4 5 6 7 8 9	AN ORDINANCE relating to automated traffic safety cameras; establishing additional uses for automated traffic safety cameras to increase safety; authorizing qualified civilian employees to review violations detected by traffic cameras; updating finance and fund policies related to the use of camera revenues; amending Ordinance 124230; amending Sections 5.82.010, 11.31.020, 11.31.090, 11.31.121, and 11.50.570 of the Seattle Municipal Code; and repealing Section 11.50.580 of the Seattle Municipal Code.
10	WHEREAS, excessive speeding by drivers is a root cause of many crashes, including crashes
11	that result in death or serious injury of vulnerable travelers within City rights-of-way,
12	including pedestrians, bicyclists, people with disabilities, children, and seniors; and
13	WHEREAS, serious crashes often result in lifelong injuries, chronic pain, permanent disabilities,
14	chronic depression, and shortened lifespans, while serious and fatal crashes impact the
15	victims, their families and other loved ones, their co-workers, and their greater
16	communities; and
17	WHEREAS, it is often not safe, practical, or desirable to use police officers to enforce traffic
18	laws, including speed limit violations; and
19	WHEREAS, numerous studies, and Seattle's own experience, have demonstrated significant
20	reductions in speeds, crashes, and the number of drivers running red lights or violating
21	school zone speed limits at enforcement camera locations; and
22	WHEREAS, since the start of Seattle's School Zone Speed Camera program, the City has seen a
23	71 percent drop in collisions during camera activation areas, a 64 percent drop in the
24	average number of camera violations per day, and 90 percent of people who receive and
25	pay camera citations do not receive another citation; at red light camera locations, crashes
26	of all types have been substantially reduced compared to citywide averages, with five

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times the decrease in fatal crashes at camera intersections compared with citywide averages; and

3	WHEREAS, in 2023, the City Council passed Ordinance 126869, designating restricted racing
4	zones as a precursor to future deployment of speed enforcement cameras; and
5	WHEREAS, in 2024, the State Legislature passed Engrossed Substitute House Bill 2384, making
6	comprehensive changes to State laws governing traffic cameras, consolidating authority
7	that had been established for camera programs, authorizing trained police and
8	transportation employees to review violations detected by traffic safety cameras, and
9	repealing authority for designated racing zone cameras (ESHB 2384, enacted as Chapter
10	307, Laws of 2024); and
11	WHEREAS, the City Council intends that the locations previously identified in Ordinance
12	126869 be evaluated for deployment of traffic safety cameras under Seattle Municipal
13	Code Section 11.50.570 (including enforcement for school speed zones, school walk
14	areas, public park speed zones, hospital speed zones, and locations that experience higher
15	crash risks due to vehicle speeds); and
16	WHEREAS, given the proven effectiveness of existing camera enforcement programs and the
17	reduction in crashes at existing camera locations, the Seattle Department of
18	Transportation has been working with the Seattle Police Department to expand the
19	deployment of school speed zone cameras and deployment of additional camera types
20	authorized by ESHB 2384 to further reduce serious and fatal crashes around the city;
21	NOW, THEREFORE,

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1	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:
2	Section 1. Section 5.82.010 of the Seattle Municipal Code, last amended by Ordinance
3	126893, is amended as follows:
4	5.82.010 Financial policies
5	The following financial policies govern revenues generated by automated traffic safety cameras
6	or fines or civil penalties:
7	A. ((Spending restrictions:)) Consistent with RCW 46.63.220, the City shall first apply
8	revenue generated by the City's automated traffic safety camera program to the cost to
9	administer, install, operate, expand, remove, relocate, and maintain automated traffic safety
10	cameras authorized under subsection 11.50.570.A.
11	<u>B.</u> Of the net proceeds generated annually by automated traffic safety camera fines and
12	civil penalties that are available to the City after ((required contributions to the Washington State
13	Cooper Jones account pursuant to RCW 46.63.170,)) covering the cost to administer, install,
14	operate, expand, remove, relocate, and maintain automated traffic safety cameras, the following
15	spending restrictions apply:
16	((1. School zone camera revenue: Funding in an amount equal to the revenue
17	generated annually by school zone fixed automated camera fines and civil penalties will be spent
18	for school traffic and pedestrian safety and directly related infrastructure projects; pedestrian,
19	bicyclist, and driver education campaigns; and installation, administrative, enforcement,
20	operations, and maintenance costs associated with the school zone fixed automated cameras.
21	2. Red)) <u>1. For red</u> light camera revenue:
22	<u>a. Funding((: Funding))</u> in an amount equal to <u>15 percent</u> ((20 percent)) of
23	the revenue generated annually by fines and civil penalties for red light camera violations and

