Number 10 March 25, 2019

Weekly Overview

Last week the focus remained largely on policy committee hearings as committees continued hearing bills that have been passed by the opposite house. For some bills, the committees had already heard a companion bill, so a lot of testimony was shorter than the first time around. The committees were also getting updated if and how the companion bill had been changed by the house of origin. For other bills that had no companion, the committee members were hearing the bills and testimony for the first time.

Going into the upcoming week there will continue to be hearings and executive session. Policy committees will begin passing bills out of committee as we get closer to the next big milestone this session – opposite house policy cutoff. All bills must pass out of their opposite house policy committee by April 3rd or they will be considered dead (unless they are deemed Necessary to Implement the Budget (NTIB)).

The most anticipated events coming up this week is the release of budgets. The House has announced that they will be releasing their proposed budgets on Monday, March 25th. They will be releasing their proposed operating, capital, and transportation budgets all on that day. The Senate is expected to release their transportation budget on Wednesday and their proposed operating and capital budgets sometime within the next week.

At this point over 2,300 bills have been introduced this session:

- About 1,500 bills made it through the house of origin policy cutoff
- 1,010 bills made it through the house of origin fiscal cutoff
- 684 bills made it through house of origin cutoff. You can see a list of bills still alive here (this does not count bills that have been deemed NTIB.

March 20th – Budget and Revenue Forecast Special Update

In the first year of the biennium (odd-numbered years), the Washington State Legislature passes three budgets, Operating, Capital, and Transportation. The Operating Budget funds ongoing state activity and is written by the House Appropriations and Senate Ways & Means Committees. The Capital Budget is written by the House Capital Budget Committee and Senate Ways & Means, funding construction in areas such as public schools, parks, prisons, affordable housing, and environmental clean-up. The Transportation Budget is written by the Transportation Committees in each chamber and is largely user-funded with gas taxes, permits, and other licensing fees. In the second year of the biennium (even-numbered years), the Legislature passes three supplemental bills. Bills that have failed to meet fiscal deadlines but can be deemed by leadership to be "Necessary to Implement the Budget" and find new life due to a positive or negative effect on the budget or to earn the vote of a particular member. The budgets are negotiated and passed late in the session and then shuffled between the chambers for amendments and concurrence before arriving at the Governor's desk. The Governor may issue line item vetoes rather than vetoing an entire budget bill. A 2/3 majority in each chamber is required to override such a veto.

While the Office of Financial Management releases the Governor's budget in December prior to the start of the biennium, majority party House and Senate budget writers wait until after the formal release of the spring revenue forecast. Washington is unique in its approach to revenue forecasting. The forecast is nonpartisan and is used for budget preparation by both the executive and legislative branches. The work is guided by Washington State Chief Economist Stephen Lerch Ph.D. and the Economic and Revenue Forecast Council, made up of State Treasurer Duane Davidson (R), Senate Ways & Means Chair Senator Christine Rolfes (D-Bainbridge) and Ranking Member Senator John Braun (R-Chehalis), House Finance Ranking Member Ed Orcutt (R-Kalama), House Appropriations Chair Timm Ormsby (D-Spokane), Office of Financial Management Director David Schumacher, and Department of Revenue Director Vikki Smith. Revenue forecasts are to be submitted to the Governor and Legislature on or before March 20th, June 27th, and September 27th in odd-numbered years. In even numbered years, they are submitted on prior to November 20th and February 20th.

This morning, the Economic and Revenue Forecast Council announced state revenues will continue to grow through mid-2021. Projections show an increase of nearly \$307 million for the current cycle ending this summer, and \$554 million for the next two-year cycle. In total, this is an increase of roughly \$861 million more than was previously expected, bringing the state budget to \$50.6 billion. Senate Ways & Means Ranking Member Senator John Braun (R-Chehalis) suggested this increase is proof that no new revenue is needed. House Appropriations Chair Representative Timm Ormsby (D-Spokane) disagreed, claiming the budget growth will not adequately address current funding levels or the education investments promised in the resolution of the McCleary court case.

Governor Inslee and Legislative Democrats have for months planned to raise additional revenue through closure of tax preferences, collection of sales tax from out-of-state retailers (adoption of the Wayfair decision in already signed SSB 5581), a capital gains tax, REET (real estate excise tax) or B&O increases on services. Last week's forecast will be a constant topic of conversation for the rest of the session, majority Democrats are working to create momentum to have sufficient votes in one chamber to agree with the other chamber on the more contentious revenue strategies (capital gains, REET, or B&O increases).

