Why do you want to become a member of the Seattle Youth Commission?

It's simple: as a citizen, I want to see change and be a part of the process of making it happen (through discussion with Seattle leaders and the input I can give). I understand the importance of exposing young people to the world of local politics; once my generation reaches adulthood, we will be the ones voting on the policies that exemplify the precise change I want to produce as a member of the Seattle Youth Commission. To not only say, "I want to make a positive change in my community" but to put those words into action is exactly why I want to be a member of the Seattle Youth Commission. In politics, our leaders often make decisions affecting specific groups of people without considering inviting those they are impacting. However, as a member, I will be a voice to frequently underrepresented groups in politics: the youth, people of color, immigrants, and women.

What are the issues in your community that you are passionate about and why?

I am incredibly passionate about civil rights, the environment, and the growing homelessness crisis Seattle is facing. My passion for civil rights stems from the fact that I have a background consisting of historically marginalized groups. Therefore, I have first hand experience in not being given the same treatment as some of my peers. I am an avid supporter in preventing police brutality, raising awareness about rape culture, and giving youth from low income and struggling immigrant families the access to a variety of opportunities that will help them succeed in life. Additionally, I am passionate about keeping the planet healthy. Without a healthy environment, we have nothing. We, as a community, need to take every possible measure to make sure Seattle is doing its best to be environmentally friendly. Lastly, I am very aware of the growing homelessness crisis Seattle is facing. This goes hand in hand with gentrification and lack of affordable housing I have seen. We cannot thrive as a community until we fix these issues.

What do you hope to gain from this experience?

Working as a member of the Seattle Youth Commission I hope to Impact my community in a positive way by learning how change occurs, building new relationships, and engaging with those in my city. As stated previously, I feel strongly about being a voice for change. Being on the Seattle Youth Commission would give me the oppurtunity to explore the depths of my passion for creating change. I also want to learn how change occurs and the Seattle Youth Commission is a unique opportunity to get first hand experience on how the policy you create impacts people. Furthermore, being on the Seattle Youth Commission will allow me to build relationships with my leaders and other youth within the program, bridging the ever so present gap between political leaders and citizens. Finally, I want to engage more deeply with those in my community. The people of Seattle are diverse in many ways and I want to cultivate more connection between myself and the community as a part of my experience. These are some of the highlights I hope to gain from the experience of being a member of the Seattle Youth Commission.

What do you think makes your perspective unique to others?

I am black. I am woman. I am from a family of Ethiopian immigrants who escaped a brutal communist regime. I am the first in my family to be born in the United States. These combined make my experience unique to the majority who surround me. This unique perspective has been wonderful but can be frustrating because I know what it means and feels like to be underrepresented due to my background and identity, especially in politics. In addition, moving around from low income to middle class neighborhoods gives me a unique take on what the community in Seattle is like. I was also a shy kid so I know what it feels like to not think your voice matters. I can relate to and encourage those who are afraid to speak up even though I grew up to be more outspoken in my teen years. Lastly, traveling back and forth from Ethiopia and the States gives me a rare take on the functionaltity of communities as I compare two very distict ways of living and government. All these come together to formulate a perspective on the world that is unique but also wide enough to relate to many people.
