Seattle Pedestrian Advisory Board 2014 Annual Report

Overview

The Seattle Pedestrian Advisory Board (SPAB) has been chartered with four tasks:

- Advise the Mayor, City Council and all departments and offices of the City on matters related to
 pedestrians, including the impact that actions by the City may have upon the pedestrian
 environment;
- Contribute to all aspects of the City's planning and project development processes insofar as they
 may relate to pedestrian safety and access;
- Promote improved pedestrian safety and access by evaluating and recommending changes in City design guidelines and policies;
- Prepare an annual report on the status of its work program and achievement of its goals to the Mayor and City Council.

Recognizing that Seattle has adopted the goal of being "the most walkable city in the nation", the Pedestrian Advisory Board tracks implementation of the City's primary vehicle for achieving that status, the <u>Seattle Pedestrian Master Plan</u>, adopted by the Mayor and City Council in 2009. The Pedestrian Master Plan is scheduled for an update in 2015.

The 2014 Seattle Pedestrian Advisory Board consisted of members with diverse backgrounds, expertise and interests, including:

- Public health and safety and how they intersect with social equity and justice, the relation of infrastructure and social behavior;
- Law and human rights;
- Journalism, communications, fundraising, and outreach;
- Human services advocacy, including seniors and people with disabilities;
- Urban geography, transportation planning, and street and infrastructure design;
- Community and neighborhood outreach;
- Engagement with racially and ethnically diverse community members, as well as the millennial generation.

All members have overarching interest in pedestrian safety, accessibility, mobility – and Complete Streets that work for everyone.

The Annual Report communicates the work of the Board to the Mayor, City Council and the public. It also provides transparency, and a record and guide to the work plan for the upcoming year and for future Board members.

Conclusion and a look ahead

The SPAB had a busy and productive 2014 that culminated in the formation of a 2015 work plan that is even more ambitious. The update of the Pedestrian Master Plan (PMP) will occupy a substantial share of the board's focus and activity in 2015. At the same time, the board is actively interacting with SDOT and members of the community on issues of pedestrian access and safety amid the unprecedented flurry of construction in core Seattle neighborhoods.

In addition, the board has identified a set of capital projects of particular importance and interest, and has requested that SDOT provide regular updates on those projects and an opportunity for board comment at various stages of design and implementation.

Members of the SPAB are interacting with a range of stakeholder groups around the implications for pedestrians of the City's "Vision Zero" goal to eliminate traffic deaths through design, enforcement and user education.

Throughout 2014, the board regularly raised questions with SDOT about the lingering obstacles to fulfilling the City's Complete Streets ordinance and Pedestrian Master Plan. While department officials appear committed to these goals, the City's capital budgeting practices and insufficient level of investment continue to hamper progress. In recognition of these issues, board members hope to participate actively in discussions over the successor to the expiring Bridging the Gap levy and the budget decisions related to the implementation of the PMP, as well as the integration of the PMP into the Move Seattle multimodal plan.

SPAB members consider it an honor to serve the people of Seattle and our Mayor and City Council, and look forward to the opportunity to continue to do so in the coming year. In that spirit, we respectfully submit this annual report on the activities of the Seattle Pedestrian Advisory Board.
