11	WHEREAS, rapid and widespread dissemination of vaccinations in all countries is at the center		
12	of the strategy by public health professionals to stop the spread of COVID-19 through the		
13	development of herd immunity; and		
14	WHERAS, new COVID-19 variants continue to develop throughout the world, and the sooner		
15	vaccines are available in all countries, the greater the likelihood of success in the battle		
16	against COVID-19; and		
17	WHEREAS, vaccinations are critical to reopening and economic recovery in both developed		
18	countries and the Global South; and		
19	WHEREAS, one in five of Seattle's population is born in another county and they, and many more		
20	Seattle residents have family abroad, some living in countries without adequate access to vaccine;		
21	and and and a second		
22	WHEREAS, on April 9, 2021, CNBC quoted World Health Organization (WHO) Director-		
23	General Tedros Adhanom Ghebreyesus regarding vaccine doses that "over 87% have		
24	gone to high-income or upper- and middle-income countries, while low-income countries		
25	have received just 0.2%," and that "[o]n average, 1 in 4 people in high-income countries		

1	have received a coronavirus vaccine, compared with just 1 in more than 500 in low-			
2	income countries, according to Tedros"; and			
3	WHEREAS, on February 17, 2021, The Wall Street Journal reported, "The disparity could also			
4	slow the global economic recovery more broadly and prolong the pandemic, by creating			
5	pockets of unchecked infection that could become breeding grounds for mutations of the			
6	virus," and that "[a] recent study by the U.Sbased National Bureau for Economic			
7	Research concluded that a failure to inoculate all countries equitably could wind up			
8	costing advanced economies up to \$2.6 trillion—far more than the cost of supplying			
9	global vaccine coverage"; and			
10	WHEREAS, the World Trade Organization (WTO) Agreement on Trade-Related Aspects of			
11	Intellectual Property Rights ("TRIPS Agreement") enforces intellectual property (IP)			
12	rights internationally, including prohibiting the production of COVID-19 vaccine doses			
13	in many low-income countries; and			
14	WHEREAS, the WTO has been widely criticized for prioritizing the profits of multinational			
15	corporations over the needs of regular, working-class people around the world, prompting			
16	the historic protest in Seattle in 1999 at the WTO Ministerial Conference; and			
17	WHEREAS, global trade laws under capitalism maximize profits for the elite in all countries, at			
18	the expense of all working people around the world and especially in the Global South;			
19	and			
20	WHEREAS, on March 15, 2021, Pharmaceutical Technology reported that WTO representatives			
21	from South Africa and India "asked the WTO to allow member countries to waive			
22	intellectual property (IP) rights, including patents, related to Covid-19 vaccines and other			
23	technologies for the duration of the pandemic"; and

1	WHEREAS, the March 15 Pharmaceutical Technology article further reported that "the US, the				
2	UK and the European Union (EU), among other richer countries, have been vocal				
3	opponents of the IP waiver proposal" in addition to the U.S. Chamber of Commerce and				
4	the International Federation of Pharmaceutical Manufacturers and Associations (IFPMA);				
5	and				
6	WHEREAS, on March 10, 2021, Reuters reported, "Richer members of the World Trade				
7	Organization (WTO) blocked a push by over 80 developing countries on Wednesday to				
8	waive patent rights in an effort to boost production of COVID-19 vaccines for poor				
9	nations"; and				
10	WHEREAS, on February 26, 2021, a letter to President Biden signed by over 400 community				
11	organizations and labor unions (Attachment A to this resolution) stated that "we urge				
12	your administration to lift the U.S. blockage of the 'Waiver from Certain Provisions of				
13	the TRIPS Agreement for the Prevention, Containment and Treatment of COVID-19";				
14	and				
15	WHEREAS, the letter further entreats President Biden, "with so many of the world's nations				
16	supporting this emergency waiver already, you can also help restore America's moral and				
17	public health leadership in the world by siding with the majority to prioritize saving lives				
18	over protecting pharmaceutical corporation monopolies and profits. This new position				
19	would be widely noted, given U.S. officials' shameful attack on the waiver at a January				
20	WTO meeting"; and				
21	WHEREAS, COVID-19 is a life-threatening pandemic, and the Seattle City Council does not				
22	agree with the argument made by large pharmaceutical companies in a December 8,

1	2020, IFPMA press release that "IP enables research and development and ensures that			
2	the next generation of inventors and investors will remain engaged"; and			
3	WHEREAS, on November 18, 2020, Scientific American reported, "Much of the pioneering			
4	work on mRNA vaccines was done with government money, though drugmakers could			
5	walk away with big profits," and that "[t]he vaccines made by Pfizer and Moderna, which			
6	are likely to be the first to win FDA approval, in particular rely heavily on two			
7	fundamental discoveries that emerged from federally funded research: the viral protein			
8	designed by Graham and his colleagues, and the concept of RNA modification, first			
9	developed by Drew Weissman and Katalin Karikó at the University of Pennsylvania";			
10	and			
11	WHEREAS, on April 8, 2021, The New York Times reported about Dr. Katalin Karikó,			
12	explaining that she is "one of the heroes of Covid-19 vaccine development. Her work,			
13	with her close collaborator, Dr. Drew Weissman of the University of Pennsylvania, laid			
14	the foundation for the stunningly successful vaccines made by Pfizer-BioNTech and			
15	Moderna," and that "[s]he never made more than \$60,000 a year"; and			
16	WHEREAS, the Seattle City Council recognizes that big pharmaceutical companies profiting off			
17	human misery is nothing new, and that there is widespread outrage at artificially high			
18	prices for life-saving insulin, EpiPens, and drugs to treat cystic fibrosis and tuberculosis,			
19	and at patent monopolies on essential AIDS medications that made them inaccessible and			
20	unaffordable in the Global South for a decade; NOW, THEREFORE,			
21	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SEATTLE THAT:			
22	Section 1. The Seattle City Council joins the more than 400 community organizations,			
23	labor unions, faith groups, and more in urging the Biden Administration to end the US

1	opposition to the Waiver from Certain Provisions of the Trade-Related Aspects of Intellectual			
2	Property Rights Agreement for the Prevention, Containment and Treatment of COVID-19 at the			
3	World Trade Organization (WTO). The Seattle City Council urges the Biden Administration to			
4	immediately share publicly all research, technology, techniques, and other information relevant			
5	to the production of COVID-19 vaccines (such as mRNA research) that is owned or co-owned			
6	by the U.S. The Seattle City Council shall sign onto the open letter to President Biden titled, "To			
7	Help End the Pandemic as Quickly as Possible and Restore U.S. International Cooperation,			
8	Please End Trump's Blockade of the COVID-19 Emergency Waiver of WTO Rules So More			
9	Vaccines and Treatment Can Be Produced," substantially as shown in Attachment A to this			
10	resolution.			
11	Section 2. The Seattle City Council requests that the Office of Intergovernmental			
12	Relations communicate the content of this resolution to the Executive Office of the President and			
13	to Seattle's Congressional Delegation in Washington, D.C.