1	red arrow camera violations will be spent for ((school)) safety, including traffic, student, bicycle,
2	and pedestrian safety and directly related infrastructure projects; operational and maintenance
3	investments that support traffic safety and Vision Zero; transportation improvements that support
4	equitable access and mobility for persons with disabilities; transportation projects designed to
5	reduce vehicle speeds, as well as pedestrian, bicyclist, and driver education campaigns ((and
6	installation, administrative, enforcement, operations, and maintenance costs associated with the
7	red light and red arrow automated cameras)).
8	b. Funding in an amount equal to 15 percent of the revenue generated
9	annually by fines and civil penalties for red light camera violations and red arrow camera
10	violations will be spent on the construction of new sidewalks, sidewalk alternatives, and the
11	repair of existing sidewalks. This funding shall not supplant other transportation funding for
12	sidewalk construction, sidewalk alternatives, and sidewalk repair.
13	((3.)) 2. For all other automated traffic safety camera types authorized under
14	subsection 11.50.570.A:
15	a. Funding in an amount equal to 85 percent of the net revenues will be
16	spent for safety, including traffic, student, bicycle, and pedestrian safety and directly related
17	infrastructure projects; operational and maintenance investments that support traffic safety and
18	Vision Zero; transportation improvements that support equitable access and mobility for persons
19	with disabilities; transportation projects designed to reduce vehicle speeds, as well as pedestrian,
20	bicyclist, and driver education campaigns.
21	b. Funding in an amount equal to 15 percent of the net revenues will be
22	spent on construction of new sidewalks, sidewalk alternatives, and the repair of existing

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1	sidewalks. This funding shall not supplant other transportation funding for sidewalk
2	construction, sidewalk alternatives, and sidewalk repair.
3	((3. Block the box and obstruction camera revenue: Funding in an amount equal
4	to the local revenue generated annually by fines and civil penalties for obstruction or blocked
5	traffic camera violations will be spent for transportation improvements that support equitable
6	access and mobility for persons with disabilities and installation, administrative, enforcement,
7	operations, and maintenance costs associated with the obstruction or blocked traffic automated
8	cameras.
9	4. Lane restriction camera revenue: Funding in an amount equal to the local
10	revenue generated annually by fines and civil penalties for restricted lane camera violations will
11	be spent for transportation improvements that support equitable access and mobility for persons
12	with disabilities and installation, administrative, enforcement, operations, and maintenance costs
13	associated with the restricted lane automated cameras.
14	5. Speed enforcement camera revenue: Funding in an amount equal to the local
15	revenue generated annually by fines and civil penalties for speed enforcement cameras other than
16	school zone cameras described in subsection 5.82.010.A.1 will be spent on transportation
17	improvements that support traffic safety, bicycle safety, and pedestrian safety and installation,
18	administrative, enforcement, operations, and maintenance costs associated with the speed
19	enforcement cameras.
20	B. Annual budget revenues and appropriations:))
21	<u>C.</u> The Executive will propose appropriations for the items in subsections 5.82.010.A and
22	5.82.010.B in its annual budget submittal to the City Council based on the amount of automated
23	traffic safety camera fines and civil penalties projected to be received in the prior budget year.

1 The City Council anticipates that proposed appropriations will support traffic safety,

2 accessibility, and Vision Zero investments.

