new Section 23.42.041 is added to the Seattle Municipal Code as follows:

23.42.041 Additional interim street-level uses

Where street-level uses are required in any SM-SLU zone, except Valley Street between Fairview Avenue North and Westlake Avenue North, or downtown zone, except in the International Special Review District, the interim uses set forth in this Section 23.42.041 are allowed in addition to uses allowed by the zone for an interim period according to the provisions of this Section 23.42.041.

A. Eligibility. In order to qualify for an interim street-level use, an applicant must demonstrate the following:

1. The Department had issued a certificate of occupancy for the structure prior to the effective date of this ordinance.

2. The applicant submits a complete application for interim street-level use within 12 months after the effective date of this ordinance.

3. Structures with existing permit conditions, or development standard limitations related to street-level uses for floor area ratio pursuant to Section 23.49.011 or bonus floor area achieved for general sales and service uses pursuant to Sections 23.49.012 and 23.49.013 may use interim street level use(s) pursuant to this Section 23.42.041 and will not require additional developer contributions.

4. The space may return to the previously established use at the property owner's or applicant's option, consistent with Section 23.42.108.

5. Notwithstanding the expiration of the interim regulations, an approval for interim street-level uses or a permit that is issued or approved for issuance prior to the expiration of the interim regulations can continue as a non-conforming use consistent with Sections 23.42.100 through 23.42.110.

6. Except for uses that are prohibited pursuant to Section 23.66.122 and subsection 23.66.130.E, interim street-level uses permitted pursuant to this Section 23.42.041 in the Pioneer Square Preservation District shall be approved pursuant to Subchapter II of Chapter 23.66 and the following:

a. Street-level for the purposes of application of this subsection 23.42.041.A.6 means a story or stories located within 8 feet measured horizontally above or below street-level.

b. The Pioneer Square Preservation Board ("Board") may, following a special review of potential impacts, including, but not limited to, traffic, parking, noise, and the scale and character of the pedestrian environment, recommend to the Director of Neighborhoods that the uses at street-level be approved if the impacts of such uses are not significantly adverse. The Board may recommend, and the Director of Neighborhoods may impose, conditions to mitigate the impacts of approved uses.

c. The Director of Neighborhoods shall make the decision about allowing similar uses set forth at subsection 23.42.041.B.1.l.

B. Permitted uses

1. In addition to the street-level uses permitted by the applicable zone, the following uses are permitted:

a. Arts facilities, including art installations, that do not conflict with Chapter 23.55;

b. Shower facilities for bicycle commuters accessory to office uses;

c. Food processing and craft work;

d. Horticultural uses;

e. Institutions, except hospitals or major institutions;

f. Lobbies, gyms, meeting rooms, shared working spaces, and other similarly active uses accessory to residential or lodging uses limited to a street frontage of 30 feet;

g. Medical services;

h. Museums;

i. Public parks;

j. Public restrooms;

k. Sales and services, non-household and heavy commercial, except heavy commercial

sales; and

 Any similar use or activity that is determined by the Director to have the likelihood of attracting and increasing pedestrian activity in the area such as extending the duration of activity beyond 8
 A.M. to 5 P.M. Monday to Friday or increasing the variety of goods and services available.

2. The Director shall require the most active portions of uses allowed by subsection 23.42.041.B, such as lobbies, waiting areas, and retail sales, to abut the street-facing facade along street frontages where street-level uses are required by the zone.

Section 3. Table A for Section 23.76.004 of the Seattle Municipal Code, which section was last amended by Ordinance 126042, is amended as follows:

Section 4. Section 23.76.006 the Seattle Municipal Code, last amended by Ordinance 126042, is

amended as follows:

23.76.006 Master Use Permits required

A. Type I, II, and III decisions are components of Master Use Permits. Master Use Permits are required

for all projects requiring one or more of these decisions.

B. The following decisions are Type I:

1. Determination that a proposal complies with development standards;

2. Establishment or change of use for uses permitted outright, uses allowed under Section

23.42.038, temporary relocation of police and fire stations for 24 months or less, transitional encampment

interim use, temporary uses for four weeks or less not otherwise permitted in the zone, and renewals of

temporary uses for up to six months, except temporary uses and facilities for light rail transit facility

construction;

3. The following street use approvals:

a. Curb cut for access to parking, whether associated with a development proposal or not;

b. Concept approval of street improvements associated with a development proposal,

such as additional on-street parking, street landscaping, curbs and gutters, street drainage, sidewalks, and paving;

c. Structural building overhangs associated with a development proposal;

d. Areaways associated with a development proposal;

