1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE relating to the regulation of after-hours nightlife lounges; creating a license for the operation of after-hours nightlife lounges; and adding a new Chapter 6.550 to the Seattle Municipal Code.

Summary and Background of the Legislation:

Seattle has experienced 38 nightlife shootings this year, including 15 between the hours of 2 a.m. and 5 a.m. In August 2024, these shootings made up 11 percent of all shootings in the city. Over the past decade, there have been dozens of shootings and homicides that have occurred in connection with after-hours nightlife lounges that operate between the hours of 2 a.m. and 5 a.m.

This legislation would create a new business license regulatory structure for after-hours nightlife lounges. It would not apply to bars or nightclubs that close at 2 a.m. or before. It would not apply to businesses that are principally restaurants.

To obtain a license, an applicant would have to pay a \$250 fee and demonstrate that their establishment has all other applicable permits and licenses. After-hours nightlife lounges would be required to maintain security on their premises and cooperate with police and other inspectors. If there are serious security incidents connected to the after-hours nightlife establishment, the Director of FAS would be able to revoke the license. Violation of the licensing requirement would be a civil citation for a first offense and a criminal misdemeanor for any subsequent offense.

It is anticipated that up to ten applicants would apply for an After-Hours Nightlife Lounge license in the first year. After that, we anticipate up to five applicants per year. Those applications would generate some minimal licensing revenue for FAS.

FAS would have some minimal costs associated with administering this program, principally connected to reviewing license applications. The City Joint Enforcement Team currently conducts inspections at many of these locations so no need is anticipated for additional FAS staffing connected to inspections and compliance. This is a relatively small licensing program which is likely to have under 20 total licensees at any given time which is why the administrative costs are expected to be absorbed with existing FAS staffing.

SPD, SFD and other departments currently spend a significant amount of time responding to incidents associated with unregulated after-hours nightlife lounges. Those responses have significant costs. Not implementing this legislation would mean continuing police and fire responses to several dozen serious public safety incidents per year.

The costs of not regulating after-hours nightlife lounges are currently borne by SPD and SFD, who must respond to the regular public safety tragedies at these locations.

Many but not all after-hours nightlife lounges are owned by people of color.
