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# CITY OF SEATTLE RESOLUTION 31577

A RESOLUTION adopting the City of Seattle Privacy Principles governing the City's
operations, which will provide an ethical framework for dealing with current and future
technologies that impact privacy, and setting timelines for future reporting on the
development of a Privacy Statement and Privacy Toolkit for their implementation.

- WHEREAS, advances in the use of information technologies in administration, law enforcement, and communications lead to the potential for increased data collection; and
- WHEREAS, protecting the privacy of individuals interacting with City government is essential to maintaining the public's trust; and
- WHEREAS, a number of advocates, academics, professionals, and public-sector leaders called upon the City to undertake a review of the City's privacy practices and to develop a Citywide privacy policy and means for ensuring compliance; and
- WHEREAS, the City aspires to provide leadership for other cities dealing with privacy concerns; and
- WHEREAS, a City-wide Interdepartmental Team (IDT) sponsored by the Department of Information Technology (DoIT) and Seattle Police Department (SPD), and comprised of departmental representatives from Seattle City Light, Seattle Fire Department, Law Department, Seattle Library, Records Administration, Seattle Department of Transportation, Department of Neighborhoods, and Seattle Parks and Recreation and was formed to examine leading City data practices and commitments necessary to build public trust in those practices, and
- WHEREAS, a Privacy Advisory Committee comprised of academics, practitioners, lawyers, and community advocates has been convened to provide outside expertise and advice to the City's effort; NOW, THEREFORE,
- BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEATTLE, THE **MAYOR CONCURRING, THAT:**

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Section 1. The City of Seattle Privacy Principles, related to the City's collection, protection, use, retention, sharing, and disposal of personal information, and committing the City to standards of accountability and transparency, as elaborated in Attachment A, are adopted.

Section 2. The Mayor's Office, along with IDT leadership from DoIT and SPD, will report back to the Council in August 2015 on: (1) the Privacy Statement; (2) the Privacy Toolkit, which will establish actionable privacy standards to enable City departments to comply with the Privacy Principles; and (3) the timeline by which City departments will incorporate these Principles into their business and operational practices.

# City of Seattle Privacy Principles

# What is Personal Information?

"Personal information" is any information relating to an identified or identifiable individual. Examples of personal information include but are not limited to a person's name, home or email address, social security number, religion, political opinions, financial and health records, and racial and ethnic origin.

# Privacy Principles

The City of Seattle collects personal information from the public so that we can provide many important services including community and critical infrastructure protection, 911 call response, waste management, electricity delivery and other services. We work to find a fair balance between gathering information to provide these needed services and protecting the public's privacy.

While privacy laws protect some personal information, the information we collect becomes a government record that others can ask to see through public records requests. Therefore, it is important for you to know when and how your personal information is collected, how we use it, how we disclose it and how long we keep it.

The following Privacy Principles guide the actions we take when collecting and using your personal information:

1. We value your privacy...

Keeping your personal information private is very important. We consider potential risks to your privacy and the public's well-being before collecting, using and disclosing your personal information.

2. We collect and keep only what we need...

We only collect information that we need to deliver City services and keep it as long as we are legally required and to deliver those services. Whenever possible, we tell you when we are collecting this information.

3. How we use your information....

When possible, we make available information about the ways we use your personal information at the time we collect it. We commit to giving you a choice whenever possible about how we use your information.

4. We are accountable...

We are responsible for managing your personal information in a manner that is consistent with our commitments and as required by law. We protect your personal information by restricting unauthorized access and by securing our computing resources from threats.

5. How we share your information...

We follow federal and state laws about information disclosure whenever we work with outside governmental agencies and in answering Public Disclosure Requests (PDRs). Business partners and contracted vendors who receive or collect personal information from us or for us to deliver City services must agree to our privacy requirements.

6. Accuracy is important...

We work to maintain and use accurate personal information for City business. When practical, we will work to correct inaccurate personal information. We also direct our partners and contracted vendors to follow the same guidelines.

**Legislation Title**: A RESOLUTION adopting the City of Seattle Privacy Principles governing the City's operations, which will provide an ethical framework for dealing with current and future technologies that impact privacy, and setting timelines for future reporting on the development of a Privacy Statement and Privacy Toolkit for their implementation.

Summary and background of the Legislation: In response to increasing collection and use of data, the Mayor's Office convened an Interdepartmental Team (IDT), led by the Department of Information Technology (DoIT) and the Seattle Police Department (SPD), to update the City's privacy policies and regulations. The three IDT deliverables are a set of high-level Privacy Principles, an operational Privacy Statement, and a Privacy Toolkit to help departments implement the rules and ethics developed in the Privacy Principles and Statement. This resolution adopts the high-level Privacy Principles, and calls for a future Council briefing on the Privacy Statement and Privacy Toolkit upon their completion.

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. SUMMARY	OF FINANCIA	AL IMPLICATIONS			

a) Does the legislation have indirect or long-term financial impacts to the City of Seattle that are not reflected in the above?

The adoption of these Privacy Principles has no direct financial impact, but there may be future financial impacts as the principles are implemented by departments and continued administration. The IDT considering the further elaboration of policy based upon these Principles reserves the

right to recommend specific means of implementation, some of which may have financial impacts. Any necessary budget appropriation changes will be included in future budget legislation or other legislation.

- b) Is there financial cost or other impacts of not implementing the legislation?

  As privacy law and policy advance, it is increasingly essential that the City of Seattle have a wellarticulated and comprehensive privacy policy. Additionally, this legislation is required before the
  City of Seattle's wireless mesh network may be made operational again, as the Council placed a
  moratorium on its use to remain in place until this policy development takes place. Finally,
  paying additional attention to privacy and data security can help prevent data breaches and their
  associated human and financial consequences.
- c) Does this legislation affect any departments besides the originating department? Following adoption of the Privacy Principles, the IDT will be developing more specific guidelines to departments, as well as a Privacy Toolkit, which departmental staff will use to ensure that future data programs and technological acquisitions comply with the Privacy Principles and guidelines.

- e) Is publication of notice with *The Daily Journal of Commerce* and/or *The Seattle Times* required for this legislation?

- g) Please describe any perceived implication for the principles of the Race and Social Justice Initiative. Does this legislation impact vulnerable or historically disadvantaged communities?

The development of all aspects of the Privacy Policy (i.e., Principles, Statement, and Toolkit) actively consider disparate impacts upon vulnerable or historically disadvantaged communities. This has been a priority for the IDT from the beginning, and will continue to work with the Office for Civil Rights and the Office of Immigrant and Refugee Affairs to ensure that the Policy is communicated and implemented in equitable ways.

- h) If this legislation includes a new initiative or a major programmatic expansion: What are the long-term and measurable goals of the program? Please describe how this legislation would help achieve the program's desired goals. Several metrics are possible. First, the number of staff (and in which departments) trained to use the eventual Privacy Toolkit will provide a measure of how widely the policy is being integrated into the City. Second, the number and quality of inquiries received by DoIT about data operations planning will help illustrate how successful the policy is being perceived.
