1. BILL SUMMARY

Legislation Title:

A RESOLUTION ratifying and confirming the March 3, 2020 Mayoral Proclamation of Civil Emergency related to the spread of COVID-19, novel coronavirus.

Summary and background of the Legislation:

On March 3, 2020, the Mayor proclaimed a civil emergency related to containing the spread of COVID-19, also known as novel coronavirus.

Pursuant to the proclamation the Mayor may bypass regulations normally required of City contracting and borrowing; forgo regulatory permits in order to site or implement facilities needed to address COVID-19, and immediately adjust the use and closure of City facilities and events as necessary to prevent continued spread of COVID-19.

Pursuant to Seattle Municipal Code Section 10.02.10.C, when the Mayor proclaims a civil emergency the Council may by resolution: (1) ratify and confirm the proclamation, (2) modify the proclamation, or (3) reject the proclamation. If the Council does nothing, the civil emergency is in effect unless it is later amended or terminated by the Council. The Council can terminate a ratified civil emergency by resolution. Termination of a civil emergency requires 2/3 vote of all members. The Code contemplates that Council will act on a civil emergency proclamation within 48 hours.