4. Lot boundary adjustments;

5. Modification of the following features bonused under Title 24:

- a. Plazas;
- b. Shopping plazas;
- c. Arcades;
- d. Shopping arcades; and
- e. Voluntary building setbacks;

6. Determinations of Significance (determination that an Environmental Impact Statement is required) for Master Use Permits and for building, demolition, grading, and other construction permits

(supplemental procedures for environmental review are established in Chapter 25.05, Environmental Policies and Procedures), except for Determinations of Significance based solely on historic and cultural preservation;

7. Discretionary exceptions for certain business signs authorized by subsection 23.55.042.D;

- 8. Waiver or modification of required right-of-way improvements;
- 9. Special accommodation pursuant to Section 23.44.015;
- 10. Reasonable accommodation;
- 11. Minor amendment to Major Phased Development Permit;

12. Streamlined design review decisions pursuant to Section 23.41.018 if no development standard departures are requested pursuant to Section 23.41.012, and design review decisions in an MPC zone if no development standard departures are requested pursuant to Section 23.41.012;

13. Shoreline special use approvals that are not part of a shoreline substantial development permit;

1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE relating to land use and zoning; adopting interim provisions by amending Sections 23.76.004, 23.76.006, and 23.76.032 of, and adding a new Section 23.42.041 to, the Seattle Municipal Code to facilitate occupancy of street-level spaces downtown during the COVID-19 civil emergency; and adopting a work plan.

Summary and background of the Legislation: The Seattle Department of Construction and Inspections (SDCI), Office of Planning and Community Development, and the Department of Neighborhoods are recommending land use legislation to add more flexibility for uses allowed to occupy storefronts Downtown, including the Pioneer Square Preservation District, on certain streets where the allowed uses are limited. Due to the COVID 19 virus outbreak, Downtown has lost many businesses that relied on office workers, tourists and convention participants. The result is many vacant storefronts, substantially reduced activity on downtown sidewalks, and a general loss in vitality.

The proposed Land Use Code amendments would temporarily (for 12 months) expand the types of uses that can locate in downtown storefronts to help fill vacancies and promote active streets. The proposed uses are drawn from pedestrian shopping districts outside of Downtown and include uses such as medical services. While in place, a property or business owner could get a permit to establish a type of use that is not normally allowed. The permit, as with all permits, would be good in perpetuity.

Does the legislation have other financial impacts to the City of Seattle that are not reflected in the above, including direct or indirect, short-term or long-term costs?

No direct financial impacts, direct or indirect, are anticipated from adoption of this legislation. The cost of administering the proposal is anticipated to be covered by existing fees and with existing staff. Upgrades to the permit tracking system to aid SDCI in tracking permits under this legislation are covered by existing resources.

Is there financial cost or other impacts of *not* implementing the legislation?

The is no direct financial cost of not implementing the legislation. Failure to implement this or similar legislation could prolong challenges that the City is facing to help fill vacant spaces in downtown storefronts and generate economic activity and tax revenue.

4. OTHER IMPLICATIONS

a. Does this legislation affect any departments besides the originating department?

The legislation would affect, and has been developed in partnership with, the Office of Economic Development, Office of Planning and Community Development (OPCD), and the Department of Neighborhoods. SDCI and DON will have responsibility to review permit applications that may use this legislation. No impacts to any departments are anticipated.

b. Is a public hearing required for this legislation?

A public hearing is required because this legislation would amend the Land Use Code (Title 23) and is a Type V Council land use decision; however, because the legislation is adopted on an interim basis under RCW 36.70A.390, the hearing will occur within 60 days after the ordinance is adopted.

c. Is publication of notice with *The Daily Journal of Commerce* and/or *The Seattle Times* required for this legislation?

Public notice is required for a City Council public hearing in *The Daily Journal of Commerce* and the City's Land Use Information Bulletin as well as for the future environmental review (SEPA) for a comment and appeal period.

d. Does this legislation affect a piece of property?

No. The legislation would not directly affect any specific piece of property but would modify the type of businesses allowed on certain properties on certain streets within the Downtown Urban Center, excluding the International Special Review District.

e. Please describe any perceived implication for the principles of the Race and Social Justice Initiative. Does this legislation impact vulnerable or historically disadvantaged communities? What is the Language Access plan for any communications to the public?

