### 1. BILL SUMMARY

## **Legislation Title:**

AN ORDINANCE vacating a portion of Northeast 48<sup>th</sup> Street, lying between 24<sup>th</sup> Avenue Northeast and the Burke Gilman Trail, in the University District, and accepting a Property Use and Development Agreement outlining ongoing Petitioner obligations and responsibilities related to the Burke Gilman Trail connection, on the petition of Trinity Trailside LLC (Clerk File 314380).

# **Summary and Background of the Legislation:**

This Council Bill completes the vacation process for the portion of Northeast 48<sup>th</sup> Street, lying between 24<sup>th</sup> Avenue Northeast and the Burke Gilman Trail, in the University District, on the petition of Trinity Trailside LLC.

The Petitioner sought the vacation for the development of a multi-building project for student housing. Following a May 21, 2019, public hearing on the petition, the City Council conditionally granted the petition.
