1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title: A RESOLUTION related to addressing the needs of people living in the I-5 East Duwamish Greenbelt and in the adjoining neighborhoods; accepting the Seattle Human Services Department's East Duwamish Greenbelt Encampments Outreach Assessment; and approving the City's operations plan to physically improve and maintain the Greenbelt and provide a healthier and safer environment for all.

Summary and background of the Legislation: This resolution accepts the outreach assessment and approves the operational plan for the I-5 East Duwamish Greenbelt. The City of Seattle and King County declared a State of Emergency on November 2, 2015. On May 31, 2016, the City Council unanimously adopted Resolution 31671, with the Mayor concurring, which endorsed a public health and public safety model to address the needs of people living in the Greenbelt and in the adjoining neighborhoods. Consistent with Resolution 31671, the City and its outreach professionals have since engaged in many weeks of intensive outreach to individuals living in the Greenbelt and have presented meaningful and highly personalized offers of shelter and services, as detailed in reports to the City Council on June 9, 2016, June 24, 2016, July 8, 2016, and August 18, 2016.

There is no fiscal impact to this resolution. The Seattle Police Department has a contract for \$150,000 with the Washington State Department of Transportation (WSDOT) to provide security services. In addition, the Department of Human Services has a contract for \$100,000 with WSDOT to provide services. Seattle Department of Transportation and Seattle Parks and Recreation have agreed their work can be handled within existing resources.

Increasing outreach and access to case management to encampment residents supports more equitable access to housing resources to individuals who choose not to access the mainstream pathway to housing via shelter. Currently, an estimated 8% of people in Seattle identify as Black: about 6% are Black and U.S. Born/African American. A reported 19% of people in Seattle encampments identify as African American or Black. Another study estimated that 32% of Seattle's homeless over age 50 are African American.
