

2014 to Present

Semi-retired. Engaged in consulting services (DM Consulting) including agency management and maritime operations. Also engaged in numerous civic activities.

2008 to 2014

Assistant Secretary, Washington State Department of Transportation, Ferries Division, Seattle, Washington. Responsible for the management of all aspects of the largest ferry system in the United States including daily operation of 10 routes, 20 terminals and 22 vessels carrying over 22.5 million passengers a year; management of capital program including new vessel construction, preservation and maintenance of vessels and terminals; financial management of operating and capital budgets of approximately \$375 million per year; management of 14 separate labor contracts; development of long and short range planning; and development and oversight of all agency contracts. Major accomplishments include: stabilizing agency in operational crisis; refocused agency to core mission; successfully managing new vessel construction program; began innovations such as changing to LNG fuel and vehicle reservation system; improving community and customer relations; significantly reduced administrative and planned capital costs; developed new marketing plan to rebuild ridership; and finalized new 20-year long range plan. Total 2013-2015 biennial budget of \$862 million with staff of 1,785 employees.

2006 to 2008

Vice President, Institute for Community Change, Seattle, Washington. Served as chief financial and operating officer of private, non-profit organization dedicated to helping foundations, governments and non-profit agencies implement project initiatives. Examples of Institute work include: management of national, multi-city initiative to improve the health and safety of children; conducting site assessment and readiness for multi-city integrated services in school initiative; and comprehensive health and human services site assessment and organizational capacity analysis.

1999-2006

City Manager, City of Federal Way, Washington. Chief Executive Officer seventh largest city in Washington State. Responsible for administration of all city personnel, services and departments including: public safety, community and economic development, parks and recreation, public works, surface water utility, planning and permitting, financial management, capital projects funding and management, intergovernmental relations and regional coordination. Major accomplishments included: obtained over \$50 million in federal and state grants for infrastructure and community improvement projects; purchase and renovation of office building for new City Hall; planning and development of new \$20 million multi-purpose community center; developed funding plan for \$170 million capital investments over six years; as member city, assisted construction of new Valley Communications Center; effective financial management resulting in bond rating upgrade. Total annual budget of \$79 million with staff of 315 employees.

1995-1999

City Manager, City of Ellensburg, Washington. Chief Executive Officer of full-service municipality. Responsible for administration of all city personnel, programs, departments and activities including: four City-owned utilities, community and economic development, police and fire services, parks and recreation, planning and permitting, financial management, capital project funding and management, library and conference facilities, and intergovernmental relations and regional coordination. Major accomplishments included: completed and implemented state-required comprehensive plan; developed comprehensive financial plan; improved City financial condition; increased economic development activities; improved electric and natural gas utility services; as member city, assisted in construction of new Kittitas Valley Communications Center. Total annual budget of \$44.5 million with staff of 223 employees.

1992 to 1995

Town Administrator, Town of Steilacoom, Washington. Chief Administrative Officer of full-service municipality. Responsible for all personnel, programs, departments and activities including: five Town-operated utilities, management of police and fire services, planning and permitting, parks and recreation, capital projects funding and management, and financial management. **Major accomplishments** included: funding and redevelopment of regional saltwater park; improved Town financial position from deficit to surplus; developed capital improvement program; obtained funding to improve electric utility; improved street system; and developed comprehensive financial plan. Total annual budget of \$12 million with staff of 75 employees.

Staff Director, Speaker's Office, House of Representative, Olympia, Washington. Responsible for management of Speaker's Office including: coordination of public policy and legislative development; community and constituent relations; and political and legislative strategy.

1984 to 1990

Director, Department of Community Development, City of Seattle, Washington. Responsible for administration of all department personnel, projects, programs and services including: economic development, housing planning and development, historic preservation, neighborhood planning, and grant development and administration. **Major accomplishments** included: development of nationally recognized affordable housing program; managed all major economic development projects, developed downtown and neighborhood development plans resulting in substantial redevelopment and investment; managed small business low-interest loan program; and preserved historic buildings. Total annual budget of \$24 million with staff of 110 employees.
