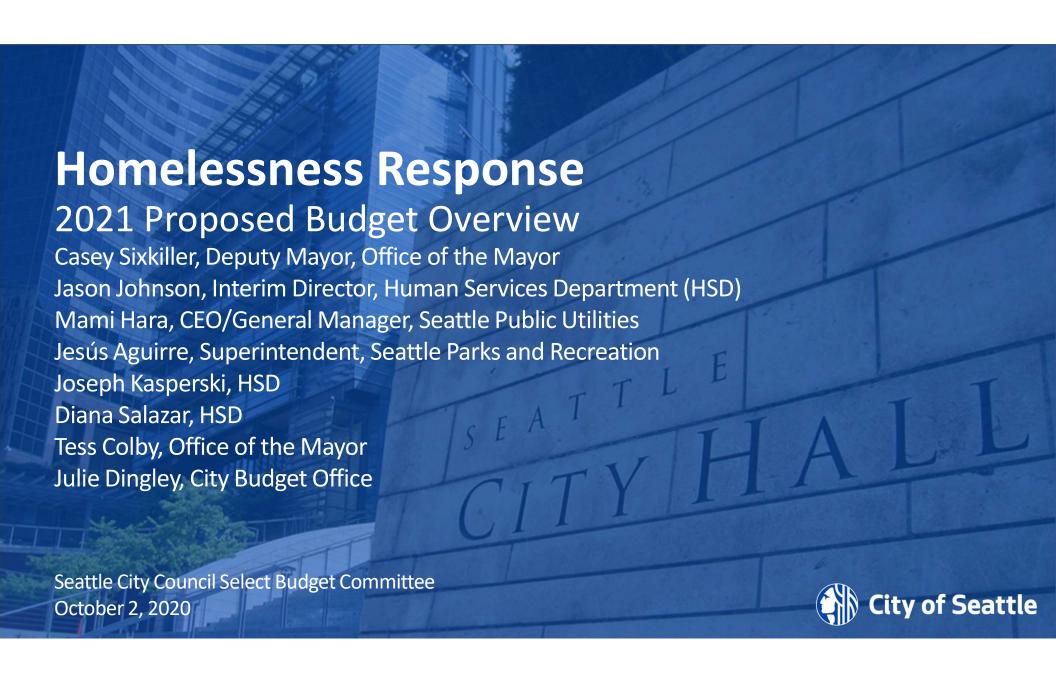

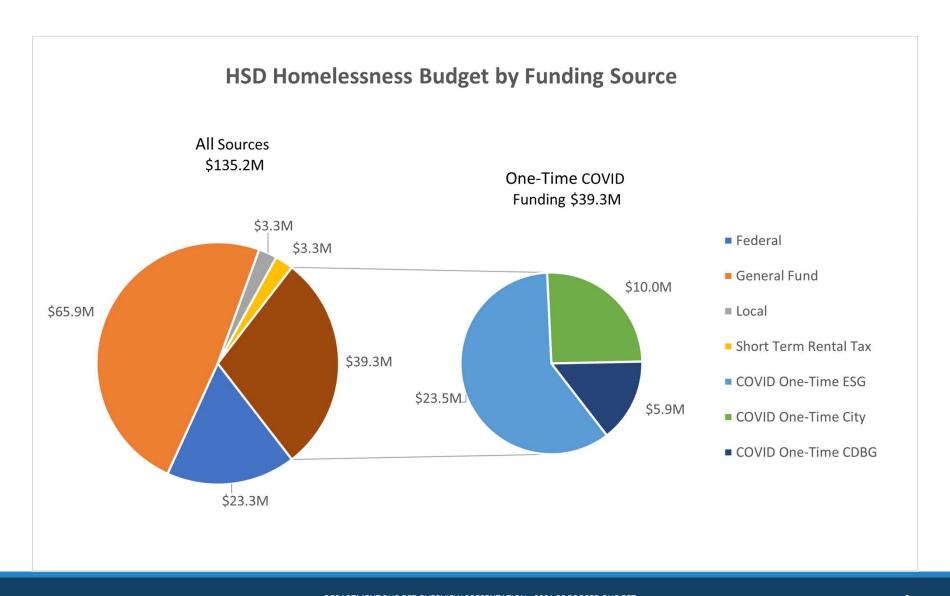

# \$41.3M Made investments regionally to meet Public Health Seattle King-County (PHSKC) and CDC guidelines

Nearly \$38.3M in one-time funding to open new shelter, sustain existing shelter and homelessness prevention and rental assistance

Since the onset of the pandemic we have:

- Focused on reducing the spread of COVID-19 among our network of 1479 shelter beds
- Opened 95 new shelter units (Spring 2020)
- Relocated 358 beds to de-intensified shelter spaces (Spring 2020)
- Maintaining shelter services and contract flexibility
- Help providers create safer shelters and to sustain changes through the pandemic
- Increase homelessness prevention and rental assistance through United Way Home Base program

\$3M from Cares Act ESG to stand up new shelter and hotel capacity from Q3 2020 Supplemental Budget

2021 investments maintain these changes and create more shelter capacity

## COVID-19 RESPONSE 2021 – HYGIENE SERVICES AND CLEAN UP

\$9.6M

Investments in SPU to ensure continued access to hygiene resources for persons experiencing homelessness and clean up

Of the \$9.6M, \$6.3M in new General Fund investments:

- \$1.5M to increase access to hygiene resources during the pandemic beyond existing facilities in parks, libraries and day centers that remained open.
- \$4.8M to provide shower trailers to supplement the City's existing shower facilities. Currently located at King Street Station Seattle Center and Green Lake Community Center. Partnership with Millionair Club to staff the trailers. SPU is in the process of purchasing two mobile shower trailers.

