#### To Whom It May Concern:

I am excited to submit my application for Get Engaged for the Community Involvement Commission or Planning Commission. As a seasoned development and communications leader in the social services sector, I would use my skills to shed light on some of our community's most pressing issues such as homelessness, mental health, and educational disparities, and will amplify the work of this commission to make Seattle a more livable, vibrant place for all.

As a born and raised New Yorker, I have seen on a large scale how a city with concentrated wealth and big business can be a place where everyone thrives, not just some. In my seven years in Seattle, I have gone from being a renter in Fremont, a predominantly wealthy white area, to a homeowner in Rainier Beach, an area with less financial wealth and predominantly people of color, and have seen clearly where income level and race has led to an abundance of resources in my former neighborhood, and a lack in my current one. Decades of institutional racism and practices such as redlining have contributed to this disparity in Seattle, which has only grown with the influx of new tech companies moving into the core of the city.

I see the impacts of this every day in my work in a youth-serving social services agency, where even the most affordable parts of Seattle have become out of reach, or replaced by an anonymous high rise with no benefit to the original community in which it stands. Young adults are experiencing homelessness purely because the cost to live in this region is too high, and the amount of resources needed to "make it" in this city is unattainable, especially for those who have been impacted by mental health, education, criminal justice, and other systems.

I believe that through service on either of these commissions, I can use my personal and professional experience to help to create policies and practices that are more inclusive, are culturally responsive, and serve the entire community.
