


Increasing Food Access Needs

- The rising cost of healthy foods. Food prices rose 23.6% from 2020 to 2024 and the cost of healthy foods is nearly double that of unhealthy foods. (Source: USDA, NIH)
- Increased food assistance needs. SNAP participation in King County increased 18% between 2022 and 2024. (Source: Public Health data)
- Federal reductions to food assistance will increase food insecurity and reduce revenue for retailers. (Source: Center on Budget and Policy Priorities)



- Fresh Bucks contributes to the viability of local businesses












- Enrolled as space is available






Connecting Residents with City Resources




80% of Affordability program applications were 'referrals' from the Fresh Bucks Waitlist Application

Over 40 City programs on the Affordability Portal e.g., Utility Discount Program, Seattle Preschool Program, etc.






