#### 1. BILL SUMMARY

**Legislation Title:** A RESOLUTION calling for additional measures by the City and its partners that complement mandatory housing affordability (MHA) implementation to promote livability and equitable development, mitigate displacement, and address challenges and opportunities raised by community members during the MHA public engagement process.

Summary and background of the Legislation: In 2014, the City convened the Seattle Housing Affordability and Livability Agenda (HALA) Advisory Committee to help identify strategies that would promote the production and preservation of affordable housing. One of the HALA Advisory Committee's recommendations was for the City to upzone residential and commercial zones in various parts of Seattle, and in connection with these upzones, establish mandatory housing affordability (MHA) requirements. Since then, MHA has been implemented in the University District, Downtown and South Lake Union, along key nodes of 23<sup>rd</sup> Avenue in the Central District, Chinatown/International District, and Uptown.

Concurrent with citywide MHA implementation, which expands the upzones and associated MHA requirements to the remaining multifamily and commercially zoned properties throughout Seattle and within all urban villages and urban village expansion areas, this resolution recognizes that while these changes will result in the production of more affordable housing, land use regulations alone are not sufficient to achieve all of the City's goals and the goals of Seattle's different neighborhoods.

The resolution identifies Council's commitment to continuing work and partnerships to address community needs in the following categories:

- Equitable development, particularly anti-displacement strategies
- Investment of MHA and Seattle Housing Levy funds
- Affordable home ownership
- Development activity evaluation
- Economic development and commercial stability
- Coordination of City and community efforts
- Analysis of historic resources
- Future community planning efforts
- Tree protection
- Initiatives specific to Council districts