3 ((C. Year-end report: The Executive will provide a year-end report to the City Council on 4 automated traffic safety camera revenue receipts, appropriations, and expenditures by March 1 5 each year)) D. Consistent with state requirements, by July each year, the Executive will post an annual report on the City's website showing the number of traffic crashes that occurred at each 6 7 location where an automated traffic safety camera is located, as well as the number of notices of 8 infraction issued for each camera, the percentage of revenues received from fines issued from 9 automated traffic safety camera infractions that were used to pay for the costs of the automated traffic safety camera program, and a description of the uses of revenues that exceeded the costs 10 of operation and administration of the automated traffic safety camera program. 11 12 ((D. True-up of revenues and expenditures:)) E. To the extent that actual annual revenues 13 from automated traffic safety cameras differ from the appropriations made through the annual 14 budget, the Executive will propose appropriation changes in supplemental legislation to ensure 15 that sufficient funding is spent consistent with ((subsection 5.82.010.A and RCW 46.63.170)) this Chapter 5.82. 16 Section 2. Section 11.31.020 of the Seattle Municipal Code, last amended by Ordinance 17 127056, is amended as follows: 18 19 11.31.020 Notice of traffic infraction—Issuance((-)) 20 A. A peace officer has the authority to issue a notice of traffic infraction: 21 1. ((when)) When the infraction is committed in the officer's presence; 22 2. When the officer is acting upon the request of a law enforcement officer in

23 whose presence the traffic infraction was committed;

1	((2. if)) <u>3. If</u> an officer investigating at the scene of a motor vehicle accident has
2	reasonable cause to believe that the driver of a motor vehicle involved in the accident has
3	committed a traffic infraction;
4	((3. when)) <u>4. When</u> a ((violation of Section 11.50.140, 11.50.150, 11.52.040, or
5	$\frac{11.52.100}{11.52.100}$)) <u>traffic infraction</u> is detected through the use of an automated traffic safety camera <u>or</u>
6	an automated school bus safety camera as authorized pursuant to ((RCW 46.63.170)) chapter
7	46.63 RCW and Section 11.50.570. A trained and authorized civilian employee of the Seattle
8	Police Department, or a trained and authorized civilian employee of the Seattle Department of
9	Transportation performing under the supervision of a qualified traffic engineer, has the authority
10	to review infractions detected through the use of an automated traffic safety camera or automated
11	school bus safety camera to issue notices of infraction. These employees must be sufficiently
12	trained and certified in reviewing infractions and issuing notices of infraction by qualified peace
13	officers or by traffic engineers employed in the Seattle Police Department or the Seattle
14	Department of Transportation; or
15	((4. if)) <u>5. If</u> an officer is investigating a violation of Section 11.58.440.
16	B. A court may issue a notice of traffic infraction upon receipt of a written statement of
17	the officer that there is reasonable cause to believe that an infraction was committed. (((RCW)
18	46.63.030)))
19	Section 3. Section 11.31.090 of the Seattle Municipal Code, last amended by Ordinance
20	126892, is amended as follows:

1 11.31.090 Traffic infractions detected through the use of an automated traffic safety 2 camera

3 A. A notice of infraction based on evidence detected through the use of an automated 4 traffic safety camera must be mailed to the registered owner of the vehicle within 14 days of the 5 violation, or to the renter of a vehicle within 14 days of establishing the renter's name and 6 address under subsection 11.31.090.C.1. The peace officer, or other City employee authorized to 7 review citations under RCW 46.63.030, issuing the notice of infraction shall include with it a 8 certificate or facsimile thereof, based upon inspection of photographs, microphotographs, or 9 electronic images produced by an automated traffic safety camera, stating the facts supporting 10 the notice of infraction. This certificate or facsimile is prima facie evidence of the facts contained 11 in it and is admissible in a proceeding charging a violation of Section 11.50.070, Section 12 11.50.140, Section 11.50.150, Section 11.50.250, Section 11.50.260, Section 11.52.040, Section 13 11.52.100, Section 11.53.190, Section 11.53.230, Section 11.58.272, Section 11.58.295, Section 11.72.040, Section 11.72.080, or Section 11.72.210 or a restricted lane violation. The 14 15 photographs, microphotographs, or electronic images evidencing the violation must be available 16 for inspection and admission into evidence in a proceeding to adjudicate the liability for the infraction. 17

