#### **PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE:**

## Apprenticeship Consultant Field Supervisor, Washington State Department of Labor & Industries Seattle, Washington (July 2003 – present)

- Supervising and training a team of 8 Apprenticeship Consultants that provide technical and consultative services to registered apprenticeship program sponsors in their establishment, registration and operation; drafting new and revising existing program standards for formal adoption; and the dissemination of best practice models.
- Preparing and delivering of public testimony and documentation to the *Washington State Apprenticeship and Training Council* (WSATC), the legal body legislatively authorized to govern registered apprenticeship.
- Convening key stakeholders within the utilities industry to sponsor and organize the WSATC "Promoting Diversity in Utility Apprenticeship Programs," encouraging programs to recruit, hire and retain the best qualified and most diverse workforce by identifying best practices, barriers and superior pathways for training.
- Acting, with state-wide responsibility, as the primary consultant for the development and expansion of "new and emerging" (non-traditional) occupations to the apprenticeship model (including fire fighter, nurse, dispensing optician, etc...), as well as, liaise with the other government agencies and departments, including providing testimony to the Washington State Legislature.
- Auditing program sponsors for compliance, measuring program success and writing individual program reports.
   Additionally, performed a special investigation and wrote the report of findings that was utilized in the development of the Department's legislatively required Report to Interested Parties.
- Assists program sponsors in meeting their affirmative action and retention goals through outreach, program development, promotion and the utilization of existing pre-apprenticeship programs.

## Revenue Officer, Washington State Department of Labor & Industries Seattle, Washington (August 2001 – July 2003)

- Responsible for full fiscal compliance, monitoring and review for a caseload of 250 industrial insurance accounts, totaling over 1.5 million dollars in premiums.
- Extensive personal contact and negotiations with firms across a range of industries; including construction trades, high technology, professional, retail, manufacturing and aerospace.

## Peace Corps Volunteer, School & Community Resource Project, U.S. Peace Corps South Africa Mawa Village, Northern Province, Republic of South Africa (February 1999 – May 2001)

- Provided teacher training and other support for 45 rural teachers and nearly 1,500 students to promote the emerging "outcomes based education" system.
- Developed and implemented HIV/AIDS awareness workshops, while utilizing and educating rural teachers.
- Advised and coordinated a village school construction program designed to utilize local resources and impart sustainable skills. Construction project was funded at 707,988 Rand (approximately 100,000 US dollars) for a six classroom school block and pit latrines.

# School-to-Work Manager, Alliance for Education / Greater Seattle Chamber of Commerce Seattle, Washington (March 1995 – January 1999)

- Established and staffed an executive level school-to-work governance structure, representing over 30 community
  organizations and businesses, to provide formal oversight and support to the Seattle School District's emerging
  school-to-work system.
- Convened business volunteers and educators to design a "process architecture" to link students with streamlined work-based learning opportunities in the Seattle business community.
- Coordinated the Urban Scholars program, a minority-based job skills training and employment program for "atrisk" Seattle High School students, valued at nearly 100,000 dollars.
- Collaborated with high school representatives and business coordinators to recruit students and maintain an exceptional 95 percent participation rate in the Urban Scholars program.
- Supervised four high school interns and responsible for placing over 200 students into paid summer internships.
- Recruited and managed a team of 12 AmeriCorps\*VISTA Volunteers, deployed through Seattle Public Middle Schools, to assist teachers in creating systemic and sustainable service learning opportunities for all students. Service learning projects for students rose to an average 2,000 opportunities a month in targeted schools.