This bill passed out of the House on March 5th with a vote of 72-24 (2 excused).

Adjusts rating levels and associated deadlines for participants in the Early Achievers (EA) program. Establishes a Cost of Child Care Regulations Work Group. This bill was voted out of the House on March 5th with a vote of 96-0 (2 excused).

Creates a competitive grant program to support regional networks and program intermediaries in expanding CCL opportunities. Requires school districts to be funded up to 1.2 full-time equivalents for students in certain CCL programs, subject to amounts appropriated. Requires the institutions of higher education to have CCL coordinators to engage faculty and institutional leadership in expanding the number of certain CCL programs, subject to amounts appropriated. The bill will create high quality career connected learning opportunities and provide opportunities for people and communities that have been left out of career pathway experiences. This bill passed out of the Senate on March 8th with a vote of 45-3.

This bill passed out of the Senate on March 9th with a vote of 27-18 (4 excused).

Enacts the Student Loan Relief and Reform Act. Creates the Washington Income Share Agreement Pilot Program. Establishes the Washington Student Loan Refinancing Program in which the state contracts with financial institutions to refinance student loans by buying down the interest rate or providing partial risk coverage. This bill passed out of the Senate on March 6th with a vote of 40-8 (1 excused).

Establishes penalties for violations and a revolving account in the custody of the State Treasurer for state receipts of penalties, for use in enforcement of marketing and labeling requirements. The bill passed out of the House on March 11th with a vote of 60-37 (1 excused).

ESHB 1578 (SSB 5578) Requires a tug escort in Rosario Strait and connected waterways to the east for laden oil tankers of between 5,000 and 40,000 deadweight tons and for articulated tug-barges and certain towed waterborne vessels of at least 5,000 deadweight tons, beginning in 2020. Directs the Board of Pilotage Commissioners (BPC), in consultation with the Department of Ecology (ECY), to adopt tug escort rules by 2025 addressing certain oil tankers of between 5,000 and 40,000 deadweight tons, articulated tug-barges, and towed waterborne vessels or barges of at least 5,000 deadweight tons operating in Puget Sound. Directs the ECY to develop and maintain a model to assess oil spill risks in Washington waters and the oil spill risk reduction potential of an emergency response towing vessel serving waterways located near the San Juan Islands. This bill passed out of the House with a vote of 70-28.

Increases the distance within which a vessel or other object may not approach a southern resident orca whale (orcas). Establishes commercial whale watching and alternate operator licenses, sets fees for the licenses, and requires the Department of Fish and Wildlife (DFW) to report on the license program. Directs the DFW to convene an independent science panel to analyze the most current and best available science regarding noise impacts to orcas by small vessels and whale watching vessels. Requires the topic of

sustainable whale watching to be included in the statewide tourism marketing plan. This bill passed out of the House on March 7th with a vote of 78-20.

The current language requires food service establishments must provide straws upon request to persons with disabilities along with any other local ordinances restricting plastic straws to at least meet the requirements of the bill. This bill passed out of the Senate on March 4th with a vote of 27-21 (1 excused).

E2SSB 5116 (2SHB 1211) This "100% clean electricity" legislation would transition Washington State to clean energy future by removing carbon emissions from the generation of electricity. If passed, the bill would require utilities to gradually transition away from fossil-fuel generated electricity. It includes a coal elimination deadline of 2025 and final clean grid deadline of 2045. The bill requires all electric utilities to eliminate from electric rates all costs associated with delivering electricity generated from coal-fired power plants by December 31, 2025; requires each electric utility to make all retail sales of electricity greenhouse gas neutral by January 1, 2030; requires each electric utility to meet 100 percent of its retail electric load using non-emitting and renewable resources by January 1, 2045; establishes an administrative penalty equal to \$60 for each MWh for noncompliance with the three standards. This bill was voted out of the Senate on March 1st with a vote of 28-19 (2 excused).

Creates a process for each electric utility to create a new standard rate or tariff schedule once June 30, 2029, or the 4 percent for the cumulative generating capacity available for net metering systems is reached, whichever comes first. This bill passed out of the Senate on March 4th with a vote of 29-19 (1 excused).

Prohibits a retailer from providing a customer a single use plastic bag, a paper or reusable plastic bag that does not meet recycled content requirements. Requires a retailer to collect a pass-through charge of \$0.08 for each recycled content large paper or plastic carryout bag provided. Preempts local carryout bag ordinances, except for ordinances establishing a \$0.10 pass-through charge in effect as of January 1, 2019. Specifies recycled content requirements for paper and plastic bags. This bill passed out of the Senate on March 5th with a vote of 31-44 (4 excused).