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C. If the registered owner of the vehicle is a rental car business, the peace officer, or other
<u>City employee authorized to review citations under RCW 46.63.030</u>, shall, before such a notice
of infraction is issued, provide a written notice to the rental car business that a notice of
infraction may be issued to the rental car business if the rental car business does not, within 18
days of receiving the written notice, provide to the peace officer by return mail:

1	1. A statement under oath stating the name and known mailing address of the
2	individual driving or renting the vehicle when the infraction occurred; or
3	2. A statement under oath that the business is unable to determine who was
4	driving or renting the vehicle at the time the infraction occurred; or
5	3. In lieu of identifying the vehicle operator, the rental car business may pay the
6	applicable penalty.
7	Timely mailing of this statement to the peace officer, or other City employee authorized
8	to review citations under RCW 46.63.030, relieves a rental car business of any liability under this
9	Chapter 11.31 for the notice of infraction.
10	* * *
11	E. In a traffic infraction case involving an infraction detected through the use of an
12	automated traffic safety camera, proof that the particular vehicle described in the notice of traffic
13	infraction was in violation of Section 11.50.070, Section 11.50.140, Section 11.50.150, Section
14	11.50.250, Section 11.50.260, Section 11.52.040, Section 11.52.100, Section 11.53.190, Section
15	11.53.230, Section 11.58.272, Section 11.58.295, Section 11.72.040, Section 11.72.080, or
16	Section 11.72.210 or a restricted lane violation, together with proof that the person named in the
17	notice of traffic infraction was at the time of the violation the registered owner of the vehicle,
18	constitutes in evidence a prima facie presumption that the registered owner of the vehicle was the
19	person in control of the vehicle at the point where, and for the time during which, the violation
20	occurred. This presumption may be overcome only if the registered owner states, under oath, in a
21	written statement to the court or in testimony before the court that the vehicle involved was, at
22	the time, stolen or in the care, custody, or control of some person other than the registered owner.

Section 4. Section 11.31.121 of the Seattle Municipal Code, last amended by Ordinance

2 127141, is amended as follows:

11.31.121 Monetary penalties—Parking infractions

The base monetary penalty for violation of each of the numbered provisions of the Seattle

5 Municipal Code listed in the following table is as shown, unless and until the penalty shown

6 below for a particular parking infraction is modified by Local Rule of the Seattle Municipal

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Section 5. Section 11.50.570 of the Seattle Municipal Code, last amended by Ordinance

126892, is amended as follows:

11 **11.50.570** Automated traffic safety cameras

A. Automated traffic safety cameras may be used to detect one or more of the

13 following((: stoplight, railroad crossing, school speed zone violations, violations included in

14 subsection 11.50.570.H for the duration of the pilot program authorized under subsection

15 11.50.570.H, maximum speed limit violations in school walk, park, and hospital zones as

1	permitted by state law, or, consistent with RCW 46.63.170(1)(d)(i), on streets that are either
2	designated as a priority location in a road safety plan submitted to the state, show a significantly
3	higher rate of collisions than the City average over a period of at least three years prior to
4	installation and other speed reduction measures are not feasible or have not been sufficiently
5	effective at reducing travel speeds, or is a street designated by ordinance as a race zone. Except
6	as provided in subsection 11.50.570.H, use of automated traffic safety cameras is restricted to the
7	following locations only)) as authorized under RCW 46.63.210 through 46.63.260:
8	1. ((Intersections)) Stoplight violations at intersections of two or more arterials
9	with traffic control signals that have yellow change interval durations in accordance with Section
10	11.50.130, which interval durations may not be reduced after placement of the cameras;
11	2. Railroad crossings violations to detect instances when a vehicle fails to stop
12	when facing an activated railroad grade crossing control signal;
13	3. ((School)) Speed violations within school speed zones as described in RCW
14	<u>46.61.440(1) and 46.61.440(2);</u>
15	4. ((School)) Speed violations within school walk areas as defined in RCW
16	28A.160.160 or roadways within a one-mile radius of a school that students use to travel to
17	school by foot, bicycle, or other means of active transportation;
18	5. ((Public)) Speed violations within public park speed zones, defined as the
19	marked area within public park property and extending 300 feet from the border of the public
20	park property (a) consistent with active park use; and (b) where signs are posted to indicate the
21	location is within a public park speed zone;
22	6. ((Hospital)) Speed violations within hospital speed zones, defined as the
23	marked area within hospital property and extending 300 feet from the border of the hospital

