Almost 1,500 bills have been introduced so far this session. Despite this large number of bills having been introduced, we are seeing an interesting trend this session of some bills being slower to be introduced. It is not abnormal for bills to take awhile to get drafted, secure sponsors, and then get introduced. But for being through the second week of session, we are still hearing a lot of bills not being introduced yet. Some bills even had hearings on the draft version without an official bill being introduced, which is fairly uncommon. Bills might get scheduled before they're introduced, but usually the bill ends up being officially introduced in time for the hearing.

The first cutoff date is not until the February 22 policy committee deadline. This is the date by which a bill must be passed out of its house of origin committee in order to stay alive. There are exceptions to this cutoff for bills in fiscal committees and bills necessary to implement the budget but this will cut back on the number of bills that are still up for consideration. Our priority is to work to ensure our critical legislation is introduced and begins to move through the legislative process.

Increasing monetary penalties for the unlawful use of a personal electronic device while driving a motor vehicle in a school, playground, or crosswalk speed zone.

Upcoming Events: Transportation (House) Public Hearing 1/28 @ 3:30 pm

Increases the monetary penalty to two times the penalty amount when the following occurs within a school, playground, or crosswalk speed zone: The holder of an intermediate license operates a moving motor vehicle while using a wireless communications device or a person uses a personal electronic device while driving a motor vehicle on a public highway. Requires one-half of the money collected to be deposited into the school zone safety account.

RTA additional voter approval

Requiring a regional transit authority to receive additional approval from voters if the cost to complete a regional transit system plan approved by voters in 2016 increases beyond fifty-four billion dollars or any additions or subtractions of projects or significant project scope when compared to the system plan are made.

SB 5037

Establishing a vehicle valuation method for a regional transit authority collecting a motor vehicle excise tax that is based on Kelley blue book or national automobile dealers association values.

SB 5042 Requires certain regional transit authorities that impose a motor vehicle excise tax to establish a market value adjustment program to be implemented by December 31, 2019; and provide a credit against the total motor vehicle excise tax due. Authorizes a regional transit authority to contract with the department of licensing for the collection of a motor vehicle excise tax only if the authority has implemented the program.

MVET low-income adjustments

Creating a motor vehicle excise tax low-income market value adjustment program.

Requires a contract entered into with a regional transit authority, for the collection of a motor vehicle excise tax, to provide that the department of licensing receives full reimbursement for the administration and collection of the tax. Requires a regional transit authority that imposes a motor vehicle excise tax to: establish a low-income market value adjustment program for eligible vehicles owned by low-income individuals; and allow an additional one-time low-income individual credit against the tax due with respect to certain vehicles. Authorizes the department of licensing to adopt rules to implement this act.

Passenger-only ferry study

Requires the department of transportation to complete a consultant study on the feasibility, need, and potential governance and funding structures for passenger-only ferry service between Olympia and Seattle. Provides that this act is null and void if appropriations are not approved.

Electric transportation

S Environment, E Palumbo

Advancing electric transportation.

Provides a sales and use tax exemption on electric vehicles. Requires the department of ecology to adopt the zero emission vehicle program regulations. Declares an intent to provide clear authority for utilities to engage in and promote the build out of electric vehicle infrastructure. Requires utilities that are traditionally responsible for providing electric service to customers and for understanding and engineering the electrical grid for safety and reliability to be engaged in the electrification of the transportation system. Authorizes certain cities or towns that are engaged in the generation, sale, or distribution of energy to, for its customers: assist in financing materials and equipment for the electrification of transportation; and offer programs, services, or investments in the electrification of transportation plan, to the utilities and transportation commission, that deploys electric vehicle supply equipment or provides other electric transportation programs, services, or incentives to support electrification of transportation. Creates the electric vehicle account.
