BACKGROUND



Year	Action	Purpose
2009	Ordinance 123142	Established Central Waterfront Partnerships Committee
2012	Resolution 31399	 Endorsed Waterfront Program Strategic Plan, established funding plan, including local improvement district and philanthropy Acknowledged role of non-profit conservancies in other cities, recommends City pursue similar arrangement for Waterfront Program
2014	Letter	Letter from Central Waterfront Committee to City recommending Friends for operations and management
2015	Ordinance 118478	Authorized execution of Westlake/Occidental Park agreement between Downtown Seattle Association and Parks Department
2015-2017	Agreements	Successful operating agreements between City and Friends to program and activate waterfront spaces
2016	Ordinance 125248	 Authorized joint funding agreement with non-profit partner Friends of Waterfront Seattle to finance Pier 62/63 Phase 1 Rebuild


OVERVIEW OF PROPOSED RESOLUTION



- Reaffirm final elements of funding plan
- Create transparency for local improvement district (LID) formation process
- Identify milestones for Friends of Waterfront Seattle philanthropic campaign plan and early pledge
- Create framework for operations and management with Friends of Waterfront Seattle

TOTAL= \$688M


LOCAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT (LID)



- Assessment of properties that will receive special benefit
- Council forms LID through prescribed legislative process
- Robust outreach to ensure transparent and fair process
- Resolution affirms City will pursue LID and is clear about timeline and opportunities for property owner and stakeholder input

LID PROCESS OVERVIEW





LID FORMATION STEPS



SPRING 2018	 Council announces intent to form (by resolution) Formal notice of public hearing Public hearing 	
FALL 2018	 Council establishes LID (by ordinance) 30-day protest period 30-day appeal period 	
EARLY 2019	 Assessment roll Formal notice of public hearing Public hearing Council confirmation of assessment roll 10-day appeal period 	

PHILANTHROPHY



- Friends of Waterfront Seattle: \$100 million commitment
- Pier 62 rebuild campaign
 - \$5.1 million of \$8 million raised already
- Resolution calls for Friends to provide the following prior to LID formation:
 - Philanthropic campaign plan with pledge/payment schedule
 - Initial \$25 million pledge (inclusive of Pier 62 rebuild campaign)

OPERATIONS AND MANAGEMENT





OPERATING AGREEMENT



- Maintenance approach
 - Baseline: City departments
 - Enhanced: Parks/Friends agreement
 - All work performed by City employees
 - Negotiated level of service
 - Collaborative approach
- Programming and activation
- Timing
 - 2018 operating agreements complete
 - 2019 Pier 62/63 operations begin
 - o 2023 full park operations begin

OPERATING AGREEMENT



- Budget
 - Seattle Parks District: \$3.5 million annually dedicated to Parks staff
 - Friends of Waterfront Seattle: anticipated \$1+ million annually
- City oversight and participation
 - Annual report to Council
 - Two City ex-officio seats on Friends' board
 - Stakeholder oversight committee
- Agreement review
 - Term of no less then five years, joint review
