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1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: A RESOLUTION establishing a 5-year budget review process and approving the proposed budget framework of the Skagit Environmental Endowment Commission for its fiscal years 2015 through 2018.


Summary and background of the Legislation: This Resolution adjusts the method by which the City of Seattle reviews and approves the annual budget of the Skagit Environmental Endowment Commission (SEEC). Instead of processing a separate resolution each year, the City will review and approve SEEC 5-Year plans and budget frameworks. SEEC is entering the 2nd year of its current 5-Year Plan, and so this resolution also approves the SEEC budget framework for the period April 1, 2015 through March 31, 2019. Actual City of Seattle monetary contributions to the SEEC budget for fiscal years 2015 - 2018 will be subject to Council approval through the annual budget ordinance process.

Background: The Skagit Environmental Endowment Fund was jointly established by Seattle City Light and BC Hydro during the period 1985-89, as a result of the 1984 High Ross Treaty between the US and Canada and an associated Agreement between the City of Seattle and British Columbia. The Endowment Fund is not part of the City of Seattle's annual budget, but City approval is required by the Treaty and Agreement.

The Fund currently is managed by the Canadian Imperial Bank of Commerce to maintain capital and produce revenue. SEEC policy is to preserve the corpus of the fund, considering inflation, and the Commission expends available proceeds from the fund according to a budget developed through its own program needs. To promote efficient program planning and delivery and to enhance accountability, the Commission has moved in recent years to a partnership approach, implemented through a 5-Year Plan. This resolution will support this approach, while maintaining efficient oversight by the City of Seattle.

The Treaty and Agreement require Seattle City Light to supplement the fund by an annual, inflation-adjusted payment, based on a fixed amount of power purchase. In the 2013-14 fiscal year, this payment was \$130,596.51. Seattle City Light's payments for future years are anticipated in the City's annual adopted budgets in the Purchased Power Budget Control Level.
