1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: AN ORDINANCE relating to the City Light Department; accepting certain easements for overhead and underground electrical rights in King County, Washington; placing said easements under the jurisdiction of the City Light Department; and ratifying and confirming certain prior acts.

Summary and background of the Legislation: City Light requires that the owner of a new or altered electrical service provide The City of Seattle with a utility easement whenever City Light conductors must pass over, under, or through the property of another person, or when service equipment such as poles or vaults must be located either on the property being served or the property of a third person.

City Light periodically requests that the City Council accept these distribution easements by ordinance. This legislation will accept the 59 distribution easements that have been received and recorded since the previous distribution easement acceptance ordinance was adopted.
