1	WHEREAS, Seattle Municipal Code Section 21.49.042 authorizes an emergency low-income
2	bill assistance program whereby customers meeting certain criteria may receive a credit
3	against delinquent bills; and
4	WHEREAS, the COVID-19 pandemic has had an adverse financial impact on many City Light
5	customers; and
6	WHEREAS, the presence of the Delta variant continues to impact economic activity and
7	recovery in many sectors; and
8	WHEREAS, more than 24,000 City Light residential customers have an overdue balance greater
9	than \$300 as of October 11, 2021, despite the temporary expansion of access to the
10	Emergency Bill Assistance Program's second bill credit in Ordinance 126317;
11	NOW, THEREFORE,
12	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF SEATTLE AS FOLLOWS:
13	Section 1. Section 21.49.042 of the Seattle Municipal Code, last amended by Ordinance
14	126317, is amended as follows:
15	21.49.042 Emergency Bill Assistance Program
16	A. An emergency credit of up to 100 percent of a customer's delinquent bills not to
17	exceed a maximum credit as provided in subsection 21.49.042.C may be granted by the
18	Department to income-eligible residential accounts, metered for a single household that qualify
19	under the following criteria:
20	1. Total household income does not exceed 80 percent of the Washington State
21	median income; and
22	2. Have completed any Department program application where income eligibility
23	is verified; and

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1	3. Have received a ten-day notice from the Department notifying them that
2	payment or payment arrangements must be made to prevent disconnection or have a past due
3	balance greater than \$250 on an active service agreement.
4	B. A customer is eligible for the emergency credit once each calendar year, or twice each
5	calendar year if the household includes at least one minor child.
6	C. In 2021, the maximum credit shall be \$500. In 2022 and subsequent years, the
7	maximum credit from 2021 shall be adjusted annually by the Department to reflect the average
8	change in electric bills for residential customers.
9	D. The Department may, at its discretion, require a payment plan for the unpaid balance
10	as a condition of receiving emergency assistance under the program.
11	E. ((Between May 24, 2021 and)) <u>Until</u> December 31, ((2021)) 2022, households
12	qualifying under subsection 21.49.042.A who do not have minor children in the household may
13	receive a second emergency assistance credit within the same calendar year, notwithstanding

anything in subsection 21.49.042.B.

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1	Section 2. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force 30 days after its approval by
2	the Mayor, but if not approved and returned by the Mayor within ten days after presentation, it
3	shall take effect as provided by Seattle Municipal Code Section 1.04.020.
