1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title:

AN ORDINANCE relating to street and sidewalk use; addressing low impact development requirements in the City of Seattle's Phase I Municipal Stormwater National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System general permit issued by the Washington State Department of Ecology; correcting typographical errors and section references, clarifying regulations, and making minor amendments; and amending Sections 15.02.042, 15.02.044, 15.02.046, 15.04.010, 15.04.035, 15.06.050, 15.20.070, 15.22.060, 15.22.080, 15.22.100, 15.22.110, 15.36.010, 15.44.030, 15.46.020, 15.70.030, 15.72.010, and 15.91.016 of the Seattle Municipal Code.

Summary and background of the Legislation:

The Phase I Municipal Stormwater National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System ("NPDES") general permit is issued to the City of Seattle by the Washington State Department of Ecology to control and regulate the discharge of stormwater in Seattle. The NPDES general permit requires the City to review, revise, and make effective local development-related codes, rules, standards, or other enforceable documents to incorporate and require low-impact development principles and best management practices as defined by the NPDES permit.