Requires Department of Ecology (DOE) to hire a third party independent contractor to conduct a study on the amount and types of plastic, the management and disposal of plastic packaging in the state, identify

alternatives to achieve certain goals for recycled packaging, and provide a report with findings and recommendations, including product stewardship, to the Legislature by October 31, 2020. This bill passed out of the Senate on March 8th with a vote of 48-0 (1 excused).

2SSB 5489

Creates a task force to recommend strategies for state agencies to incorporate environmental justice principles into their responsibilities. Requires state agencies to adopt the cumulative impact analysis for the purposes of identifying highly impacted communities. Provides that the task force provide guidance to agencies, the Legislature, and the Governor regarding how to use the cumulative impact analysis for designating highly impacted communities. Requires the Department of Health to initiate a process to develop model policies for implementing task force recommendations. Requires state agencies to submit a report on progress made towards reducing environmental burdens and attaining environmental health targets. This bill passed out of the Senate on March 8th with a vote of 27-21 (1 excused).

2SSB 5577 (2SHB 1580) Makes it unlawful for a person to cause a vessel to approach or fail to disengage a vessel within 300 yards of a southern resident orca and specifies that it is unlawful to position a vessel within 400 yards behind a southern resident orca. Makes it unlawful for a person to cause a vessel to exceed a seven knot speed limit within one-half nautical mile of a southern resident orca. Establishes a commercial whale watching license and sets fees for the license. Requires the Department of Fish and Wildlife to adopt rules by January 1, 2021, for holders of a commercial whale watching license to reduce the daily and cumulative impacts on southern resident orca whales and consider the economic viability of license holders. This bill passed out of the Senate on March 7th with a vote of 46-3.

SB 5811 (HB 1999) Authorizes the Department of Ecology (DOE) to adopt California zero emission vehicle program regulations. Expands the types of vehicles required to meet California standards to include medium duty vehicles. Expands the types of vehicles on which a manufacturer is required to affix a label that discloses comparative greenhouse gas emissions for that new vehicle to include medium duty vehicles. This bill passed the Senate on March 4th with a vote of 26-22 (1 excused).

Establishes a cap and trade program for greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions to be implemented by the Department of Ecology. Requires the program to limit GHG emissions to meet statewide GHG emission levels as revised for 2035 and 2050. Specifies distribution of auction revenues to specified energy efficiency projects, assistance to low-income households and highly impacted communities, and climate change impacts and natural resource resiliency.

ESB 5429 (SHB 1246) Requires the Department of Children, Youth & Families (DCYF) to allow proposals to receive Community Juvenile Accountability Program (CJAP) funds to be submitted to support programs for youth who are referred to the program by law enforcement rather than being formally diverted or charged within the juvenile justice system. Requires DCYF to implement a stop loss policy preventing a funding shift of more than two percent of CJAP funds away from a single county within a single year. ESSB 5478

(ESHB 1450) After four years of policy development and negotiation, an agreed upon vehicle which addresses experiences of workers are required to sign noncompete agreements which restricts them from taking jobs after employment ends or taking second jobs to supplement their hours and income. The policy will prohibit the use of non-competes for low and mid-wage workers (up to \$100K/year), presumes any noncompete restricting work for longer than 18 months is unreasonable and prohibits restrictions on moonlighting for any worker earning less than twice the minimum wage. Passed Senate: 3/05/19, 30-18.

ESHB 1772 (SSB 5751) Authorizes local authorities to regulate the operation of motorized foot scooters and shared scooters within their jurisdictions. Permits electric-assisted bicycles and motorized foot scooters to park as bicycles are permitted to park. Limits fine maximums for moving and parking violations involving shared scooters to fine amounts assessed to riders of bicycles, and mandates that they be assessed on the person responsible for the violation. Mandates that scooter share operators carry commercial general liability insurance coverage with a limit of at least \$1 million for each occurrence and \$5 million in the aggregate, and automobile liability insurance coverage with a combined single limit of at least \$1 million. Passed House: 3/12/19, 85-13.

Authorizes (1) the governing bodies of a municipal utility or a public utility district commission to adopt and (2) an electric utility regulated by the Utilities and Transportation Commission to submit an electrification of transportation plan that establishes that utility outreach and investment in the electrification of transportation infrastructure does not increase net costs to ratepayers in excess of 0.0025. Provides the incentive rate of return on investment authorized by the UTC for electric vehicle supply equipment deployed consistent with an electrification of transportation plan expires December 31, 2030.