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1	property (a) consistent with hospital use; and (b) where signs are posted to indicate the location
2	is within a hospital speed zone, where "hospital" has the same meaning as in RCW 70.41.020;
3	((and))
4	7. ((Additional speed detection)) Speed violations at additional locations that
5	((meet any of the criteria in RCW 46.63.170(1)(d).)) experience higher crash risks due to
6	excessive vehicle speeds consistent with RCW 46.63.250(3);
7	8. Violations of designations by the Washington Department of Transportation,
8	the Director of Transportation, or the Traffic Engineer reserving all or any portion of a street or
9	highway, including any lane or ramp, for the exclusive or preferential use of transit coaches or
10	other public transportation vehicles or carpools, under Section 11.53.230. As used in this
11	subsection 11.50.570.A.8: "public transportation vehicle" means any motor vehicle, streetcar,
12	train, trolley vehicle, ferry boat, or any other device, vessel, or vehicle that is owned or operated
13	by a transit authority or an entity providing service on behalf of a transit authority that is used for
14	the purpose of carrying passengers and that operates on established routes; and "transit
15	authority" has the meaning provided in RCW 9.91.025;
16	9. Violations of one or more of Sections 11.50.070, 11.53.190, 11.72.040,
17	<u>11.72.080, or 11.72.210;</u>
18	10. Speed violations within roadway work zones, except that a notice of infraction
19	may only be issued if an automated traffic safety camera captures a speed violation when
20	workers are present;
21	11. Speed violations along state highways within city limits that are designated as
22	city streets under chapter 47.24 RCW; and

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1	12. In consultation with the Washington Department of Transportation, ferry
2	queue violations under RCW 46.61.735.
3	((B. Automated traffic safety cameras may be used to detect other violations as
4	authorized by and subject to the restrictions imposed by the Washington State Legislature.
5	C. Before adding additional automated traffic safety cameras or relocating any existing
6	camera, the City Council)) B. Consistent with RCW 46.63.220, before the City adds or relocates
7	an automated traffic safety camera at a new location, the Seattle Department of Transportation
8	must prepare an analysis of the locations within the City where automated traffic safety cameras
9	are proposed to be located((. Beginning June 7, 2013, an annual report must be posted on the
10	City's website of the number of traffic accidents that occurred at each location where an
11	automated traffic safety camera is located as well as the number of notices of infraction issued
12	for each camera and any other relevant information deemed appropriate. For automated traffic
13	safety cameras authorized by RCW 46.63.170(1)(d)(i), the City must complete)) that includes an
14	equity analysis that evaluates the impact of the camera placement on livability, accessibility,
15	economics, education, and environmental health((, and shall consider the outcome of that
16	analysis when identifying where to locate an automated traffic safety camera)). The analysis
17	must show a demonstrated need for traffic cameras based on one or more of the following in the
18	vicinity of the proposed camera location: travel by vulnerable road users, evidence of vehicles
19	speeding, rates of collision, reports showing near collisions, and anticipated or actual
20	ineffectiveness or infeasibility of other mitigation measures. In addition to RCW 46.63.220
21	requirements, the analysis should identify the physical traffic safety improvements considered
22	for the proposed camera location and why they could not be deployed.

