Seattle's Food Action Plan (2024 Update)

- Presents a shared vision and roadmap for how the City and community partners can support an equitable, sustainable, and resilient local food system.
- The original Plan was released in 2012 and this is the first update since then.
- Supports Mayor Harrell's One Seattle Climate
 Justice Agenda and vision for Healthy,
 Resilient Communities



Seattle's food work is nationally recognized

Seattle is a leader for innovative and impactful programs like:

- Fresh Bucks serves 12,000 households
- Food Rescue Innovation to prevent food waste
- Farm to Preschool at 47 preschools
- Healthy snack program at 27 schools
- Food security programs at 100+ sites citywide
- Food Equity Fund to support community food projects

Proposed: Food Action Plan Resolution


Adoption will demonstrate continued Mayor-Council alignment with a longstanding framework that guides food work managed by City Departments and Offices

Overview of the Updated Food Action Plan

Seattle's guide for an equitable, sustainable, and resilient local food system.

Context: Persistent Needs

- High rates of food insecurity and deep disparities by race, place, household composition. (Source: Public Health data)
- Historically high food prices. Food prices were 25% higher in 2023 compared to 2019. (Source: USDA)
 - SNAP participation in King County increased 18% between Jan 2022 and July 2024. (Source: Public Health data)
- Meanwhile, <u>food consumption habits</u> and <u>food waste</u> have major impacts on the <u>environment and climate</u>. (Sources: SPU)



Core Food Programs

Several departments manage the City's **core food** programs, bringing specialized expertise:

HSD – hunger relief and food security

OSE – sustainable food procurement, Fresh Bucks

SPU – food waste prevention

DON – community food projects, P-Patch

SPR – urban agriculture on parklands

OPCD – Zoning



Food Action Plan - Strategic Priorities

8. Food Action Plan Stewardship



- Nutritious, affordable, and culturally relevant food
- Food security and access for low-income children, youth, adults, and older adults in preschools, schools, community-based organizations, and other community settings

Example programs:

Fresh Bucks (**OSE**), Healthy Food in Schools (**OSE**)
Farm to Preschool (**HSD**), Food banks and meal programs (**HSD**)





- Focuses on <u>existing</u> efforts to support community gardening and urban agriculture
- Builds on Mayor's 2023 Year of Community Gardening Proclamation

Example programs and initiatives:

P-Patch Community Gardening (**DON**) – at 90 sites citywide Marra Farm (**SPR**), Beacon Food Forest (**DON & SPU**), Rainier Beach Urban Farm and Wetlands (**SPR**)



Y-WE Grow Program (City grantee)



- Culturally relevant and experiential food and nutrition education for all ages
- Mentorship opportunities in food systems work

These programs are leveraged for education programming:

Healthy Food in Schools (**OSE**)

Seattle Farm to Preschool (**HSD**)

Urban Food Systems Program (SPR)







Strategic Priority 4: **Economy & Labor**

- Food projects that promote equitable economic development
- Technical assistance for small food businesses
- References Seattle's <u>existing</u> labor laws and their protections for food workers

Example programs:

Small Business Supports (OED)

Labor Standards Community Outreach and Education Fund (OLS)








- Shifting food procurement to focus on supporting the local food economy, environmental sustainability, and equity
- Support stronger, local food system infrastructure

Example programs and initiatives:

Values-based food purchasing (**OSE**)
South Seattle Community Food Hub (**King County**)







- Food waste prevention and efforts to raise public awareness about the environmental and climate impacts of food waste and food consumption habits
- Strengthens cross-sector food rescue operations

Strategic Priority 7: Environment & Climate

- Reducing climate pollution associated with the food system
- Promoting low carbon and environmentally sustainable foods




Strategic Priority 8: Food Action Plan Stewardship

Food Action Plan Map (in development)

- Users will be able to filter and display locations by Food Action Plan strategic priority and program/service type.


