Mayor's 2024 Transportation Levy Proposal

- The proposal is for a \$1.45 billion, eight-year property tax levy to renew the existing Move Seattle Levy.
- For the Seattle median assessed value home (\$804,000 in 2024), the annual property tax bill would be \$469.
- For comparison with the existing Move Seattle Levy:
 - Move Seattle was a \$930 million, nine-year levy.
 - Seattle median home property tax bill for 2024 was \$300.
 - An inflation-only renewal of the Move Seattle Levy would be approximately a \$1.2 billion, eight-year levy.

Attachment A to CB 120788 provides details of proposed spending and anticipated deliverables.

Council Bill (CB) 120788

- Places the levy proposal on the November 2024 General Election.
- Establishes the terms and conditions of levy collection and the allowable spending of levy proceeds.
- Once approved by voters, these terms cannot be changed without going back to voters.
- Three approaches to consider for potential changes to the levy or to establish Council direction:
 - 1. Binding commitments through amendments to CB 120788.
 - 2. Separate, companion legislation to CB 120788.
 - 3. Defer to Council's annual budget process or future legislation.

Issue 1 – General Terms of Levy

- Legislation proposes a \$1.45 billion, eight-year property tax levy.
- Requires a minimum annual General Fund appropriation for transportation purposes as part of the City's budget (no supplantation). Consistent with Move Seattle Levy.

Options:

- A. Change the \$1.45 billion size of the levy.
- B. Change the eight-year term of the levy.
- C. Modify General Fund requirement or other general provisions.

Issue 2 – Legal Spending Requirements

- Legislation identifies anticipated spending for levy programs (in Attachment A),
 but does not mandate required spending levels.
- This approach provides more flexibility during budget to adapt to changing conditions or emerging needs.
- Move Seattle Levy established total appropriation requirements for 3 categories of spending and a specific funding commitment for one project.

– Options:

- A. Add spending requirements for categories of levy spending.
- B. Add spending requirements for specific projects or programs.
- C. No change; defer to future budget, levy oversight, and reporting.

Issue 3 – Allocations/Levy Commitments

- Attachment A establishes allowable uses of levy proceeds and identifies anticipated spending for 10 categories of levy programs.
- Some programs identify specific locations for initial investments/deliverables.
- New programs of note include the District Project Fund and the Neighborhood-Initiated Safety Partnership Program.
- Options:
 - A. Authorize levy spending for programs not in the Mayor's proposal.
 - B. Adjust anticipated spending across levy projects and programs.
 - C. Modify specific project commitments identified in Attachment A.

Issue 4 – Levy Oversight Committee

- Move Seattle Levy Oversight Committee presented recommendations at May 7 Select Committee. Most recommendations reflected in proposal.
- Recommendation for levy funding to support oversight capacity, including potential audit of levy programs, was not included in proposal.
- Proposed composition of Oversight Committee differs from Move Seattle (shown on next slide).

– Options:

- A. Add back direct Councilmember representation on Oversight Committee.
- B. Revise composition, roles, or expertise requirements.
- C. Allocate levy resources for Oversight Committee activities.

Issue 5 – Reporting Requirements

- Legislation requires annual reporting, consistent with Move Seattle. However,
 Move Seattle included more specifics on what is included in reports.
- Over the course of Move Seattle, SDOT developed dashboard tools and supplemental reports for the Oversight Committee and the public.
- Expectation is to maintain this more detailed reporting, but this is not specifically called out as a requirement in the legislation.

– Options:

- A. Add requirement for dashboard reporting or other reports.
- B. Add detail on specific information to include in annual reports.
- C. Add reporting on specific issues (Move Seattle highlighted bridges).
- D. No change; defer to Oversight Committee and continuity of existing reporting.

Issue 6 – Transportation Funding Task Force

- Mayor's proposal calls for creating a Funding Task Force for sidewalks, bridges, and other transportation asset.
- Legislation provides for levy funding to support this work, but separate legislation to create the task force has not been transmitted.
- Legislation to create the task force could be considered on a separate schedule from the levy legislation.
- Options:
 - A. Develop legislation to establish task force.

Issue 7 – Other Implementation Issues

- Legislation establishes allowed uses and legal restrictions which cannot be changed without going back to voters.
- Council may have interest in implementation issues that are beyond the scope of this legislation.
- In considering other levy proposals, Council has, at times, developed companion legislation to express Council's intent or identify issues for further analysis.
- Options:
 - A. Develop a companion resolution to the levy legislation.