The proposal is intended to create opportunities for new businesses and jobs, which may extend to BIPOC communities. Further actions are anticipated to help BIPOC-owned businesses and job seekers experience the benefits from the proposal, including communication in multiple languages. OPCD and SDCI are working with other departments/offices on methods/materials to help BIPOC and other businesses navigate the permit process, and provide priority processing.

f. Climate Change Implications

1. Emissions: Is this legislation likely to increase or decrease carbon emissions in a material way?

The legislation is not likely to have a material effect on carbon emissions. To the extent that the legislation facilitates incrementally more businesses providing goods and services downtown, the legislation could marginally increase the number of Seattle residents able to meet daily needs without the use of a car.

4. The space may return to the previously established use at the property owner's or applicant's option, consistent with Section 23.42.108.

5. Notwithstanding the expiration of the interim regulations, an approval for interim street-level uses or a permit that is issued or approved for issuance prior to the expiration of the interim regulations can continue as a non-conforming use consistent with Sections 23.42.100 through 23.42.110.

6. Except for uses that are prohibited pursuant to Section 23.66.122 and subsection 23.66.130.E, interim street-level uses permitted pursuant to this Section 23.42.041 in the Pioneer Square Preservation District shall be approved pursuant to Subchapter II of Chapter 23.66 and the following:

a. Street-level for the purposes of application of this subsection

23.42.041.A.6 means a story or stories located within 8 feet measured horizontally above or below street-level.

b. <u>No office use may occupy more than 50 percent of the street-level</u> <u>frontage of a block that is 20,000 square feet or more in area.</u>

c. The Director of the Department of Neighborhoods Pioneer Square

Effect: This amendment would authorize the Director of Neighborhoods to make administrative decisions about authorizing and conditioning uses at the street-level in the Pioneer Square Special Review District while the interim controls are in effect and limit the scope of review to the pedestrian environment. The amendment would also limit the street frontage of office uses in Pioneer Square for large sites.

Background:

As a first-generation Fijian American and the only woman of color in my position, I appreciate that issues at the forefront of my mind are not necessarily the same as the firm's leaders. I also understand that educating those leaders about the issues that are significant to me is an essential part of bridging the gap between our lived experiences. To that end, I have dedicated a great deal of time and effort to working with firm management to foster a more inclusive and equitable environment. For example, among other work, I have encouraged firm management to bring in speakers to present on implicit bias and microaggressions, and have spoken with firm management about how adopting a transparent pay structure could close pay gaps.

I have also played an integral role in securing funding to increase the visibility and engagement opportunities for the LGBTQ+ affinity group. Indeed, with the firm's support, I helped organize a Pride Month celebration where firm personnel could learn about the LGBTQ+ community and its history. We also ensured that we had name tags for individuals to indicate their pronouns and collaborated with LGBTQ+ colleagues to ensure that their identities were reflected at the event. More than one person commented to me how they appreciated being given the opportunity to learn about terms and events that they may not have previously understood or been aware of. As a commissioner, I hope to advocate for policies that make Seattle a more equitable environment for women, particularly concerning economic opportunities and physical safety. I want to do so in a way that acknowledges and addresses the intersectionality of women in Seattle.



CITY OF SEATTLE

RESOLUTION

A RESOLUTION supporting the creation of a United States Truth and Healing Commission on Indian Boarding Schools and other actions to address the lasting harm of Indian boarding schools. WHEREAS, we acknowledge that we are on the homelands of Chief Si'ahl (Seattle), who was a Chief of the dxw'dəw?ábš (People-of-the-Inside), now known as the Duwamish Tribe of Indians. We acknowledge that the Duwamish River flows through lands adjacent to the Salish Sea that have been occupied and stewarded by Indigenous peoples since time immemorial. We honor our Indigenous relatives by committing ourselves to the ongoing relationship that exists between Indigenous peoples and these places; and

- WHEREAS, we envision a city whose success, safety, and health are exemplified through our collective work: a city where all community members and visitors have the freedom, agency, and platform to share and amplify their true and accurate history, language, cultures and experiences. At the same time, we acknowledge that our actions-both conscious and unconscious, past and present-have benefited some communities while limiting opportunities and outcomes for others, notably for American Indians, Alaska Natives and Native Hawaiians. The City of Seattle works toward our vision by addressing and working to eliminate institutional racism and to repair the damage caused by harmful policies and behaviors in programs and practices; and
- WHEREAS, boarding schools for American Indians, Alaska Natives, and Native Hawaiians ("Indian boarding schools") were established by the United States Government to strip American Indian, Alaska Native, and Native Hawaiian children of their Indigenous identities, beliefs, and languages, in order to

assimilate them into non-Indian culture, through federally funded, Christian-denomination schools, which had the effect of cultural genocide; and

