### **CB 120908 LEG Capital Gains Excise Tax ORD**

(1/8)

#### **Background**

State capital gains excise tax :

- Adopted by Chapter 196, Laws of 2021, effective July 25, 2021
- 7 percent tax on the gains from sales of long-term assets above \$250,000 standard deduction (\$262,000 in Tax Year 2023)
- Tax proceeds deposited into Education Legacy trust Account and Common School Construction Account
- State Supreme Court upheld tax in Quinn v. State of Washington
- State collected \$840 million in first of the tax (2023) and \$371 million\* in 2024

\*As of May 2024.

- Same structure as the state tax, with different rate
- 2 percent excise tax on gains from the sale of non-exempt capital assets
- Deductions include:
  - \$262,000 standard deduction for single and joint filers
  - Any amounts prohibited from taxation under the state or federal constitution
  - Gains from the sale of a qualified family-owned small business
  - Up to \$105,000 of charitable donations above a \$262,000 minimum qualifying charitable deduction
  - Thresholds are inflated by CPI each year, consistent with state tax

### CB 120908 – Capital Gains Excise Tax

(3/8)

- Gains from transactions involving the following capital assets are exempt:
  - Real estate
  - Retirement accounts
  - Condemnations
  - Livestock, commercial fishing, timber
  - Goodwill from auto dealership

Effective January 1, 2026, with first collections April 2027

## Examples (4/8)

**Taxpayer 1**: Sold \$1 million of stock in 2026 with original cost basis of \$700,000, for a total net capital gain of \$300,000

Value of stock sold: \$1,000,000

Cost basis of stock sold: \$700,000

Net Capital Gain (2026): \$300,000

Less: Standard Deduction (\$262,000)

Taxable Capital Gain \$48,000

Tax due April 2027@2% rate \$960

**Examples** (5/8)

Taxpayer 2: Purchased a house in 2010 for \$200,000 and sold it in 2026 for \$1.2 million

Proceeds from house sale (2026):	\$1,200,000
Purchase price (2010):	\$200,000
Capital gain:	\$1,000,000
Capital gaill.	71,000,000

Less: Exemption: (\$1,000,000)

Taxable Capital Gain \$0

Tax due April 2027@2% rate \$0 **Revenue Estimate** 

(6/8)

- The City's Office of Economic and Revenue Forecasts estimated revenue range using state collections data from 2023, the State's forecast, and assumptions about Seattle's share of the state total, and taxpayer compliance/avoidance
- State forecast: \$445 million in 2027, representing 13% growth from 2024 and 4.5 percent annual growth thereafter
- Using this approach, Seattle 2027 revenues could range from \$16 million (lower Seattle share of state total, and higher taxpayer avoidance) to \$51 million (higher Seattle share of state total, lower taxpayer avoidance, and higher revenue growth)
- Revenue estimates would be further informed by state collections in 2025 and 2026.

Caveats and Risks (7/8)

State's 2023 tax collections were from by a very small number of taxpayers

- State tax: 816 taxpayers had a Seattle address
- 85 percent of the Seattle total was paid by 163 taxpayers
- Tax base largely consists of sales of equities, which are subject to stock market volatility
- Tax is based on where taxpayer is domiciled, making it potentially avoidable by residents with multiple Washington addresses
- Forecast Office indicates an unusually high degree of uncertainty in the estimate
- Annual revenue from the tax could fluctuate widely above and below the estimates

(8/8)

- Assuming a January 1, 2026, effective date, the first tax collections would be April 2027
- Finance and Administrative Service's implementation cost estimates:
  - One-time startup costs of \$1 million, and ongoing costs of \$1.2 million per year, for systems and staffing
  - 18-to-24-month implementation timeline
  - Actual costs determined through budget request
- Budget decisions that rely on this revenue source will be made in the context of this high level of uncertainty
- To accommodate the significant uncertainty associated with projected revenues, initial appropriations could be limited to the "bottom end" of the forecast range, or delayed until after the City receives its first actual revenue collections (April 2027)

### **CB 120909 LEG Capital Gains Tax Use of Proceeds ORD**

- Earmarks capital gains excise tax revenues from CB 120908 to:
  - Rental assistance to rent burdened households,
  - Down payment assistance to low, moderate, and workforce households; and,
  - Food assistance to food insecure households.
- States Council's intent to make more detailed spending allocations through either a resolution, or the annual budget process.