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((Đ-)) <u>C.</u> Automated traffic safety cameras may only take pictures of the vehicle and vehicle license plate and only while an infraction is occurring. The picture must not reveal the face of the driver or of passengers in the vehicle. The primary purpose of camera placement is to take pictures of the vehicle and vehicle license plate when an infraction is occurring. Cameras should be installed in a manner that minimizes the impact of camera flash on drivers.

 $((\underbrace{E}.))$ <u>D</u>. Notwithstanding any other provision of law, all photographs, microphotographs, or electronic images, prepared under this Section 11.50.570 are for the exclusive use of law enforcement in the discharge of duties under this Section 11.50.570 and are not open to the public and may not be used in a court in a pending action or proceeding unless the action or proceeding relates to a violation under this Section 11.50.570. No photograph, microphotograph, or electronic image(($_{7}$)) may be used for any purpose other than enforcement of violations under this Section 11.50.570 nor retained longer than necessary to enforce this Section 11.50.570.

13 $((F_{\cdot}))$ E. All locations where an automated traffic safety camera is used must be clearly 14 marked by placing signs at least 30 days prior to activation of the camera ((by placing signs)) in 15 locations that clearly indicate to a driver that either((: (i) That the)): (a) the driver is within ((a) 16 school walk area, public park speed zone, or hospital speed zone)) an area where automated 17 traffic safety cameras are authorized; or (((ii) that he or she)) (b) the driver is entering ((a zone 18 where traffic laws)) an area where violations are enforced by an automated traffic safety camera. 19 The signs must be readily visible to a driver approaching an automated traffic safety camera. 20 Signs placed in automated traffic safety camera locations after June 7, 2012, must follow the 21 specifications and guidelines under the ((manual of uniform traffic control devices))Manual on 22 Uniform Traffic Control Devices for streets and highways as adopted by the Washington 23 Department of Transportation under chapter 47.36 RCW.

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1	((G.)) <u>F.</u> The compensation paid to the manufacturer or vendor of automated traffic safety
2	camera program equipment used must be based only upon the value of the equipment and
3	services provided or rendered in support of the system, and may not be based upon a portion of
4	the fine or civil penalty imposed or the revenue generated by the equipment.
5	((H.
6	1. The Seattle Department of Transportation is authorized to create a pilot
7	program authorizing automated traffic safety cameras to be used to detect a violation of one or
8	more of Sections 11.50.070, 11.53.190, 11.53.230, 11.72.040, 11.72.080, or 11.72.210 or a
9	restricted lane violation. Under the pilot program, violations relating to stopping at intersections
10	or crosswalks may only be enforced at the 20 intersections where the Seattle Department of
11	Transportation would most like to address safety concerns related to stopping at intersections or
12	crosswalks.
13	2. Except where specifically exempted, all of the rules and restrictions applicable
14	to the use of automated traffic safety cameras in this Section 11.50.570 and Section 11.31.090
15	apply to the use of automated traffic safety cameras in the pilot program established in this
16	subsection 11.50.570.H.
17	3. As used in this subsection 11.50.570.H, "public transportation vehicle" means
18	any motor vehicle, streetcar, train, trolley vehicle, ferry boat, or any other device, vessel, or
19	vehicle that is owned or operated by a transit authority or an entity providing service on behalf of
20	a transit authority that is used for the purpose of carrying passengers and that operates on
21	established routes. "Transit authority" has the meaning provided in RCW 9.91.025.
22	4. Use of automated traffic safety cameras as authorized in this subsection
23	11.50.570.H is restricted to the following locations only: locations authorized in subsection

