Designed and optimized nationally-recognized migrant farmworker justice program by raising mission-aligned grant capital and strengthening national and statewide cross-sector relationships.

 nationally recognized as a model to increase access to historically marginalized communities.

 demonstrating understanding of the private agricultural industry, providing analysis on the intersection of domestic and
 sexual violence and local economic growth, and proposing solutions to increase access to services.
- Improved grants process by creating efficient organizational infrastructure and systems, staffing, and budgeting, resulting in Coalition's ability to support programs to provide grant reports with increased accuracy.

and county government officials, and advocates.