SPU placed 15 hygiene stations throughout Seattle near people experiencing homelessness. Hygiene stations consist of portable toilets and handwashing stations. SPU is in the process of buying permanent handwashing stations.

The 2021 Proposed Budget maintains \$2M in base funding for SPU's clean-up work (encampment purple bag, litter abatement, needle pick-up programs) and transfers \$1.3M from FAS to manage a clean-up contract.

# **RACIAL EQUITY**

Black /African-American and Native American households experience homelessness at disproportionate rates compared to people of other races and ethnicities

In 2017, HSD made deliberate shifts in City investments to support agencies that are B/AA and NA/AA led and have been effective in serving these communities.

Standing up the KCRHA is a critical next step for advancing racial equity in the homeless services system

- Moves the City's and County's investments in homeless services into a Theory of Change framework
- People with lived experience of homelessness, equity experts and front-line service providers consulted on key aspects of KCHRA

Creating a person-centered framework for the region's response to homelessness

#### **Create New Safer Spaces**

- An RFP for the operation of new shelter and hotel rooms, which will be connected to both new RRH investments and new PSH units
- Successful applicants must have a proven track record serving disproportionately impacted communities

  - \$28.7 million: Multifamily Rental Production and Preservation

  - Levy is up for renewal in 2023
- Mandatory Housing Affordability Program: \$28 million budgeted, significant fluctuations
- Weatherization grants (including Seattle City Light): \$6.25 million
- Federal grants (HOME and CDBG): \$4.6 million
- Other revenues (loan repayments, interest earnings, MFTE fees): \$6.25 million

# OFFICE OF HOUSING BASE BUDGET

# **RACIAL EQUITY**

OH centers racial justice outcomes in all of our core work. In 2021, OH will:

- Invest in affordable rental housing with a focus on addressing displacement, affirmatively furthering fair housing choice, and ending disparate racial impacts of homelessness
- Engage with BIPOC communities impacted by housing instability
- Invest in permanently affordable homeownership opportunities with a focus on closing the racial wealth gap
- Stabilize low income homeowners, particularly in communities of color facing displacement
- Invest in BIPOC organizations that apply for and are awarded competitive funds for housing development
- Continue to advance OH as an anti-racist organization

# **COVID RESPONSE**

Rental Assistance for Residents in City-Funded Affordable Housing

- \$1.4 million of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG)
- \$4 million CARES Act Coronavirus Relief Fund (CRF)
- Additional current and new rental assistance committed through HSD
- Supports low-income tenants of City-funded affordable housing providers
- Helps stabilize income- and rent-restricted affordable housing providers

Homeowner stabilization: \$700,000 over two years

Full briefing on COVID-related rental assistance, homelessness prevention, and homeowner support was presented to the Finance & Housing Committee on September 24, 2020.

Last week, Madison BRT received approval from City Council for the updated CIP and funding plan, and Sound Transit's board approved our funding agreement for the project. SDOT has now completed the remaining elements needed to receive a Small Starts Grant from the FTA. Pending execution of a grant agreement, the project is anticipated to begin construction in 2021.

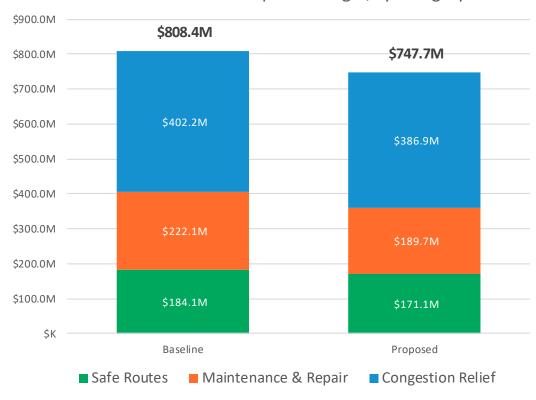

# **RACIAL EQUITY**

SDOT's budget advances racial and economic equity in three primary ways. These areas are:

- Building and maintaining transportation assets, as well as planning for and managing the public right of way. SDOT continues to advance this work in partnership with the Transportation Equity Workgroup.
- Contracting and purchasing with Women- and Minority-owned Business Enterprise (WMBE) firms.
- Advancing the Race and Social Justice Initiative internally and building a diverse and inclusive workplace.

The proposed budget takes steps to minimize impacts of reduced transportation revenues in each of these areas.

## SUPPORT FOR SMALL BUSINESSES

Nimble and innovative support during COVID-19:

- Launched priority pick-up zones for food and retail within 48 hours of approval (531 food & 64 retail installed)
- Streamlined free temporary sidewalk café, retail, vending, and street closure permits (140 permits approved)
- Prioritized underserved communities for Seattle Together Streets (Lake City, SE Seattle, soon CID)
- Translated materials and promoted programs in ethnic media outlets