- WHEREAS, Indian boarding schools employed practices including assimilation, corporal punishments, and child labor, which were often carried out without law or policy; and
- WHEREAS, the deliberate intention of Indian boarding schools was the separation of Native American children from their families, cultures, and Tribal communities through removal, cutting their hair, taking their clothing and issuing uniforms, forbidding them to speak their language or engage in any cultural practices, and carrying out severe and often corporal punishments constituting, in many cases, physical, emotional, and mental torture for non-compliance, including the forced sterilization of Native American women; and
- WHEREAS, Indian boarding schools were created through the Indian Civilization Fund Act of 1819, which was created to administer the education, healthcare, and rations promised to Tribal Nations under treaty law, and President Ulysses S. Grant's Peace Policy of 1868, which opened the Civilization Funds to be used by churches; and
- WHEREAS, as a result of those laws, over 367 Indian boarding schools were established and run by the government and religious organizations located throughout the United States. Children as young as three years of age were sent away to Indian boarding schools across Washington State and, in many cases, Native American children were sent out of state; and
- WHEREAS, by 1926, nearly 83 percent of American Indian and Alaska Native school-age children were taken and enrolled in Indian boarding schools in the United States, but because nearly 62 percent of the school records have been lost or destroyed, the full extent of the Indian boarding school policy has not been identified; and
- WHEREAS, the National Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition (NABS) filed a Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) request to the Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) in 2016 asking how many

boarding schools the government funded, how many children attended, and how many went missing or died at the schools, and the BIA responded that they could not answer because research would need to be done; and

- WHEREAS, the National Native American Boarding School Healing Coalition (NABS) through independent research has only been able to locate records for 38 percent of the 367 listed boarding schools. Records for approximately 62 percent of the schools on the list are in unknown locations, including records of children who lived in the State of Washington and neighboring states; and
- WHEREAS, in June 2021 Secretary of the Interior Debra Haaland announced a Federal Indian Boarding School Initiative to create a comprehensive review of the troubled legacy of federal Indian boarding school policies; and
- WHEREAS, Secretary Haaland said the program would "shed light on the unspoken traumas of the past, no matter how hard it will be ... but only by acknowledging the past can we work toward a future we are proud to embrace"; and
- WHEREAS, the Federal Indian Boarding School Initiative will serve as an investigation about the loss of human life and the lasting consequences of residential Indian boarding schools, the primary goal of which will be to identify boarding school facilities and sites, the location of known and possible student burial sites located at or near school facilities, and the identities and Tribal affiliations of students interred at such locations; and
- WHEREAS, the work will proceed in several phases and include the identification and collection of records and information related to the Department of the Interior's own oversight and implementation of the Indian boarding school program, with formal consultations across the nation; and
- WHEREAS, NABS is working with members of the U.S. Congress to create a U.S. Truth and Healing Commission on Indian Boarding Schools Act to be introduced in 2021; NOW, THEREFORE,

CONCURRING, THAT:

Section 1. The City of Seattle supports the Federal Indian Boarding School Initiative by the U.S. Department of the Interior to do the following:

A. Investigate the loss of human life and lasting consequences of residential boarding schools for American Indians, Alaska Natives, and Native Hawaiians ("Indian boarding schools"), specifically by identifying boarding school facilities and sites; the location of known and possible student burial sites located at or near school facilities, and the identities and Tribal affiliations of children interred at such locations.

B. Conduct a survey of historical records in federal repositories such as the National Archives and the American Indian Records Repository, as well as non-governmental organization records, and prepare a report detailing these historical records.

C. Consult with Tribal Nations, Alaska Native corporations, and Native Hawaiian organizations to determine the nature and scope of proposed work concerning Indian boarding schools prior to beginning such work.

Section 2. The City of Seattle supports ongoing consultation on how to identify and protect burial sites and historical documents about the history of abuse at Indian boarding schools, to use these locations and historical records to show the scope and impact of Indian boarding schools, and to shed light on how federal Indian boarding schools contributed to cultural genocide in our country.

Section 3. The City of Seattle supports congressional approval of a U.S. Truth and Healing Commission on Indian Boarding Schools Act. The Act, when introduced, would establish the first formal commission in United States history to investigate, document, and acknowledge past injustices of the federal government's cultural genocide and assimilation practices, which would build on the Department of the Interior's Initiative.

Section 4. The City of Seattle supports these actions as a step toward creating a more just future, one in which similar sanctioned abuse, neglect, and harm against children and families shall be prevented and never again be repeated.