1	11.50.570.A; and midblock on arterials. Additionally, the use of automated traffic safety cameras
2	as authorized in this subsection 11.50.570.H is further limited to the following:
3	a. The portion of state local roadways in downtown areas of Seattle used
4	for office and commercial activities, as well as retail shopping and support services, and that may
5	include mixed residential uses;
6	b. The portion of state and local roadways in areas in Seattle within one-
7	half mile north of the boundary of the area described in subsection 11.50.570.H.4.a;
8	c. Portions of roadway systems in Seattle that travel into and out of the
9	portion in subsection 11.50.570.H.4.b that are designated by the Washington State Department of
10	Transportation as noninterstate freeways for up to 4 miles; and
11	d. Portions of roadway systems in Seattle connected to the portions of the
12	noninterstate freeways identified in subsection 11.50.570.H.4.c that are designated by the
13	Washington State Department of Transportation as arterial roadways for up to one mile from the
14	intersection of the arterial roadway and the noninterstate freeway.
15	5. Automated traffic safety cameras may not be used on an on-ramp to an
16	interstate.
17	6. Beginning January 1, 2021, for an infraction generated through the use of an
18	automated traffic safety camera authorized in this subsection 11.50.570.H, if the registered
19	owner of the vehicle has:
20	a. No prior infractions generated under this subsection 11.50.570.H, a
21	warning notice with no penalty shall be issued to the registered owner of the vehicle for a
22	violation.

1	b. One or more prior infractions generated under this subsection
2	11.50.570.H, a notice of infraction shall be issued, in a manner consistent with Section
3	11.31.090, to the registered owner of the vehicle for a violation. The penalty for the violation is
4	\$75.
5	7. For infractions issued as authorized in this subsection 11.50.570.H, The City of
6	Seattle shall remit monthly to the state of Washington 50 percent of the noninterest money
7	received under this subsection 11.50.570.H in excess of the cost to install, operate, and maintain
8	the automated traffic safety cameras for use in the pilot program. Money remitted under this
9	subsection 11.50.570.H.7 to the State Treasurer shall be deposited in the Cooper Jones Active
10	Transportation Safety Account. The remaining 50 percent retained by The City of Seattle shall
11	be used only for improvements to transportation that support equitable access and mobility for
12	persons with disabilities.
13	8. A transit authority may not take disciplinary action, regarding a warning or
14	infraction issued pursuant to this subsection 11.50.570.H, against an employee who was
15	operating a public transportation vehicle at the time the violation that was the basis of the
16	warning or infraction was detected.
17	I.
18	1. The Seattle Department of Transportation is authorized to install automated
19	traffic safety cameras to detect speed violations pursuant to RCW 46.63.170(1)(d)(i). The speed
20	violations that the cameras may detect include, but are not limited to, one or more violations of
21	Sections 11.52.040, 11.52.060, 11.52.080, 11.52.100, 11.52.110, or 11.52.120.

1	2. Except where specifically exempted, all of the rules and restrictions applicable
2	to the use of automated traffic safety cameras in this Section 11.50.570 and Section 11.31.090
3	apply to speed detection enforcement as established in this subsection 11.50.570.I.
4	3. As used in this subsection 11.50.570.I, "school walk area" includes any
5	roadway identified in a school walk area as defined in RCW 28A.160.160.
6	4. As used in this subsection 11.50.570.I, "public park speed zone" means the
7	marked area within public property and extending 300 feet from the border of the public park
8	property: (I) consistent with active park use; and (II) where signs are posted to indicate the
9	location is within a public park speed zone.
10	5. As used in this subsection 11.50.570.I, "hospital speed zone" means the marked
11	area within hospital property and extending 300 feet from the border of hospital property: (I)
12	consistent with hospital use; and (II) where signs are posted to indicate the location is within a
13	hospital speed zone, where "hospital" has the same meaning as in RCW 70.41.020.
14	6. After completing and considering locations based on the outcomes of an equity
15	analysis that evaluates livability, accessibility, economics, education, and environmental health,
16	the City may operate one additional automated traffic camera for speed detection and
17	enforcement, plus one additional camera for every 10,000 Seattle residents, for locations that
18	meet one of the following criteria as defined in RCW 46.63.170(1)(d)(i):
19	a. The Seattle Department of Transportation has identified it as a priority
20	location in a road safety plan submitted to the Washington State Department of Transportation
21	and where other speed reduction measures are not feasible or have not been sufficiently effective
22	at reducing travel speed; or