### **CB 120911 LEG Seattle Channel Funding Plan ORD**

- States the Council's intent to establish a dedicated and ongoing funding plan for the Seattle Channel, including the following sources:
  - Cable Franchise Fees at least 50%, but no less than \$1.7 million, of annual revenues
  - Seattle IT Cost Allocation allocate expenditures in support of department priorities to those departments
  - General Fund exclusively for the coverage of meetings, press conferences, and other public events of the Council and other City elected officials
- Requests the Executive present a funding plan and transmit any necessary legislation to the Council by September 3, 2025
- Anticipates that the Executive will utilize the recommendations of any advisory workgroups established to study the Seattle Channel

### **CB 120912 Payroll Expense Tax Modifications ORD**

(1/4)

#### **Summary of Legislation**

> Establishes eligible spending categories:

Administration	Green New Deal
Affordable Housing	Youth Mental Health and Violence Prevention*
Equitable Development Initiative	General Fund
Economic Development and Revitalization	Contributions to Revenue Stabilization Account

<sup>\*</sup>Youth Mental Health and Violence Prevention remains an eligible use until an alternative funding source that is sufficient to provide funding equal to the amount appropriated from the JumpStart Payroll Expense Tax Fund for these purposes in the 2025 Adopted Budget is identified and implemented

> Sets the following percentage allocation as guidelines, but not binding constraints, on the total funding allocated to the original JumpStart priorities:

Administration – 5%	Green New Deal – 9%
Affordable Housing – 62%	
Equitable Development – 9%	
Economic Dev. and Revitalization – 15%	

### CB 120912 Payroll Expense Tax Modifications ORD (2/4)

#### **Summary of Legislation - Continued**

- Establishes a formal Revenue Stabilization Account (RSA) within the JumpStart Fund:
  - Target balance set at 10% of forecast revenues
  - Target is to be reached within 4 years
  - Until target is reached, 50% of any unanticipated year-end JumpStart Fund will be transferred to the RSA
  - Withdrawals to be made only when current year revenues drop below forecast assumed in the Adopted Budget, or forecasts for the next year decline relative to the Proposed Budget
- ➤ Eliminates the JumpStart Oversight Committee:
  - The nine-member committee was created to provide oversight of JumpStart spending and to assess the tax's impact on the local economy
  - Council appointed five members a year ago, but the Executive has never submitted nominees and the Committee has never met
- Removes the 2040 sunset date on the JumpStart Payroll Expense Tax

### **CB 120912 Payroll Expense Tax Modifications ORD**

#### (3/4)

#### **Potential Amendments**

#### **Councilmember Morales:**

- 1. Preserve the Payroll Tax Oversight Committee
  - When the JumpStart Payroll Tax was first authorized, the City established a nine-person Oversight Committee to provide "oversight on the services and programs supported by the tax. . . and its impacts on the number of jobs and businesses in the City".
  - In October 2023, the City Council appointed five members to the Committee. The Executive
    has never submitted candidates for appointment and the Committee has not met.
- 2. Starting in 2027, limit GF support to 20% of total JumpStart Payroll Tax proceeds, and allocate remaining resources to the original JumpStart priorities, including Student Mental Health, and the Revenue Stabilization Account.
  - This would increase the funding available for JumpStart priorities in 2027 by as much as \$136 million, from an anticipated ~\$250 million to ~\$386 million.
  - By implication, this would increase the projected GF deficit by \$136 million, from ~\$100 million to ~\$236 million.

### CB 120912 Payroll Expense Tax Modifications ORD

#### (4/4)

#### **Potential Amendments (cont.)**

#### **Councilmember Moore:**

- 3. Starting in 2027, limit GF support to 45% of total JumpStart Payroll Tax proceeds, and allocate the remaining resources exclusively for Affordable Housing
  - In 2027, this amendment would provide as much as \$266 million of JumpStart funding for Affordable Housing.
  - Funding for the prescribed Revenue Stabilization Account would be provided by the "automatic" year-end transfer mechanism established in the proposed ordinance and transfers from the General Fund.
  - By implication, it would eliminate JumpStart funding for the other priorities and would also increase the GF deficit by ~\$16 million.

# Agenda Item 40 CB 120887 SDOT ST3 Material Change

#### **Background**

The Seattle Transit Measure was approved by voters in November 2020 and instituted a 0.15 percent sales tax for transit service and transit capital improvements. The tax expires on April 1, 2027. This legislation would authorize the use of Seattle Transit Measure revenue for City staffing in support of the Sound Transit 3 program, including delivery of the West Seattle Light Rail Extension and Ballard Light Rail Extension projects. The legislation would also authorize the use of Seattle Transit Measure revenue to provide funding contributions towards these projects. The 2025-2026 Proposed Budget proposes funding for City staffing but does not provide for direct funding contributions.

**Amendment 1** to CB 120887 would remove reference to holding a public hearing, which was optional.

# Agenda Item 41 CB 120893 CBO Participatory Budgeting Implementation ORD

CB 120893 would implement recommendations developed during the Participatory Budgeting process facilitated by the Seattle Office for Civil Rights. The legislation would appropriate a total of \$27.3 million in one-time General Fund dollars held in Finance General to five departments – CARE Department, Department of Neighborhoods (DON), Human Services Department (HSD), the Office of Planning and Community Development (OPCD), and Seattle Parks and Recreation (SPR) – to implement projects identified during the Participatory Budgeting process.

All amendments sponsored by CM Hollingsworth, co-sponsored by CM Moore and CM Woo.