1	b. Locations with a significantly higher rate of collisions than the city	
2	average over a period of at least three years prior to installation, and other speed reduction	
3	measures are not feasible or have not been sufficiently effective at reducing travel speed; or	
4	c. An area within the city limits designated by ordinance as a zone subject	
5	to specified restrictions and penalties on racing and race attendance.	
6	7. Beginning on the effective date of this ordinance, a warning notice with no	
7	penalty shall be issued to the registered owner of the vehicle for a violation generated through	
8	the use of an automated traffic safety camera authorized in this subsection 11.50.570.I, if the	
9	registered owner of the vehicle has no prior infractions generated under this subsection	
10	11.50.570.I.	
11	8. For automated traffic safety cameras used to detect speed violations on	
12	roadways identified in a school walk area, speed violations in public park speed zones, speed	
13	violations in hospital speed zones, or other speed violations in this subsection 11.50.570.I, the	
14	City shall remit monthly to the state 50 percent of the noninterest money received for infractions	
15	issued by those cameras in excess of the cost to administer, install, operate, and maintain the	
16	automated traffic safety cameras, including the cost of processing infractions. Money remitted	
17	under this subsection 11.50.570.I to the state treasurer shall be deposited in the state Cooper	
18	Jones Active Transportation Safety Account. This subsection 11.50.570.1.8 does not apply to	
19	automated traffic safety cameras authorized for stoplight, railroad crossing, or school speed zone	
20	violations.))	ĺ
21	G. Beginning on the effective date of this ordinance, a warning notice with no penalty	ĺ

22 shall be issued to the registered owner of the vehicle for an automated traffic safety camera

1	violation listed under subsections 11.50.570.A within the first 30 days of operation of a newly
2	located or relocated automated traffic safety camera.
3	Section 6. Pursuant to ESHB 2384, enacted as Chapter 307, Laws of 2024, Section
4	11.50.580 of the Seattle Municipal Code, enacted by Ordinance 126869, is repealed:

9	stoplight violations in accordance with Section 11.50.130 of the Seattle Municipal Code,
10	all revenues from all other automatic traffic safety camera types authorized in Section
11	11.50.570 of the Seattle Municipal Code, and other monies as authorized by ordinance.
12	The Fund shall receive earnings on its positive balances and pay interest on its negative
13	balances.
14	Section 11. Section 4 of Ordinance 124230, last amended by Ordinance 125206, is
15	amended as follows:
16	Section 4. The Director of the Seattle Department of Transportation shall have
17	responsibility for administering the ((School Safety Traffic and Pedestrian
18	Improvement)) Automatic Traffic Camera Safety Fund. The Director of Finance is
19	authorized to create other ((Subfunds, Accounts, or Subaccounts)) other accounts within
20	the Automatic Traffic Safety Fund as may be needed or appropriate to implement the
21	Fund's purpose and intent as established by this ordinance as amended.
22	Section 12. The Seattle Police Department, the Seattle Municipal Court, and the Seattle
23	Department of Transportation shall not disclose automated traffic safety camera data in response

to a records request made under the Public Records Act (chapter 42.56 RCW), or otherwise
publicly disclose automated traffic safety camera data in a manner that links a license plate to a
time, date, or location, unless required to do so by court order or applicable law. The
departments' legal counsel shall promptly notify the City Council's legislative legal counsel of
any such court order or applicable law.

6 Section 13. The Council requests that the Seattle Police Department include in any 7 contract with a vendor for the implementation of automated traffic safety camera technology 8 terms: 1) requiring the vendor to immediately notify SPD if the vendor receives a warrant or 9 subpoena seeking automated traffic safety camera data for any purpose, including purposes 10 related to reproductive healthcare or gender-affirming medical services; and, 2) requiring the 11 vendor to retain legal counsel to challenge any such warrant or subpoena and advise of outcome 12 or existence of warrant after expiration. SPD shall notify the Council upon receipt of information 13 related to a vendor warrant or subpoena described above.
